ATHLETES WILL RUN TO INSTALL TONIGHT WIDELY SCATTERED TEAM IS IMPROVING

CROSS COUNTRY CLUB TO REORGANIZE

Much Interest in the Sport and Good Prospects for Some Fast Men

Cross country running, the sport which proved so popular among the athletes of the State University last fall will be resumed again this year on a bigger scale than ever. A meeting of the Cross country club has been called for tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock in the general lecture room, hall of liberal arts, at which time members of the freshmen classes who wish to enter will be received. President Arthur Gordon urges a full attendance of old students and new ones.

It is expected that the Cross country runs will begin Saturday morning. Practice runs will be held frequently and the pace will be slow enough to enable any entry to get the full benefit of the sport. Two competitive runs will be held during the fall the winners of which will receive handsome silver loving cups as trophies.

Last years Cross country runs developed some exceptional runners from practically green material. Jeffers, although it was his first season won points at the state meet. He is looked upon to do still better this year. Riley a sophomore is also a very promising runner.

Dr. Eastman who will assist the long distance athletes hopes to arrange a series of Cross country contests with other universities during the fall.

FOOTBALL PROSPECTS ARE LOOKING BRIGHTER

Men Improving With Additional Practice—High School Stars Show Up Well

The followers of football at Iowa believe the chances for a winning team are improving daily. The showing the team has made in the games against Coe and Augustana college while not spectacular or brilliant lends the hope that there is plenty of good material which with a little hard training can be rounded into a first class team equal or perhaps better than that of last year.

The team is certainly far ahead now of what the last years team was at this stage of the season. The question of whether or not it will be better than last seasons team at the close depends entirely upon the possibilities in the material at hand. Last year's team was heavy and fast. This year's team will be fast but may not be quite as heavy.

In the first two games the Iowa team have shown great certainty and accuracy in handling the ball. Only one fumble in the Coe game when the grounds were wet and slippery is a fine record. In addition to this feature the men showed a good defense. Their only weakness was in getting off in a hurry and it is right to expect that this fault will be removed with a little more training. Coach Chalmers showed what he could do with a very small state last year and it is only reasonable to believe that he will get much from the outlay he has before him this year.

Iowa has had an encouraging influx of good players from Iowa high schools this year. Probably the four best high school teams in the state last year are represented in the Iowa squad this year by the captains of the high school teams. Captain Kent of Marshalltown is a good quarterback as is also Valerius of Davenport. Murphy of Ida Grove is a comer and Chalmers of Capital Park Des Moines and Jordon of West Des Moines have already made the team. From this start it is natural to expect that next year even more of the Iowa high school stars will cast their luck with the old gold.

Next Saturday afternoon the Iowa team will meet the team from Cornell college Mt. Vernon. It is expected that the game will be easy for Iowa because Cornell complains of poor material from which to form a team this year. Many of the old stars failed to return to school. However Iowa men will not complain if the game next Saturday is a light one for they want to be in first class condition for the contest on the following Saturday with the Drake

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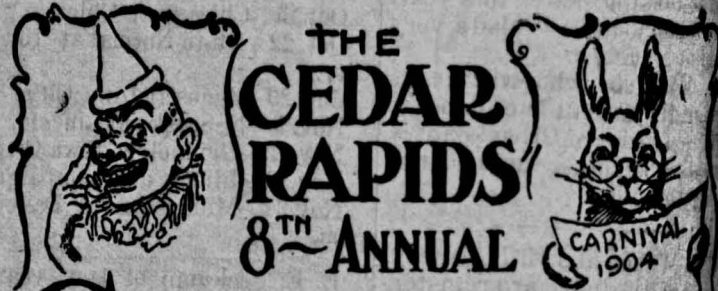

The attention of the cadets is invited to the following extract of the Regulations of the military department;

I. Twenty demerits will be awarded for an unauthorized absence from any military formation, ten demerits for being late at same, and a greater or less number for other offenses according to the degree. One hundred demerits suspends a student from the university.

II. Cadets desiring to be excused from drill on account of training for university teams must submit their applications to the commandant approved by director of physical culture failure to comply with this requirement will result in their being reported to the registrar as being absent without authority.

III. All cadets who for any reason desire their records of previous years corrected must report to the commandant at his office before Sept. 30 next. This notice includes those who have already spoken about the matter incidentally in order that a proper record may be made.
