IDA GROVE HOLDS FIRST PLACE

FORMER CHAMPIONS STILL IN THE LEAD.

Conditions Were Ideal For the Big Meet.—Harris the Individual Winner

One American interscholastic record, and four state records were smashed in the state high school meet which was held on Iowa Field Friday. Ida Grove carried off the honors for the third successive time, winning the meet with 45 points. West Des Moines high school pressed the three times champions closely with a total of 39 3-4 points.

Freeney of Ida Grove set a new interscholastic record in the pole vault by clearing the bar at 11 feet 4 3-8 inches breaking the former record of 11 feet 3 3-4 inches set by himself at Chicago last spring. All three place winners in the discus throw beat the state record, Alderman, the wonderful Marion weight man capturing the event with a throw of 121 feet 7 inches. Alderman and Phillips of West Des Moines, broke the state record in the hammer, Harris and Freeney smashed the broad jump record and the Ida Grove half mile relay team in the final and deciding event of the meet lowered the state mark to 1:36.

Harris of West Des Moines was in the best condition and won the individual medal by capturing four firsts. He defeated Ward, the Ida Grove crack, in the 100, 220 and 440 yard dashes by comfortable margins, running in superb form. His best jump was 21 feet 2 inches which gave him victory by a quarter of an inch from Freeney.

Hobbs of Grinnell won the mile run but was disqualified for tripping Webb of Marion, the only disagreeable feature of an otherwise perfect meet.

From the start of the first preliminary in the morning until the last man in the final relay crossed the tape, everything was auspicious for a field meet. The track was hard and fast, the slight breeze was at the runners backs at the finish, and the officiating was satisfactory. It was decidedly the most successful high school meet ever held in the state.

Commencement Plans Discussed— Arts and Crafts Exhibition is Abandoned.—Small Attendance.

The annual meeting of the Iowa City alumni was held in the Liberal Arts hall Friday evening. The attendance was so small as to be something of a reproach upon the spirit of Iowa City graduates. What the meeting lacked in size, however, it made up in interest. The suggestion was made that old papers and programs connected with the early history of the University be collected and placed upon exhibition during commencement week. One document that was offered for this purpose was the first paper printed by University students, something over fifty years ago. This paper was the very first of college journalism west of the Mississippi.

Other plans were discussed for making the local alumni more active, both socially and in the general interests of the University.

The Arts and Crafts exhibit, which was projected some time ago, was not even discussed at the meeting, so it may be assumed that it will not be further agitated at this late hour.

A FLOOD COMING.

U. S. Laboratory in Chemistry Building to be Deluged with Water Samples.

The branch water laboratory of the U. S. Geological Survey at Athens, Ga., having been discontinued, owing to the reduction in the appropriation for the water investigations of the Survey made by Congress at its last session, a portion of the work of that laboratory will in future be carried on at the Iowa City station.

The Iowa City laboratory was established about the first of October last, its chief function being the making of analyses in connection with the investigation of the quality of river waters of the Mississippi Valley. Samples of water

Medical Museums Combine For Mutual Advantage.—S. U. I. a Charter Member.

Dr. Henry Albert has returned from the East where he attended the American Association of Pathologists and Bacteriologists and the American Anti-Tuberculosis Association in Washington, and the celebration of the Semi-Centennial of the Pathological Society of Philadelphia.

A number of distinguished foreign pathologists were present at the Washington meeting and an International Association of Medical Museums was organized, the University of Iowa being enrolled as one of the active charter members. From the organization of this association our pathological museum will be able to obtain specimens of diseased conditions from all parts of the world.

The American Anti-Tuberculosis League is now making arrangements for an International Congress of Tuberculosis which will be held in this country next year, and which is intended to make one of the largest and most significant ever held.

Coe's crack tennis team went down to defeat before Iowa yesterday on the University courts losing five matches out of the six played. Fast tennis marked the days play Iowas players being in better form than at any time this year.

The feature of the tournament was the defeat of Culbertson and Ferguson, the crack Coe pair by Captain Oliver and Sieg. This match turned the tide in Iowa's favor and made final victory easy. Captain Oliver made a game fight against Culbertson in the singles but lost 1-6, 3-6.

Ferguson the second best man on the Coe team won the first set from Sieg in their match in singles but the Iowa player rallied well and took the second set after a hard struggle. The final set went to Sieg easily 6-2.

Besides the Oliver-Culbertson match two other matches in singles were played in the morning, Iowa winning both. Darland won from Hitchcock 6-3, 7-6, 6-2 and Harwood defeated Williamson 9-7, 6-3.

The double matches and the Sieg Ferguson match were played after lunch. Iowa's second victory in doubles came when Darland and Harwood defeated Hitchcock and Williamson.

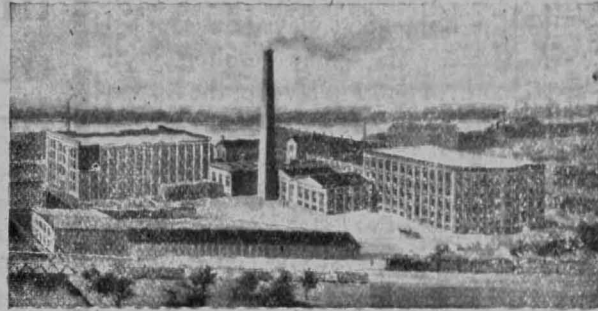

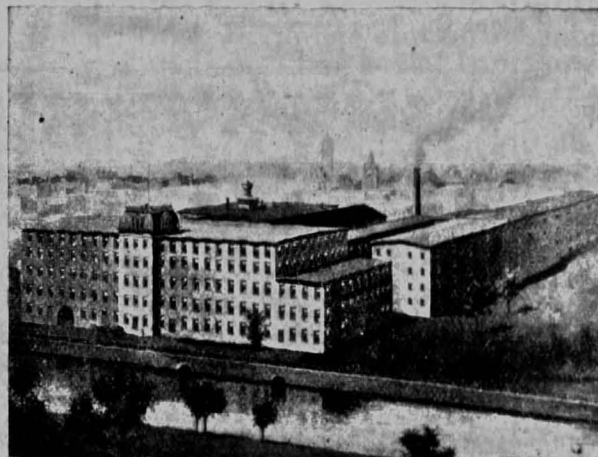

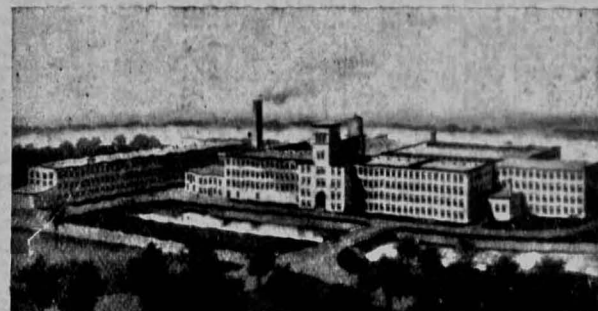
