The Minneapolis Excursion Starts at Nine Tonight

The special train, which leaves tonight at 9 o'clock for Minneapolis, will consist of eight coaches. Two extra coaches were ordered from Chicago last night as the crowd is expected to be larger than was at first anticipated.

CEDAR RAPIDS ALUMNI

Two coaches will be added at Cedar Rapids where a crowd of Iowa alumni and supporters will join the excursion.

AN OPPORTUNITY

PRACTICE REASSURING

"The practice last evening on

Iowa field was reassuring," said Manager Spangler today, "The scrubs were pushed back easily and the way Macgowan and others went through the line certainly did look good.

When the scrubs were given the ball it was almost impossible for them to make their gain even with six downs allowed them. "Buck" Watters never showed up better in Iowa's championship days than he did last night as he broke through and got his man for ten and fifteen yard looses. Coulthard wasn't far behind him either."

TEAM WORK

Coach Chalmers has not been coaching stars but a team. They worked last night like a machine and every man did the work assigned him. Iowa will use formations tomorrow which have never been used on a Western gridiron and the gophers will have to think pretty fast to solve them.

The team leaves tonight at 9 o'clock at the old B. C. R. & N. depot. It will run on a thirty mile an hour schedule with but one stop at Cedar Rapids.

The Iowa headquarters at Minneapolis will be the West Hotel. The 1200 seats reserved for Iowa will be on sale there at 8 o'clock Saturday morning.

Collins Chosen

Edwin R. Collins '01 was unanimously elected as principal of the Iowa City high school to succeed Prof. Fitzpatrick, resigned. He has had the experience which makes him admirably fitted for the place. He attended the Afton, Mo., Normal school and Iowa Wesleyan University of Mt. Pleasant, and has a degree of B. S. from University of Iowa. He taught for a year in a normal school and for four years was superintendent of the Bloomfield Ia., schools. This is his second year of successful teaching in the Iowa City high school.

The Northwestern, the official paper at Evanston is an excellent example of enterprising editing and clean typography. The paper last year was published in weekly form but this year has been converted into a tri-weekly. It is the hope of the promoters of the paper to make a daily of it and the tri-weekly may be a step to that end. President James of Northwestern university is an enthusiastic promoter of college journalism and is partially responsible for the success of the Northwestern. One of the interesting features of the Northwestern is an excellent exchange column containing notes of interest from the leading western schools.

But a few weeks ago he was here at his old home with the other members of the family, well and strong. Schack, left tackle, and strength of the Minnesota line will be out of the game and no good substitute can be found. Minnesota's fullback is very weak and O'Brien and Davies can not stand many bumps. Iowa enthusiasts who want to bet must be prepared to lay down dollar for dollar.

Alec Sloan, one of Yost's old players, now writing sporting news, and some of his friends have been collaring all the odds in sight for a week, and are now taking even money. No crowd of Minnesota men asking for Iowans with money appeared at the West Hotel this morning, as did the Michigan men at the Cook hotel in Ann Arbor last year. The team reached Minnesota in excellent shape this morning. Two hours practice was held this afternoon.






