Honor System in Examinations

The request of the present sophomore class in the medical department of the University of Michigan, that it be allowed to conduct its own examinations, has been granted by the faculty. Six years ago the medical class of 1899 made a similar request and all of its examinations were thereafter conducted on the honor system.

According to the rule drawn up and accepted by the faculty, the class of 1905 is to conduct its own examinations. The professor in charge of each course will distribute his questions, and remain long enough to explain whatever may not be clear. Each member of the class is to sign a statement in which he pledges his word of honor that he would neither accept or give any information during the examination period, and further pledges to report any one whom he may see using unfair methods. This report, if it becomes necessary to make it, is to be made to a committee of the class, which shall act in secret. The person reported is to be given a secret trial, in which he may defend himself. The committee is then to make a report to the faculty on its findings, with such suggestions as it may see fit to add, whereupon the faculty is to act as a court of higher appeal and to render a final decision.

ENGINEERS STAR AS OLDEN HEROES

SAVE BRIDGE FOREMAN'S LIFE

Seniors by Courageous Action Rescue Wounded Man from River—Had Fallen from pier

The senior engineers distinguished themselves yesterday by saving a drowning man from a watery grave.

The seniors have been getting practical work on the new wagon bridge which is to span the river below the city. Yesterday afternoon they were on the ground as usual. It seems that the foreman of the bridge gang in some manner fell from the top of the pier, about 20 feet above the river and in his descent struck his head on a scaffold, falling nearly unconscious into the swift current. He was carried rapidly down stream a short way and his body lodged on a small island in the center of the river.

A. M. Currier was on the far side of the river with the boat, an old tub without oars. Seizing a small paddle he leaped into the boat and propelled himself out into the stream as fast as the swift current and the lack of oars would permit. After great effort he reached the island where the foreman's body had lodged and pulled him into the boat. In reaching the shore again, the boat was carried down stream nearly half a mile, so swift was the current.

Meanwhile the other engineers had procured a wagon, and when Currier reached the shore with the unconscious man they waded out into the water carried the foreman ashore and drove him to town. He was in a serious condition, a large cut running nearly across his forehead.

Had it not been for the promptness of the engineers the man would likely have bled to death if he escaped drowning.
