CLUB WOMEN WILL JOIN GIRLS' RALLY

Iowa City Organizations to be Represented

One Delegate Will be Sent From Each Club—Girls' Base Ball Game a Novel Feature

The Women's Clubs of Iowa City are all preparing to send representatives to the Women's Building rally next Saturday evening. Much interest has been aroused among the club women of the city over the Women's Building movement and each society will send one representative to the rally. The enthusiasm aroused by the girls has spread even more than could be hoped for at first and it is no wonder that the committee is so jubilant. With the club women of Iowa City and the state backing up their project, the girls feel that something material will surely come of the movement.

"We most heartily welcome the representatives from the women's clubs of the city," said Dean Volland yesterday, when speaking of the affair. "We only regret we cannot have them all with us and have to limit the number to one representative from each club on account of lack of room."

The representatives for the rally of the various clubs of the city have been appointed by their presidents as follows: Nineteenth Century, Mrs. G. W. Ball; Athens Historical Club, Mrs. H. F. Wickham; Art Circle, Mrs. Inis Lee; Woman's Improvement League, Mrs. Geo. T. Reddick; Shakespeare Club, Mrs. Will Musser; P. E. O. Club, Mrs. John Whetstone; Elder Daughters, Mrs. A. E. Swisher; Alumni Association, Mrs. J. W. Rich; Alumnus Magazine, Mrs. Kate Rogers.

One of the features to be pulled off before the rally is to be a game of baseball between two of the girls' fastest teams. The game will be called Friday at 3:30 p. m. in the girls' gymnasium. The admittance, which is to be only for the girls, will be ten cents, the proceeds to go to the rally fund. Mr. E. G. Schroeder, instructor in physical training, will umpire.

SHAMBAUGH AT ASSEMBLY

Head of Political Science Department Spoke on "Inspiration," the Religion of Amana

Professor Benjamin F. Shambaugh addressed the University students yesterday morning at Assembly on "Inspiration," the religion of the Amana settlements west of Iowa City.

He spoke of the organization and purpose of the "Community of True Inspiration" established November 14, 1714. In part he said: "In twenty-five years the movement had received many followers. In 1818 the community found a home in Amana. They selected Buffalo, New York, as the location of the colony and called it Ebenezer.

"In 1854-62 they sought for a new location for the settlement further west. They finally decided on Iowa County, Iowa, as the ideal place for their settlement. With the motto "Bleib Treu," the Amana settlement has made a very successful growth. These people have accomplished every hope, inspiration and desire they sought. At present the colony has a population of 1800 and an assessed property valuation of \$2,000,000."

Professor Shambaugh concluded his interesting address with an appeal to the student body to get the spirit of the Amana settlement. "If it is possible for such a community to realize every inspiration, hope, material prosperity, independence, and freedom in religion, it surely can be accomplished by the average citizen," was the gist of his appeal.

NUMBER OF PATIENTS REACHES THIRTY-EIGHT

Tuberculosis Hospital Steadily Filling

Thirty-eight patients are now being cared for in the State Tuberculosis Hospital located north of Iowa City. One man was sent home a short time ago with his disease pronounced arrested; another gained six pounds in one week. Such things as these point to a great success for the institution.

The interurban railroad line on which the hospital is situated is now building a new station for the accommodation of the sanatorium. Visitors are welcome to inspect the work on Wednesdays and Sundays.

The farm surrounding is being worked to the best advantage of the institution. What patients are able spend some of their time working in the gardens. Nine cows, which were thoroughly inspected, supply plenty of good milk which is a chief factor in the food of the inmates.

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COMMITTEES TO HELP ENTERTAIN ATHLETES

New System Adopted for Caring for Visitors

Pan Hellenic Committee to Check up List—County Officers will Look After Others

According to a plan now under way the Greater University committee and the Pan Hellenic committee will co-operate with the Iowa Board in Control of Athletics in taking care of the visiting high school athletes and students who will come here Saturday, May 16, to the first annual inter-scholastic meet.

