## IOWA IS READY

### EXPERTS FIGURE ON THE PROBABLE SCORE

Iowa is Ready to Meet Missouri Tomorrow—Figures Don't Always Come True

The varsity is quite ready for the Missouri game which will be played tomorrow afternoon on Iowa field. The players are in excellent condition physically and the team is playing with more dash, spirit and fierceness than it has yet played this season.

The dope experts at Missouri have figured out that Missouri will defeat Iowa by two or three touchdowns. This is the way they do it: Nebraska defeated Minnesota 6 to 0; The week after this Minnesota defeated Iowa 34 to 0, and Missouri held Nebraska 10 to 0. Hence this shows Missouri's superiority over Iowa by at least half Minnesota's score. Iowa rooters are beginning to fear that possibly there may be some strong points about Missouri which are not known here. Just why captain Krause, after being overwhelmed 61 points by Iowa, should say that Missouri which was victorious over Washington by only 27 points, would play Iowa a very close game and victory would hang in the balance, is one of the things that can not be explained.

#### LAST NIGHT'S PRACTICE

The varsity practice last night was against a strong substitute eleven, captained by Dwight Griffith. Coach Knipe was desirous of pitting against the varsity something stronger than the reserves and therefore formed this eleven under Griffith. At the end of 35 minutes' play, the score stood, Varsity 29 substitutes 0.

The Varsity's work was fast, spirited and together. Donovan, Hollenbeck and Ochiltree were as usual fine gainers through the line and Buckley made some fine runs around the right end. Howell and Swift were not in the line-up on account of small bruises and stiffness. White took Howell's place and Faulk went to leftguard in Swift's place. Dwight Griffith and Roy Buckley were the stars of the substitute eleven.

#### Mass Meeting Program

Professor Loos will lead the stars who will speak at the mass meeting tonight. E. K. Brown will make his first appearance since his Chicago victory. M. J. Wade, congressman and judge, a lover of football from his youth, will be there. Coach Knipe and Sam Hobbs will occupy a front seat and probably deliver extempore speeches. Others have promised to be there.

The talked-of football game between the Delts and Sigma Nus will not be played owing to the impossibility of the players getting into any condition for football.

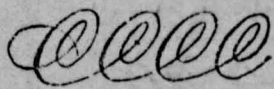
