## GOPHERS VICTORIOUS

## MINNESOTA WINS EASILY

Iowa is Defeated on Home Field by an Overwhelming Score by Coach Williams' Husky Proteges.

The heavy, speedy Gophers swooped down from the north on Saturday and took the Hawkeyes into camp to the tune of 34 to 0. The result of the game was never in doubt, save in the minds of some of the bravest of Iowans, after the first few plays. Then it was merely a question as to the size of the score and whether Iowa would score or not.

There was plenty to admire in Minnesota's game, the nerve her team showed despite their defeat by a non-conference team the week before, the team work, the six-men-in-every-play way they broke through Iowa's defense for their touchdowns. But the only things to admire in Iowa were the superior physical condition of the Hawkeyes and the clean game they played. Excellent physical condition is desirable always, but usually as a means to fiery, nervy playing. Clean playing is a desideratum in Iowa's player's and it was a satisfaction Saturday to see that it at least remained to Iowa. With every reason to keep their nerve longer than Minnesota, the Iowa team apparently lost its grip on things after ten minutes of play. Plays that should have been stopped for five yard losses because of their slowness in starting were allowed to plunge into Iowa's line and around her ends for large gains. When Iowa had the ball, one or two men were in the play and when Minnesota had the ball, two or three Hawkeyes were entrusted with the work of stopping the runner.

### DONOVAN A ROCK.

To enumerate the faults of the backs and line men, the ends and tackles and guards and half backs were a long and possibly impossible task. One star shone brightly throughout the game, one man in the line went right along playing ball from start to finish. One man always charged when Minnesota had the ball and one man always held when Harris sent the play on him. That man was Donovan, who certainly earned a varsity initial by his great game Saturday. Minnesota never gained through him however much she gained through all the other places in the line. White at half back played a greatly improved game and reduced many and many a gain of the gophers by his tackling. Jones at quarterback played a live game and a hard one.

### MINNESOTA'S GAME.

Minnesota made her gains by team work. The line swung around in every play and four or five gophers were always by the side of the runner pushing and pulling him through the holes or bowling over Iowans on the long

runs. Irsfield and Davies, the half-backs, naturally secured the applause on the end runs they made but it was the five men who ran before them and at their side that made the gains. The Minnesota plunges were made from the right or left formation mostly. Warren from the left line or Smith from the right were called back to a position behind and close by the side of quarterback Harris. From this position, the play usually went toward the side opposite that from which the line man had been pulled back.

Minnesota used her end runs alternately with her line plunges while out in the open and used her line smashes for the sure gains when near Iowa's goal. Soon after the second kick-off, Ochiltree kicked. Harris and Siberts took the ball and ran over the goal line but it was decided that Harris had never touched the ball. Near the end of the half, Iowa was given the ball in Minnesota's territory for holding by the gophers and Ochiltree tried two place kicks. Minnesota broke through Iowa's line from both sides each time and blocked the kick.

### IMPROVED PRACTICE

The practice last night on Iowa field showed that the team can play football when Dr. Knipe is shouting at them at any rate. Five touchdowns were scored against the reserves by the varsity in the game last night. The varsity ate up the reserves five yards at a bite. The runner was helped and pushed and the play was reasonably fast.

Coach Knipe made a number of changes in the positions of the men, which may or may not be of any significance. Johnston went in at center, Briggs at right tackle and Fred Buckley at right end.

### SCHOLARSHIP REWARDED

Alliance Francaise Offers Two Medals for Excellence in French Language at University of Iowa

Professor Van Steenderen, of the department of French, is in receipt of a letter from Mr. James H. Hyde, of New York, offering two medals as prizes in French. Mr. Hyde is president of the Federation of De L'Alliance Francaise in the United States. This federation is an organization allied with the original Alliance Francaise in France. Its purpose is the extension of the use and study of the French language throughout the world.

Mr. Hyde offers two medals to be given to the best scholars in French language, one recipient to be a man and the other a co-ed.

Mr. Hyde has also sent to Professor Van Steenderen an announcement of the lecture course to be given by the Alliance Federation this year. An excellent course of lectures is announced, a course which all would like to have given at Iowa. These lectures will be given at nearly all of the large universities and colleges this year and should be secured for and appearance in Iowa City.
