## SCIENCE AND ETHICS

### DOES SCIENCE DEAL WITH SENTIMENT

Dr. Andrews Makes Address as Retiring President of Sigma Xi

The customary address of the retiring president of Sigma Xi was given last night by Dr. L. W. Andrews. His subject was "Science in its Relation to Ethical Sentiments."

"Medical jurisprudence recognizes the stigmata of occupation which produces changes in the body by which the occupation of the individual may be proven. This is true both of the hand and brain worker. Whatever effects the mode of thought influences the moral and spiritual being.

"Science has added to man's material wealth. But has science ought to do with feeling, with sentiment? Or is it concerned with thought alone? At present this is a timely question as the education of the youth is becoming more scientific in character. In this practical commercial age does scientific training belong to the bread and butter class alone; or may it fulfill some of the functions of the humanities?

"The answer depends upon the influence which scientific training exerts upon the social, ethical and altruistic sentiments. If that influence dulls or leaves undeveloped it is a threat at the very existence of the social fabric.

"The education of the past was sectarian and secular. It was bound up in tradition. The first lesson in scientific training is intellectual freedom.

"Science is becoming more conservative and less speculative. Its fundamental laws where those of metaphysics and philosophy, they were not strictly scientific, for science begins where speculation ends. From metaphysics science eliminates the faults rather than establishes new truths. Science will ultimately weld all the principles into an orderly system, and furnish for the first time a real science of ethics.

"It is thought in the past that science was antagonistic to faith, but faith is essential to progress and to sound scholarship in the sciences. Faith becomes a discriminating trait. Confidence in the law of gravitation will cause mistrust of table-tipping. Belief in conservation of energy will make one sceptic of perpetual motion. A firm adherence to the laws of chance will make you doubt your ability to break the bank at Monte Carlo.

"The discriminating faith of Science is not distinct from that for which the martyrs died. It differs only in object. The martyrs of science, Giordano, Bruno

and Keppler, were as unfaltering at the stake as any.

"Science is not the only need in human life. It is not a substitute for religion. It is the ally and friend of the spiritual life. Science cannot create religious concepts or spiritual ideals. It simply adorns and enriches them. It may assist religion by striking off the shackles which sects have placed upon her, and prepare the way for unity and harmony of religious effort."

### SIR FREDERICK POLLOCK TO BE HERE SUNDAY

Will Deliver a Course of Five Lectures Before the Law College Next Week

Sir Frederick Pollock, the noted Englishman who is to deliver a series of five lectures at the University, will arrive in Iowa City Sunday evening October 11.

His first lecture will be given at 8 o'clock Monday evening following in the Assembly room of the hall of Liberal Arts and each of the succeeding lectures will be given at the same place at 2:30 of succeeding days.

Tickets will be issued to members of the college of law and others especially interested in the subjects touched upon and these will be good for seats until five minutes before the opening of the lecture, at which time the doors will be open to the public generally.

The general subject of the lectures given by Sir Frederick will be "The Expansion of the Common Law."

1. The Foundations of Justice.
2. The Scales of Justice.
3. The Sword of Justice.
4. The Law of Reason.

(a) The Law of Nature and of Nations.

(b) Natural Justice in the Common Law.

Sir Frederick will address the students and faculties generally at the weekly assembly on Wednesday morning. President George E. MacLean will give a reception in his honor at the President's home on Thursday evening.

## WILCOX OFF BOARD

### RESIGNS AS MEMBER OF BOARD OF CONTROL

Has Done Much For Iowa Athletics—Prof. Nutting Also Resigns

Professor E. A. Wilcox, president of the board of athletic control, has resigned from the board. His resignation has been accepted by President MacLean and Dean C. M. Gregory of the college of law, appointed in his place.

Prof. C. C. Nutting of the college of liberal arts has also resigned. His resignation has been accepted and Mr. Stephen N. Bush, instructor in French has been appointed to succeed him.

Professor Wilcox and Nutting were the ranking faculty members of the board of control in point of service and have rendered very important services for Iowa athletics.

Professor Wilson has been a member of the board of athletic control for four years and for three years has been president of the board. The amount of time and labor he has devoted to this position have been very great. He has labored both night and day for athletics and has accomplished very many valuable results.

One of his most important achievements has been securing the assent of Grinnell, Drake and Ames to the conference rules. This was obtained by Professor Wilcox next spring and was a result long desired by Iowa.

Professors Wilcox, Smith and Nutting were the members of the eligibility committee at the time of the Williams protest by Minnesota. Their course during this strenuous time has been most highly approved by the members of the conference. Professor Wilcox had charge of the preparation of Iowa's brief for Williams when he was tried by the conference and his argument on this occasion was most thorough and complete.

Professor Nutting has been a member of the board of athletic control for several years and has devoted much time and thought to athletic interests. For a year he has been chairman of the eligibility committee.

## RESIGNATION REGRETTED

"Professor Wilcox has been a most valuable member of the board," said Manager Spangler this noon.

"His resignation is news to me, as I had hoped he would consent to remain on the board another year, though the work required a great deal of time. Iowa is very deeply indebted to him for his services. His loss will be a great one to the board."

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
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**OFFICIAL BULLETINS**

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