At its meeting this evening at 7 o'clock the Greater University committee will divide the names on the entry lists into counties and on Saturday letters will be mailed to the county officers of the S. U. I. county clubs in the respective counties of the visiting high schoolers and by this system every visiting man will be well taken care of.

Yesterday notices were sent out to the eight collegiate fraternities in the University to announce a meeting of the Pan Hellenic committee for tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock at the Phi Kappa Psi house to check up the list of men already invited by the fraternities. The remaining names will be apportioned as mentioned above among the county club officers.

Letters have also been written to two of the professional school fraternities by the Athletic Board asking for co-operation and the president of the girls' Pan Hellenic association has also been asked to make suggestions on the best methods of entertaining the high school girl visitors.

PLANS FOR M. V. FIELD MEET

Arrangements Being Made For Big Gathering of Athletes May 23, at Kansas City

The first annual meet scheduled by the Missouri Valley Conference for Kansas City, the 23d of this month is expected to surpass all meets ever held west of Chicago.

The schools entered are Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri, Ames, Drake, and Washington University. There will be no invitation events this year, but possibly this feature may be added in other meets. All the schools are to furnish thirty athletes.

Grounds have not yet been decided upon, though Elm Ridge Driving Club Park is favored by the committee. Martin A. Delaney of the Kansas City Athletic Club has been selected as clerk of the course. Fred Stone, an experienced starter from Chicago, will probably be given that position in the meet.

The preliminary entries were closed yesterday and the finals will end the 13th. This is the first time that Iowa schools ever competed in Kansas City. Special trains will be run from the different conference schools and several thousand collegians are expected to attend.

TRI DELTA MATRON EXPIRES SUDDENLY

Seized with a sudden attack of heart failure, Mrs. S. E. Bereman, matron of the Delta Delta Delta sorority house was discovered dying at one o'clock yesterday morning by members of the sorority. Dr. Chase was hastily summoned, but could do nothing for the stricken women.

The body was removed to Mt. Pleasant, the former home of Mrs. Bereman, yesterday morning, and it is probable the funeral will take place some time today. Mrs. Bereman was about 60 years old and came to Iowa City last fall to take charge of the Tri Delta sorority house. She was a sister of Mrs. Dr. Chase.

CORNHUSKERS DEFEAT HAWKEYES 5 TO 2

Nebraska Bunch Their Hits—Iowa Weak at Stick

Both Teams Fielded Slow—Beltzer Stars at Bat for Visitors—Ward Pitches Well

In a featureless game Nebraska defeated Iowa yesterday afternoon by a score of 5 to 2, chiefly through inability to hit at the proper time. Both teams made numerous errors, but Iowa seemed unable to hit at the crucial moment.

In the second inning it seemed certain that Nebraska would score. Hanlon passed the first two men and then Denslow binged out a single but fast work in the field prevented a score. Bellamy was put out at third when he would have scored a minute later as the next man was passed. In the third Nebraska scored one on two singles and a stolen base.

There were no scores on the Iowa side until the fourth when Kirk's stolen base and an error and passed ball gave the Hawkeyes one. Iowa scored again in the fifth on two singles and an error.

There was nothing doing in the scoring line until the seventh when the cornhuskers garnered two or three hits and a sacrifice. One score was added to the Nebraskan's pile in both the eighth and ninth. In each inning there was a two-bagger and an error.

Iowa didn't stand much chance of scoring after the fifth, the players generally proving easy outs.

