CONVOCAION SATURDAY

A PROMINENT SPEAKER

Ex-Pres. Trueblood—Dedication Ode to be Given—No Seats Reserved After 10 O'clock

Arrangements are being completed for the convocation in honor of Washington's birthday Saturday. The speaker, Professor Benjamin Franklin Trueblood, is a man of extraordinary power and prominence. He was present as a visitor at the Hague Peace Conference and is the leader of the world's peace movement in the United States. He is president of the National Peace Federation with headquarters in Boston. This is the foremost society for the suppression of war that there is in this country, numbering among its members such men as Senator Charles Sumner and Elihu Burrit. Professor Trueblood is also editor of the "Peace Advocate." He is one who has been already honored by Iowa, bearing the title of L. L. D. from this University. He is also well known to Iowa people, having been for many years president of Penn College at Oskaloosa in this state from whence he was called to his present work in Boston. His subject, "The Historic Development of International Peace," though not directly connected with the celebration of the birthday of the father of our country, is one which will easily shape itself to such a patriotic celebration and Prof. Trueblood has signified his intention to handle it in this way. Indeed no one would have hailed the dawn of international peace with greater gladness than him in whose honor the convocation will be held.

In addition to the address by Prof. Trueblood there will be the rendition of the dedication ode which was written for the dedication of the arts hall. This ode will be given by a chorus of thirty voices selected from the University Choral Union, and accompanied by an orchestra. A number of important announcements of general interest to the University public will be made by President MacLean.

It is announced that the opera house will be open to the admission of students from 9:30 to 10 o'clock and during that time seats will be reserved for them. After 10 o'clock seats in the house will be open to the public.

From present indications this convocation in addition to patriotic and historical significance, promises to be one of the best and most interesting that has been held.

New Law Courses

New courses for all the classes in the college of law begin tomorrow. The freshman law class begin a course in Domestic Relations under Judge Deemer, the juniors have trial procedure under the same lecturer and the seniors get a five weeks course in Constitutional Law under Judge McClain.

Basketball Saturday

Augustana College will play a return game of basket ball in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium next Saturday afternoon. Augustana College has a fast team and played our team almost to a standstill on the trip two weeks ago, the score being 21 to 22. The teams are very evenly matched and the game promises to be close and exciting throughout, giving a great exhibition of the indoor sport. This will be the last game on the home floor before the team leaves for Minneapolis next week to meet the unbeaten team of the University of Minnesota. Game will be called promptly at 4 o'clock p. m. Admission 25 cents.

FAVORS GYMNASIUM

Sec'y Hawk Says University Gymnasium will not Injure Y. M. C. A., Opposes Moving University

Referring to the agitation and movement for a university gymnasium Sec'y Hawk, of the Y. M. C. A. expressed himself in favor of the new gymnasium to an Iowan reporter yesterday. He said that in a university of this size, the state could furnish, equip and maintain such a gymnasium as is needed cheaper than any private or public organization could. The tendency now in the big city Y. M. C. A.'s and in those in the larger universities is toward the chapter house idea, similar to that of fraternities except that the membership is not as exclusive. The idea of the Y. M. C. A. is becoming more and more that of a home. The newer Y. M. C. A. buildings have sleeping apartments for roomers and transients and in some cases, dining halls. This will probably be the plan pursued by the Y. M. C. A. here when the long deferred university gym is constructed.

In regard to the move across the river embodied in the Dunham resolution of last week Sec'y Hawk thought that such a move would have been a good one before the construction of the new building but that it did not seem advisable now as the arts hall would not be suitable for the needs. The move would place the Y. M. C. A. in a little less advantageous position as a larger per cent of Y. M. C. A. members are taken from the college of liberal arts than any other.

The Sophomore class meeting called for this afternoon for the election of the Hawkeye board has been postponed till Friday, when the whole class will meet together.

The next meeting of the Political Science Club will be held at the residence of Prof. Samuel Hays next Monday night. Prof. Richards will read a paper on the Inheritance Tax.

A meeting of the girls of the senior arts class is being held in the general lecture room this afternoon for the purpose of adopting class mortar-boards and attending to routine business.

CLASSES DRILL

MISS MORGAN'S CLASSES GIVE PLEASING ENTERTAINMENT

First Part of the Program Devoted to Drills and Gymnastic Performances—Second Half the Gibson Pictures in Tableau

The entertainment given last evening by Miss Morgan and her classes was a pleasing and novel one. From first to last the audience, which was not as large as the occasion deserved, was deeply interested. Nothing was allowed to drag or grow tiresome, as constantly the numbers were varied with something new and novel.

The first number on the program was a dumb-bell exercise by the children's class, and certainly the children did their part well. Their well-executed drills caused much merriment, and their few mistakes only made it appear more childlike and interesting. The earnest and happy expressions on the little tots' faces was good to be seen. The second exercise of the little boys and girls, which was the "Swedish Folk Dances" was as well if not better received than the first.

