STATE MEET WILL BE HELD THURSDAY

TRACK IN GOOD CONDITION FOR ATHLETES

Excursion Train Leaves Thursday Morning at 7 O'clock Sure—
Team Goes at 5 O'clock Today with 25 Men

The state meet, postponed from today on account of inclement weather will be held tomorrow. Messages to Manager McClain states that the track, although somewhat wet, is in good enough condition so that the meet could have been held today. The games committee, however, at the meeting last night decided not to hold the contest today and it was called off. The telegram to that effect reached here just in time to prevent the departure of the team.

The Des Moines papers of last night and this morning predict that the meet will be the closest ever held in the state. They give the odds to Iowa but say that Drake will make a hard fight for first honors. The Iowa team is expected to take more than her share of the first places but Drake hopes to overcome this advantage by second and third places. Grinnell, Ames and Cornell may spoil all forecasts by taking more points than are conceded them.

The excursion train will leave the Rock Island depot at 7:00 a. m., Thursday. The fare will be the same as previously announced, \$2.25 for the round trip. A large delegation is expected to go. The university band will accompany the rooters on the special train in the morning. The team leaves at 4:43 this afternoon, twenty-five men being taken.

The absence of all those who attend the state meet will be excused if they register at the university headquarter in the Kirkwood Hotel in Des Moines.

The weather indications for tomorrow are the best that can be hoped for—"Fair and Warmer." The weather man at Des Moines says that with the possible exception of slight local showers the day will be a fine one all over Iowa and especially in Des Moines. The present storm has passed and there are no other in sight anywhere. Thus a clear bright day is to be expected.

The varsity started in with their batting cloths on and fell against Coates' delivery with a vengeance. Dye singled, Hampson fanned out, Adams went to first on an error and Burns knocked a clean one filling the bases. McGregor knocked a slow one to pitcher Coates who let it go by. Olwer picked up the ball and threw it at first but it struck the ground five feet from Balknap and rolled away. Meanwhile Dye and Adams scampered home and Burns went to third. McGregor went to second on the third ball pitched. Van de Steeg swung hard and raised a high one out into left garden so far that Brown could not get to it and Burns and McGregor scored. White got to first on an error. Cretzmeyer swung three times without result and Dye was unable to hit twice in the same inning retiring the side and Van and White on bases. This ended the scoring.

PHARMACY PAMPHLET

Proceedings of Fifth and Sixth Annual Meetings Published

The alumni association of the college of pharmacy has just issued a neat seventy-six page pamphlet, which contains the proceedings of the fifth and sixth annual meetings of the association, which were held at Iowa City, April 3, 1901 and April 1, 1902. It also has cuts of all the association officers, members of the faculty, the pharmacy laboratory, and of the E. L. B. Club. The alumni roll gives sixty members, and the list of graduates numbers 126. The first graduate being Frank Svacha of Ely, Iowa, who constituted the class of 1887. Two deaths are noted: J. W. Senn '01, who died April 24, 1902; and D. C. Prader '98, whose death was in 1901.

At the two meetings of the association several good papers were read. "The Manufacture of Pepsin" is an able article by A. F. Koch '97. There is a short, well worded discussion of the preparation of compound syrup of squill, by L. L. Broodeen, '00. Under the title "Pharmacy in the States", J. M. Lindly, '99, has a comparison of pharmacy law and conditions in the forty-five states and territories.

Dr. L. W. Andrews has a very scholarly paper upon "the Art of scientific discovery." In it he contends, that scientific discovery is not due to accident, and that the acquisition of knowledge consists of a succession of discoveries." A. L. Jepson, '02, dicusses the preparation of citrene ointment.

Co-ed Garden Party

The dean of women will give a garden party on Saturday, May 30, from four to half past six, on the campus. All women in the university, whether belonging to the faculty, administration, library or student body, are invited. No individual invitations will be sent. If it should rain a reception in the drawing room will be substituted.

Inspection June 5

The university battalion will be inspected on June 5 by Captain William H. Smith, U. S. A., inspector general for the department of the Missouri. On that date the cadets will be given dress parade and guard mounting, as well as inspection. Captain Smith will also determine whether the captains are worthy of being recommended to the secretary of war as eligible for appointment as second lieutenants in the regular army.

Debating Opportunities

The proposition for a debate from Cornell university demands considerable thought on the part of those who must take the responsibility of accepting or refusing the offer. There is no doubt that it is desirable to hold a debate with Cornell. Such a contest would not only widen out the debating field but bring us in touch with one of the great educational institutions of the east.

But the question to be considered is not the desirability but the advisability of such a contest. Can the debating league, composed as it is of only two societies, handle another inter-collegiate debate with credit to themselves and the university which they represent? We feel that this question must of necessity be answered in the negative.

With this condition of affairs there are two courses of action

open to the league—to decline to accept the offer from Cornell, and this would be a great misfortune, or to enlarge the limits of the debating league. It would certainly be undesirable to lose the excellent chance of securing a debate with Cornell. Therefore it would seem advisable to extend the debating league. There are societies in the university which, if not as large, can be counted on for hard-working, able debaters, well worthy of larger fields than those now open to them.

As to practicability, a three society league with three inter-collegiate debates is as easily managed as the present system and would evolve no more work on each society.

Ames' Tactics

Why is it that a state institution, clean and sportsmanlike in other forms of athletics should allow her representatives on the baseball diamond to use foul play?

In the game at Ames, Saturday, a member of the state college team maliciously ran into and knocked unconscious the Iowa catcher, who was not in the base line and entirely out of the way of the base runner.

The fact that the collision was intentional is shown by the words of the Ames man after the game. He said, "wouldn't you knock out a man for three runs?"

That a large and generally fair minded institution should allow such foul work on the local diamond is inconceivable. The state college should bring her baseball up to the sportsmanlike standard of their other athletics.

President MacLean will deliver high school commencement addresses at Eldora on May 28, at Tama on May 29, and at Denison on May 31.

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
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Official Bulletin

Attention is called to paragraphs 436-535 in firing regulations for the U.S. army.

The competition is open to all members of the battalion and Commandant's medal will be awarded for one year to the man making the highest score. All cadets desiring to take part should report at once to Major H. E. Hadley, Inspector of rifle practice.

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