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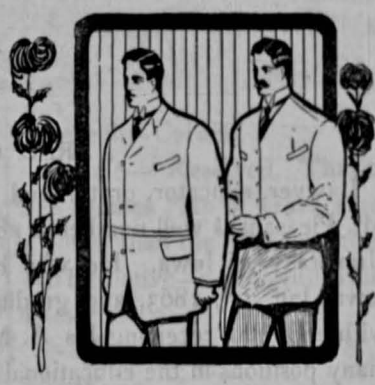
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CALVIN WAS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF ACADEMY

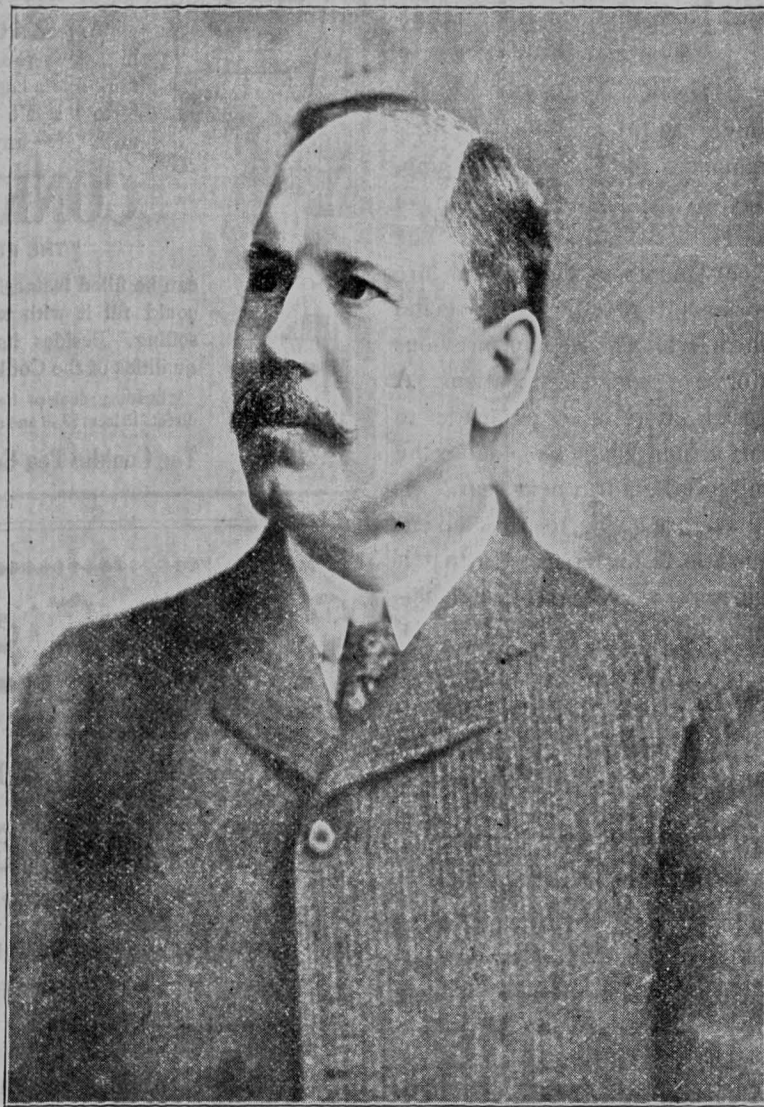
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PROMINENT ALUMNI--No. 26

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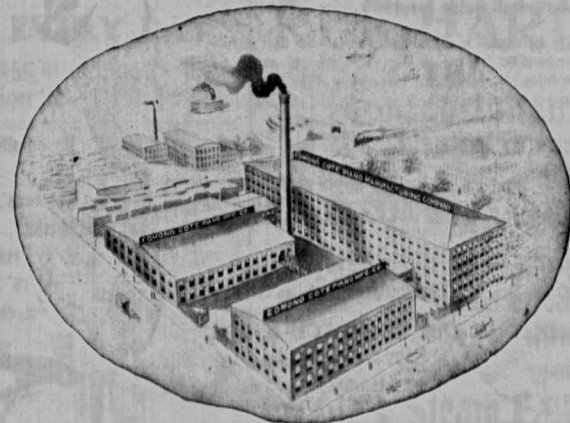
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