The Women's class presented three numbers, a drill with words and a stage march with waltz series, also the Gilbert steps and Delsarte exercises. In this last number beautiful Grecian costumes were worn, and as the many colored lights were turned on it presented a most pleasing spectacle indeed. The women's drills were very difficult and showed a great deal of training as they were very well executed. The choir boys of the Episcopalian church sang during this scene. One of the best numbers of the evening was the indian club swinging by Miss Morgan.

The other number on the first part was an exhibition on the parallel bars by Bailey, Rule and Schenk. They were up to their usual form and preformed some most difficult feats.

In the second part of the program Miss Mary Everts gave readings which were loudly applauded. The readings were: "Ricci Tikki Tovi" by Kipling and "Condor" by Bunner. The remaining numbers which were, perhaps, the best of the evening consisted of the Gibson pictures given in tableau. "Is bicycling bad for the heart" by Miss Lyon and Mr. Mueller. "Is a caddy always necessary" and "Evidently not" were presented by Miss Evert and Mr. Eppel, assisted in the first by Master Walden Patrick. The Misses Stein, Lyon, Wylie and Everett with Mr. Cerny presented "The only pebble on the Beach."

The final tableau which was given by the Kappa Kappa Gammas was the picture of "The Night Before her Wedding." This was asserted by many to be the best scene of the evening. Throughout the tableaux, colored lights were used.

ATHLETIC BOARD MEETS

Football Schedule and Minnesota Field Meet Approved—No Grinnell Meet—May Play Chicago Here

At a meeting of the Board of Athletic Control in the central building last night, a field meet with Minnesota, to be held in Iowa City on Friday, May 9, was approved; it was decided to hold no meet with Grinnell this year and the football schedule was approved.

The Minnesota meet was practically agreed upon at the time negotiations were conducted for the meet held in Minneapolis last year. The decision not to meet Grinnell this year was due to the expressed wish of Captain R. M. Anderson and several of the old track men that but one dual meet should be scheduled this year. Without doubt had any other meet been included in the schedule it would have been one with Grinnell under the old dual league arrangement. It has been two years now since Grinnell and Iowa last met in a dual meet, the last one having been held at Grinnell in 1900. No meet was held last year, as it was impossible to agree on a date. With the Minnesota meet this year scheduled for May 9, and the state meet occurring May 23, but two dates, May 3 and May 17, would have been available for a Grinnell meet. Of these, the former was considered much too early, and Captain Anderson was anxious for the men to have two weeks of work, uninterrupted by any public contest prior to the state meet.

The following are the football dates approved:

Oct. 11, Drake at Iowa City.
Oct. 25, Minnesota at Iowa City.
Nov. 8, Michigan at Iowa City.
Nov. 15, Grinnell at Grinnell.
Nov. 27, Illinois at Champaign.

Games were also approved with State Normal, Simpson and Ames, all to be played at Iowa City Sept. 27, Oct. 4, 18, and Nov. 1. Which set of dates will be assigned for the three games depends on Chicago's acceptance or refusal of an offer that was made them some time ago for a game at Iowa City Nov. 1.

There is no question that a game with Chicago would prove an exceptionally strong drawing card, and spectators would undoubtedly be in attendance from all over Iowa.

The editor of the Scarlet and Black denies a statement of the Cornellian, that he, the editor of the Scarlet and Black is receiving college credit for work on that worthy journal. Continuing the Scarlet and Black man says he is opposed to getting credit for his college newspaper work. This sounds much like the proverbial remark of the fox, in view of the fact that the Scarlet and Black board tried to get such credit not long since and were refused.

There is war on in Egypt. The time has come for the election of another Hawkeye board. One faction of the sophomore class tried to call a meeting for this afternoon. Another faction got the meeting deferred till Friday while they could fix up the slate and rally the forces. This kind of work reminds one of the antics of Bathhouse John Kenna in the famous 17th ward of Chicago. It does not comport with the dignity of college men. It is not calculated to put the best men in office. It is merely a fight for society supremacy, while it should be a calm, orderly selection of the fittest for the place. Even in making the nomination in the

caucuses of the various hostile camps, men are often chosen more for their personal popularity and ability to get votes and carry the election than on account of their fitness or adaptation for the position. Such a state of things is an outrage and a shame. The sophomore class upon whom rests the burden of publishing a junior annual next year that will be a credit to the institution it represents, should not allow their interests to be sacrificed and their trust violated by placing them in the chiefs of factions, who happen to have a band of organized votes behind them, which are cast for them wholly irrespective of whether they know an annual from an almanac. Organization and political work may be necessary in national and state politics, but the necessity for it in the selection of a Hawkeye board from a college class, does not appear. To get an election after days of button-holing and personal solicitation is no honor to the man elected or to his society. More respect is due, at least in college affairs, to the student who allows the office to seek him rather than seeking the office. The interests of the Hawkeye and through it of the University demand that something rather than private interests and personal gain should be considered in the election of a Hawkeye board.
