quainted with Prof. Bolton's work, it would be almost incredible how many helpful and suggestive remarks he can make in this brief time.

His talk was just what his subject would cause one to expect, a direct and practical discussion as to what, when, how, and how much a student may reasonably try to study. To state the many important points presented, it would be necessary to reproduce almost the entire address, and for this space here is lacking. Some of the general principles laid down may be mentioned in a few words. How, when, and how much a student should study depends largely on his individual equation. Some study best at night, some before noon, some after noon. A good plan is to study any branch at the same hour every day, if possible. Mental habits are as important in life as are physical habits. Good physical health as a rule, is essential to the best mental activity. Each student should heed the injunction, "Know thyself," and having discovered his own personal equation, conform his habits of study to it.

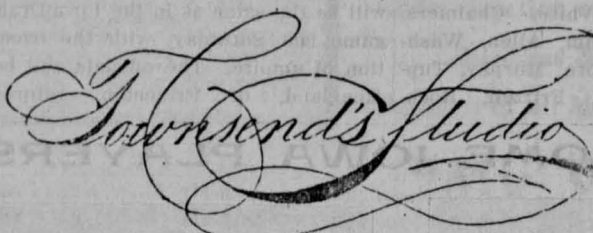
