IOWA TRAIN LEAVES AT SEVEN O'CLOCK FOR DES MOINES

SPECIAL EXCURSION TO STATE MEET—TEAM IS GOING TO WIN

Required Number of Tickets Guaranteed by Iowa Management, Relying on Loyalty of Iowa Students—Meet Very Close—Ball Team Lost to Ames Saturday

The Iowa special excursion train for the state meet will leave the Rock Island station at seven o'clock tomorrow morning. The excursion will positively be run, the necessary number of tickets having been guaranteed by the Iowa management. All absences will be excused on registration at the Iowa headquarters at the Kirkwood hotel. The round trip rate will be \$2.25. The Iowa management relies on the loyalty of Iowa students in guaranteeing the required number of students. Either Drake or Iowa will obtain permanent possession of the cup by winning it this year, it having been won twice by both teams. The third time secures it permanently.

It is necessary to have a large crowd of Iowa rooters if Iowa is to win. "Jack" Watson, Grinnell's trainer figures it thus: Iowa 33, Ames 32, Drake 32, Grinnell 32. In such close times rooters can do great things.

TEAM LEAVES THIS EVENING

The Iowa track team leaves this evening at 6:05 for Des Moines, where they will participate in the state track meet on the fair grounds Wednesday afternoon.

The men are in good condition. The candidates have shown an excellent spirit in their training all winter and spring, with the result that Coaches Bush and Eastman have a team that is superior to any in the state.

In the state meet, the outcome will be doubtful on account of the large number of schools which may cut into the events.

It is estimated that Grinnell, Des Moines, the State Normal, Cornell and Simpson will capture 22 of the 122 points at stake. This will leave 100 points to be divided between Iowa, Ames and Drake. Were the question one of defeating either of these schools, there would be no doubt as to the outcome, but in the mix-up of all the colleges, Iowa may not be able to capture enough points to win out.

BUSH ON THE OUTCOME

Coach Bush said this noon: "It is very hard to predict anything as to the outcome of the meet. Iowa has a very nice track team, the boys are eager to win, and I know they will do their best. Beyond that I cannot predict."

E. H. White, who is in the strange position of being eligible under conference rules and not state rules, will not go to Des Moines, but will train on Iowa field for the conference meet

Saturday. He ran the 220 yard dash yesterday in 22 4-5 seconds.

C. H. Swift, the conference discus champion, is throwing the discus close to the world's record this week and may possibly exceed that mark on Wednesday or Saturday.

AMES 7, IOWA 3

Ames won her second league game of the season from Iowa Saturday by a score of seven to three. The score was tied up to the fifth when with two men on bases Brown drove a fast one past second base. White fielded the ball and threw it home. Carrier in coming home ran into Adams just as the ball reached his hands, knocking him down and allowed three men to score. Adams says he was not in the line of the base-runner and that Ames is guilty of foul play in running into him. As Iowa had no substitute catcher. Adams had to play out the game though groggy from his fall. Ames scored twice in the sixth and sent one man around the bases in the eighth.

Iowa's three scores came in the sixth as the result of two errors and two hits. Vos and White did some of the best base running in this inning that has been seen on the Ames diamond. The score by innings:

Concerning Debate

The following is a portion of an editorial recently appearing in the Yale Alumni Weekly concerning a change in inter-collegiate debating systems—

"The debates, as they are now conducted, are often so long as to induce in their latter half a constant repetition and reiteration. As to the subjects, there is a tendency to avoid those whose very suggestion will stir interest in any body of intelligent wide-awake men. Most of such subjects are more or less perennially open subjects, or have features which ever invite antagonistic sentiments; the arguments pro and con are less easily weighed, the more generally interesting the subject is. But that should not be a reason for avoiding them. Let us have subjects which will encourage the men to handle material with which they are familiar, which makes them go into their own minds and study their own feelings and gather from their own observation. The tendency now is to discussions which do not draw out original ideas; which do not take hold of the man himself and stir him up. They are academic subjects. There is about so much material on them in the library and it is gathered up and handled well.

"We hope training in debate will proceed far enough in the near future to produce good speakers who treat their subjects with calmness and quietness. As a rule now the inter-collegiate debater goes at his task as a football man tackles his opposite in the rush line."

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
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Official Bulletin

 The annual competition drill of the battalion will take place Friday, May 29, 2:30 p. m. All cadets are required to be present. Members of the Battalion will be excused from recitations from 2:20 p. m. on for the remainder of the afternoon.
 The judges will be G. E. Lambert and Captain Dalzell of Newton and Captain Ed Middleton of Davenport all of the 54th Regiment Iowa National Guard.

The individual drill will include the "School of the Soldier" and the company drill all of the "School of the Company."

THE LOWDEN PRIZE
 An examination for the Lowden Mathematical prize will be held on Saturday, May 30th, 1903, from 9:00 to 12:00 a. m., in room 116, hall of Liberal arts. Competition is open to all students who are finishing with the current year, the sophomore work in pure mathematics. The prize of fifty dollars (\$50.00) may be divided equally between not more than two candidates, or may be withheld if it shall appear that the work of no candidate is of a superior order of merit. The subjects to be covered by the examination are Algebra, Geometry, Plane Trigonometry, Analytical Geometry of two dimensions, Differential and Integral Calculus.

The members of the committee charged with the award are Professors Weld, Veblen and Sims, ex officio, Mr. Lorenz and Mr. Mitchell. The questions submitted in previous examinations will be found upon the bulletin board in the mathematical library. Those intending to compete are requested to submit their names to Professor Weld at an early date.
