## MISSOURI THURSDAY

### LAST GAME OF SEASON ON IOWA FIELD

Close Contest Promised From Records of Teams—Varsity Showed Dash and Spirit in Washington Game

The game with Missouri university will be played on Iowa field Thursday afternoon, commencing at 2:30. The game is played on Thursday in order to give the varsity a full week in which to practice for the Illinois game on Thanksgiving day. Thursday's game will be the first to be played with Missouri for a number of years and will probably be the first of a regular series of games. If it is possible to do so, considering the rest of her schedule, Iowa will doubtless go to Columbia next year to play the game with Missouri.

The Missouri game is an important one in many ways. A victory is very desirable in beginning the series with Missouri and a victory by a score of twenty to nothing or better would give Iowa excellent chances for victory over Illinois on Thanksgiving day. Missouri has a strong team, having held Nebraska three weeks ago to a score of ten to nothing. Another reason for desiring victory is the fact that the presidents of the Iowa Colleges will be present at the game as the guests of Dr. MacLean. The Prexie has therefore sent forth the order that the game must be won. A holiday has been officially decreed for Thursday afternoon beginning at 2:30 in order that no student or professor may miss seeing the game which is to close the football season on Iowa field.

IOWA 61, WASHINGTON 0.

Iowa's victory over Washington university Saturday was a neat performance on the part of the eleven. There is nothing to feel particularly chesty about because of the game for Washington was not a strong team. Still they fought pluckily throughout the game and at times braced together and came through Iowa's line for good gains in a stiff, compact way that the Hawkeyes found hard to stop.

Washington was defeated Nov. 8 by Missouri 24 to 0. Although comparative scores do not mean much, they must mean that Iowa has more than an even chance against Missouri this week, though it is explained that but nine minutes of the second half of the Missouri-Washington game were played on account of darkness.

Captain Krause of Washington said after the game, "I think you will have a very even game with Missouri. Missouri plays a hard game and you will find it difficult to score against her on account of her excellent defense. Nebraska's score of but 10 to 0 against Missouri is a case in point. I think your game with Missouri will be very even and I would like to see it. Regarding Illinois it is

hard to speak because our game with her was earlier in the season. My impression, however, was that Illinois has a stronger team than you have."

Coach White of Washington who was a player on last year's Michigan eleven, said: "Iowa must have improved considerably since last week's game with Michigan. I have no excuse to offer for Washington's playing. We were beaten and I guess that's about all."

Dash and team work did the business for Iowa. The men played with life and for the most part remembered to take care of the opposing players assigned to them when playing offensively. Two, three, four and sometimes five men were in every play, pushing and pulling and making the plays, whether end runs or line smashes, net large gains. When Buckley broke through the Washington team for his second touch-

down on a sixty yard run, he had four men at his side running interference for him. Jones on his touchdown from a punt, had six men bowling over the opposition for him. Many times after being tackled and downed the Iowa runner would be pulled to his feet and advanced. Iowa played with dash and as fast as the muddy field permitted. Howell, Buckley, Walker and Ross shone in the end runs and Ochiltree, Donovan and Hollenbeck in the Iowa line bucks.

Washington played with pluck and perseverance throughout the game. But one substitute was used and time was taken out but seven times. Every opening or let-up offered the visitors was quickly taken advantage of by them. Though Washington never threatened Iowa's goal, she marched for fifty yards through Iowa's center when the Hawkeye team work on defense suffered a let-up during the second half. Washington secured the ball on her twenty-five yard line for holding by Iowa. She began by smashing Captain Hollenbeck and Smith for five yard gains. Briggs and Swift were also touched up for gains by Smith, Garsung and Peifer before the Iowa team, on Hawkeye 35 yard line, stopped watching the men on whom the play was directed, work and all turned in to hold back the advance. Quarterback House was Washington's star. Bischoff,

The Burkley people seem less afraid of the possibility of the place being turned upside down and have

consented to have the social there.

This is the first time a class social has been held in a hotel and shows plainly what our system of class scraps will ultimately result in. Such performances as the breaking up of \$50 worth of furniture, doors and etc., is utter foolishness and should be stopped. The sophomores should close at their own volition.

President Olinger of the class of 1905 has called a meeting of the sophomores this afternoon. It is to be hoped that, for the good of the university, the sophomores will decide not to push their interference so far as the destroying of property and the disturbing of the peace.

### MASS MEETING TO DECIDE BEST YELL

The Winner of the Iowan's Yell Competition will be Picked by Vote of Students

The DAILY IOWAN's yell competition will be decided by vote of the students, alumni, and members of the faculties at the mass meeting tomorrow evening. There have been submitted twenty-five yells, exclusive of plagiarism and infantile efforts. These yells have all been typewritten on separate sheets, without names, and numbered. These sheets will be placed in the hands of the yell masters this evening. The yell masters will select the six best yells of the twenty-five submitted. These six yells will be printed and distributed at the mass meeting Wednesday evening. Each of the six will be given a fair trial by the meeting, had by the yell masters who will have had an opportunity to learn the yells and give instructions as to their proper rendering. Then a vote will be taken as to which of the six yells is most worthy of the prize offered by the IOWAN. Every student, alumnus, and member of the faculty will have the right to vote.

The key to the system of numbering and the IOWAN's prize will be in the hands of the presiding officer and the prize may be claimed and awarded as soon as the decision is rendered.

No fairer method could be thought of and it is hoped that this will be perfectly satisfactory.

Schantle and Smith played well. Garstung made an opening kick-off of 50 yards to Jones of Iowa who returned 30 yards. Iowa advanced steadily toward Washington's goal and Fred Buckley scored after two minutes of play.

On first down after Garstung's kick-off, Fred Buckley scored on a 70 yard run, five Hawkeyes running at his side through the Washington team.

Tackle back smashes and delayed passes make the third touchdown, which was by Ochiltree. Howell scored the fourth touchdown after a 40 yard end run. Jones scored the fifth touchdown by a 40 yard run after catching Garstung's punt. Ross and Ochiltree scored the last touchdowns of the half, which ended, Iowa, 40, Washington, 0. Iowa's interference was better in the second half than in the first. Umpire Miles penalized the Hawkeyes frequently and did not see the frequent holding by the Washington players, but there could be little objection to this as Washington had kindly consented to the Iowa student's acting as an official when a foreign umpire could not be obtained. The game ended; Iowa 61, Washington 0.
