The University of California held a punting contest Saturday, the winner receiving a punting cap which remains in his possession for a year. The contestants are required to kick the ball between the ten yard lines, being judged on accuracy and time in getting off as well as distance.

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Caring for Catholic Students.

The Catholic Student Movement at the universities of the country is growing wonderfully. The following facts have been collated.

Father Dooley has been appointed by Archbishop Farley, to build a Catholic Hall at Columbia university, New York City. He has been placed in charge of the parish and his special solicitude will be to care for the Catholic students. There are probably three hundred or more.

Rev. Charles O'Connor has been appointed assistant at St. Patrick's church, Iowa City, Iowa, and he will have the spiritual care of the Catholic students attending the State University.

Bishop McQuaid, of Rochester, N. Y., stands nearly ready to build a Catholic hall at Cornell University, Ithica, N. Y., to afford church facilities for the large number of university students.

At the university at Champaign, Ill., where the State University of Illinois is located, there is a project on foot to do likewise.

Archbishop Ireland has had for some time past a priest appointed whose particular duties are to care for the Catholic students of the University of Minnesota. At Columbus, Ohio, the Catholic students of the university have organized a Catholic club.

Both Harvard and Yale have had Catholic clubs for some years and special religious attention has been given to them. At Berkeley, Cal., Archbishop Riordan is about to do something that will be both practical and effective for the large number of Catholic students.

At the Wisconsin State University, Madison, Wis., Father Hengell has been appointed chaplain for the Catholic students by Archbishop Messmer. He is now raising funds to build a Catholic chapel.

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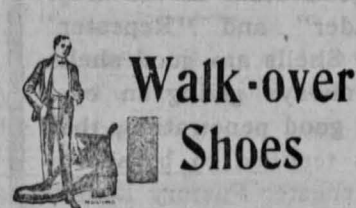
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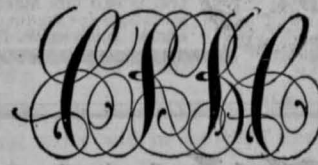
