FIRST COLLEGE GAME

IOWA 12—CORNELL 5

Notwithstanding the long drive in a cold rain on Saturday the boys of Old Gold pushed defeat on the Purple in a somewhat ragged game.

Storey, the first man up, singled, Struble bunted, and Westcott who ran for him reached first in safety. Storey now stole third, Westcott going to second, but Davis went out from pitcher to first. Yates flew out to third, and Warner went out from pitcher to first and no score resulted.

K. D. Miller drew a base for Cornell, Kelly now lined out what was apparently a foul but according to Mr Tucker it proved to be a three base hit. Armstrong was hit by pitched ball, McIntyre flew out to Parsons. Hester reached first through an error by Williams; Matthew flew out to Parsons; in the meantime Kelley and Armstrong scored, W. Miller ended the inning, three scores being to Cornell's credit, but these were all they destined to get until the sixth.

Iowa drew a blank in the second but in the third Storey singled, Struble hit to W. Miller who didn't seem to know just what to do with it and let it go. Davis went out, Yates singled and two scores came in. Warner hit to right for three bases, Reynolds flew out to left, Warner scoring. Williams and Parsons both were safe on errors but Moss ended the agony by flying out to center. Iowa stock had now risen four points. But this was not satisfactory and in the fourth Storey again singled, Struble hit for two bases, Davis went out from short to first, Yates walked, Warner struck air three times, Reynolds was hit and Williams ended the inning, but two more scores were in.

In the fifth and sixth Iowa drew blanks—Cornell succeeding in having Hester score in their half of the sixth.

In the seventh, A. Miller for Cornell singled, and in squaring the diamond was caught at the plate. K. Miller also singled, Kelley went out from pitcher to first, Armstrong, the man of color, who holds the initial bag, lined out a double scoring Miller but was caught when he tried to stretch into a three bagger, by a pretty throw by Parsons.

In the seventh Iowa sent Reynolds and Williams across the plate with two more scores.

Cornell drew blanks in both the eighth and ninth while Iowa in eighth started another merry-go-round and Davis, Yates, Warner and Parsons romped around the diamond almost at will.

In the ninth nothing was accomplished but as the Purple could do nothing in its half the game was over.

A Disgrace

The conduct of the Cornell students, instructors and sympathizers at Saturday's base ball game at Mt. Vernon was a disgrace to the intercollegiate sport. The Iowa team was insulted. It was continually, viciously, and wantonly insulted. It was insulted by Cornell instructors and by Cornell students. The Cornell managers and every other Cornell man thought it quite the proper thing. There is no palliation or excuse for the action of Cornell. No effort was made by any one to stop the actions perpetrated, we suppose, in the name of college spirit which have fastened upon the Mt Vernon college a shame and a disgrace which was not deserved by the high aims of those who founded it. They are a cheap lot at Mt Vernon. They advisedly insulted, hooted, jeered, and taunted the representatives of a sister college. They are disgusting.

The Mt Vernon grounds will never again see an Iowa team. We say this advisedly and the tip is straight. Iowa will not brook such treatment as was bestowed upon her representatives. Her athletes are gentlemen. It is casting pearls before swine to allow them to play in the territory of those who have been found not only to be lacking in gentlemanly qualities themselves but not even capable of appreciating them in others. Iowa has played her last game upon Cornell grounds.

The conduct of Cornell students reminds us that, by some mischance, an Iowa City audience, through the influence of town boys, might fail in some degree to accord kindly treatment to visiting teams. This must never be. We must cherish cordiality for competing college men. The desire that Iowa shall win is all right and more legitimate cheering would be a good thing. But it must never even verge upon the disrespectful to visiting players. We must see the good in their work and appreciate it. We must be true sportsmen. The students of the university do not need to be told this. They have not failed to treat visit-

ing teams royally. They will not fail in the future.

An Important Matter

In an editorial last Saturday we stated that Varsity "I's" had been awarded for reasons not purely athletic. On one occasion, Dr Knipe, when consulted by the "I" committee, made excellent and liberal recommendations. If there is any one place where Dr Knipe was interested and his judgment especially good it was in these recommendations. The committee named candidates against Dr Knipe's best judgment and the board granted them the "I." That this action handicapped Dr Knipe to a certain extent in his work, we have not a doubt. Any abuse in the treatment of athletes affects his work directly.

On October 17, 1899, the board of control passed a job-lot resolution. That is, the minutes of the board for that date so stated. The president of the board and several other members present at the meeting did not know of its existence until it was hunted up and pointed out to them by a member of the board who was wearing an "I" in accordance with it. We have yet to hear a good defence of this job-lot grant. If successful managers are to be granted "I's" or if "I's" are to be granted to members of the board of control to convert a necessary vote, we think that it is high time that the power of the board of control to grant the "I's" be subjected to some regulation. Perhaps the "I's" granted for political reasons could be given a different hue, at any rate.

The constitution of the Athletic Union now reads: "Those entitled to wear the Varsity 'I' shall be named by the board of control." By this omnibus rule, "I's" can be granted by the board to anybody and everybody whom the board sees fit to honor. We have heard the necessity of such power advocated by members of the board of control. It does not appeal strongly to us. We do not believe that the university intends that her "I's" shall be granted to any but her BEST athletes. Whenever it is granted to any but the best, the reward given to the best athletes whom the university delights to honor is depreciated.

We have been publishing for some time past articles from our exchanges bearing upon this question. We find that it is the invariable rule to grant but few "I's" in a year and those to the best athletes as judged by the best authorities. Wisconsin granted only 17 "W's" last year for all forms of athletics. Did she grant any against Coach King's recommendation or give any away in a corner? We believe not. Yale grants no job-lots of "Y's." Michigan does not. The great tendency in college athletics is to restrict the grant of the Varsity letters.

The University of Iowa is entering upon a new athletic career. She cannot afford, at the outset of her course which we all hope will be sustained and glorious, to grant her "I's" for POLITICAL reasons. There should be fewer "I's" granted and definite, settled rules adopted for guidance in granting them. The rules committee should exercise the greatest of care in forming the rules which it has been instructed to prepare by the board of control.

Monday's Indian Game

Monday's game with the Indians was interesting to the Varsity as a practice game and to the spectators as showing that the Nebraska aggregation could play a certain straight forward kind of base ball. Buckheart, the first base man, is probably the only full-blooded Indian in the lot. The rest are half-breeds or whites.

Lambert and Wieland practiced to a considerable extent, reminding one of last year when the rule was: Do As You Please. Hughes, beginning in the second half of the sixth inning, played an excellent game from the box. The score was close until the end of the game. Considerable excitement was created in the last inning by Warner's raising a hope on which Parsons, running for Struble, scored and tied the game. The ball was called a foul and Warner soon popped to Graham, retiring the side and ending the game with the Indians' half of the ninth unplayed.
