Zets Win.

Get. Unanimous Decision of Judges.

The Minnesota preliminary was a success from all standpoints. The crowd, while not large, was better than is wanted to be in attendance at debates. The interest was maintained throughout and the debate was sharp and fiercely contested all the way through.

The affirmative argued that it is our duty to humanity and the only safe way to maintain the Monroe Doctrine is to exercise fiscal protectorate over the South or Central American republics if they fail to pay their debts. They said European countries could get an excuse to take possession of custom houses and trench itself, by delaying the collection, till it would be impossible for us to dislodge it. They said a new era is at hand, and that European countries are grasping for possession in South America as shown by European banks existing there and great increase of European trade as compared with American. Such a thing is practicable as shown by our own experience in San Domingo.

The negative denied that it is necessary for the United States to collect South American debts. They said the Monroe doctrine is sufficient to keep European powers from getting territorial possession. It has worked for seventy-five years. Either the Monroe doctrine must be sufficient or European powers are not attempting to get territory. They showed figures to prove that a large number of debts had been collected by European countries without their getting territory. They said such a thing is not only unnecessary but dangerous. It might compel us to keep an army and navy in one of the pestilential climates of the south. Such a policy as outlined by the question would compel us to collect between South American republics themselves. This would arouse distrust of our motives and bring on wars. Mixing would cause Europe to side with South America against us and lose us the support which Europe would gain. They asked if Chinese banks in London meant that China is trying to get possession of England. They denied that San Domingo is a case such as is meant by the question, for San Domingo had requested that we intervene.

After the speakers closed, Zets and Irvings vied with each other in the making of noise. To the tune of "We'll Ramble," the Zets sang:

"We'll argue, we'll argue;
We'll pass them down the line,
A single one at a time.
For we'll argue, we'll argue;
The way we'll beat the Irvings will be fine.

Zet! Zet! Zet!"

The decision of the judges, Professors Sloan and Houser and Dean Gregory, was unanimously in favor of the negative. Then the noise was all made by the Zets, who congratulated their debaters with proper enthusiasm.

The team will be picked by the societies, and will consist of two Zets and one Irving. It is probable that they will be Files, Brinton and Barnard.

The way the question was stated and interpreted made the affirmative side difficult to establish. It was as follows:

"Resolved, That the United States should assume a fiscal protectorate over and West Indian, Central or South American Republic manifesting a chronic failure to meet its foreign financial obligations."

It was affirmed by Irving, represented by C. R. Barnard, Walter Myers, W. T. Riley; was denied by etagathian debaters, Ray Files, W. T. Brinton, R. E. Cleveland.

GRADUATE CLUB.

significant trait of western life; to feel vividly things which concern not the petty affairs of the individual, but the welfare of the commonwealth or the race. This breadth of sympathy and of vision is the poetry of the westerner's material and laborious life, redeeming his crudity, his vanity and his often brutal energy."

It is worth reading the book to get this description alone.

From the trend of the story "Fairport" is Davenport. John Ivan Winslow, the son of a manufacturer, tracing his ancestry to the Mayflower, is born of a Russian princess with anarchistic tendencies, to whom the Elder Winslow was married while in Russia on a business trip. John Ivan inheriting the natures of both, lives that of his mother for the first quarter of a century, finds by experience that anarchistic theories fail to work out, having lived as Ivan Galutsian, Galutsian being his mother's maiden name, at length returns to the place of his birth and says, "I am John Winslow." Thus does he formally surrender to the laws of organized society.

"The Man of The Hour" is a study in sociology and a first rate story besides.
