VARSITY IN FINE FORM

KNIFE HAS A GREAT TEAM

Hawkeye's Should Arouse Great Enthusiasm by their Work on Iowa Field Tomorrow—Dietz Afraid of the Guards Back—Drake Rooters Coming—Football Dope

The closing days of the second week of football practice find the Iowa team in very good shape. The men are apparently in fully as good physical condition as is usual for this time of year. Judged by the practice against the Normal and the reserves, nearly every player is a host in host in himself, quick-witted, fast-changing, varied in method and resource. The line from end to end is strong. The backs are swift. With a line able to turn back, with few exceptions, the heavy assaults upon it and backs ends and tackles swift enough to cinch opposing ends for steady, substantial gains, the Hawkeye team appears to be one which should inspire every student to wild enthusiasm.

The university's enthusiasm over the eleven will doubtless be manifested at the game Saturday afternoon. There will be some competition in the cheering, as 500 Drake students will be present to tell all about the good points of their team. One entire section, D, just south of the center of the field, has been reserved for the Drake rooters. The sale of season tickets for the game opened at Wieneke's book store this morning. Only a moderate demand for tickets developed this morning. The cost of reservation is low and tomorrow morning it is expected that many of the best sections will be taken.

The practice on Iowa field last night was devoted largely to drilling substitutes in their places on the varsity. Despite the fact that many of the players were new to their positions, the varsity played in excellent form against the two reserve elevens. Dwight Griffith was at quarter and sent the plays off snappily. Jones was placed at fullback, a position which he filled admirably. Two men given their first trial on the varsity were Edward Sheehan at half-back and Charles Davis at end. Both did well, Sheehan scoring one of the touch downs on the reserves after some excellent work in advancing the ball. Ray Prickley and Mack played nice games at end and half back and Donovan and Atkinson, the guards, played their positions stoutly and in much improved form. The reserves were unable to hold the varsity at any stage of the game and but once gained five yards on offence. The game resulted five touchdowns in favor of the varsity, Captain Hollenbeck kicking every goal.

THE MANTLE OF THE PROPHET

The mantle of the prophet has fallen upon the head of Dietz, the Drake football coach late of

Northwestern, according to reports from Des Moines. Mr. Dietz says that he knows of no reason why Drake may not win. When asked what effect the 63 to 5 score of Tuesday had on him, he said: "I had private advices sometime ago that the Normal had a weak team. Her weakness showed up so large because Dr. Knipe used the guards back and the Normal team was totally unprepared for it. The Drake team will be trained to the minute on stopping the guards back play and I anticipate no difficulty in stopping Iowa's touch-downs."

It may be interesting to note that Iowa has not used the "guards back" formation, as Mr. Dietz understands it, this year.

DRAKE'S STRONG TALK

Drake has no fear of defeat at Iowa's hands tomorrow if the following special to this morning's Minneapolis Times from Des Moines is to be believed:

"Des Moines, Iowa, October 9, (Times Special)—Dr. Knipe's Hawkeyes will have to look to their laurels when the Drake university football team goes to Iowa City next Saturday. Drake has a strong team this year and they will face the varsity not only confident of crossing the much-vaunted sacred goal line of the Hawkeye, but hopeful of winning the game.

"Coach Dietz of Drake said today that unless Iowa's play had improved materially over last year the locals will win the game.

"The team plays wonderfully fast offensive football, and its line, though compared with the forwards of varsity teams, has thus far proven invulnerable. In the back field are Main, Young and Stewart, three of the best backs in the state last year. Stewart is pronounced to be a wonder, and Dietz says he boots the ball better than any halfback since O'Dea.

ABOUT TWENTY-FIVE MEN OUT

Take a Preliminary Jog of Three Miles Freshmen Urged to Take Part Cup Runs in November

Yesterday afternoon at Close Hall about 25 men assembled at 4:30 to partake in the first of the preliminary cross country runs which portend in the future to have a great bearing on the development of athletic material at S. U. I.

Yesterday's was a practice run, the cup runs between the various classes not beginning until sometime in November, towards the end of the football schedule.

All classes were represented to a certain degree excepting the members of the freshmen class, who were markedly conspicuous by their absence. The freshies are especially urged to appear from now on, if they have any intention of taking up track work. The next one will start from Close Hall Saturday morning at 9 a.m.

The course yesterday was a little over three miles, from Close Hall through the campus, then over the bridge when a turn south was made towards Indian Head and back the same way. The run was led by Dr. Eastman and Mr. S. H. Bush, the latter a former Harvard long distance man. The pace set was but a slow one and was intended only as a starter towards getting the men's wind in good shape. The next run starts tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock sharp from Close Hall.

DOES IT PAY

Member of Chicago University's Faculty Advocates a Radical Change in College Methods

Oscar L. Triggs, a member of the faculty of the University of Chicago, in a recent address before the graduates of the Jewish Training Schools, advocated a radical change in college methods. His contention being that the culture acquired by an ordinary college education can be effective only in a state of comparative idleness and that the time has come for the establishment of new standards. He claims that the new culture is dynamic and is represented by the man of affairs subduing nature to his use. From the practical point of view he holds that college methods are fundamentally wrong and he upholds employers in their claims that technical schools give their graduates better equipment for the duties of an active business life, than an ordinary college education—Ex.

Have a System

As we have arrived at the point where we realize that the only kind of rooting that can be most effective is a kind with a system and an organization, it might be well to follow up this idea of system into other lines of work and by closer examination, see what it is really made of and to what end it can be used.

Going into the matter of the student and his relations to his studies we find some people, who, although they are above the average in intelligence, although they have the best of reasoning machines and the most retentive of memories yet there success in being good students, the primary object of there being in the university is of a limited kind. What is the matter with them? Are they not interested? Don't they intend to get their work done? No, their intentions are good. The only reason that they rank low instead of at the top is because they do not know how to go at their work. They work at random. Their energies are scattered. The result of their endeavors are like some of the spasmodic attempts we have seen on the rooters benches. In short they fail because they don't go at their work systematically.

Going at anything at random

never brings but poor results. It is the definite plan and purpose, the system which makes of the man with moderate capabilities a great success and of the man with brilliant faculties one of the brightest prospects. A little plan in mapping out your work. Some system in scheduling your study hours and your time for recreation is the thing that will place you on the right road to success. Isn't the principle of the lever a simple one? It can be easily understood. By getting at the long end of the lever a man can lift a great weight, because he has a great advantage. The man working at the small end of the lever or without any lever at all is hopelessly handicapped. The systematic way of doing things places a person at the long end. It makes him do things with ease which otherwise would be herculean tasks.

In taking a census of our great men, our successful men, we find invariably that they are the men who do things systematically. An hour spent in doing things by plan is worth two spent at random. Such is the testimony of railroad presidents, of great statesmen, of successful scientists and of every one at the top. Now is a splendid time to acquire the habit. In fact it is the only time.

It will greatly facilitate your school work and besides will lay a foundation of inestimable value.
