University Dramatic Club Will Give Production Saturday Night—Dress Rehearsals

The comedy "The Necessity of Being Earnest" will be presented by the amateurs and from the amount of preliminary training it is expected that the play will rank with the best ever given by the organization.

He negotiated with the management of Greene's opera house at Cedar Rapids when the club decided to give the play and completed arrangements for the transportation of the Cedar Rapids scenery to the local opera house for this play.

This is the first spring in some time that the University Dramatic Club has attempted two plays and the organization has received compliments from faculty and students on the progressive spirit shown by this year's club.

### ORDERS ARE ISSUED CONCERNING MARCH

#### Commandant C. W. Weeks Making Preparations

Details of Requirements for Going on Practice "Jaunt" May 23-24-25—Equipment

The military department is busily engaged in making preparations for the practice march the last of this month and yesterday Commandant C. W. Weeks issued the following orders:

May 7, 1908

#### General Orders, No. 12

1. The following orders concerning the practice march and encampment of this regiment, to take place May 23, 24, 25, and 26, are published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

This march and encampment is not compulsory, but all those who do not participate will be required to pass an examination to determine their fitness to receive credit in this department, Freshmen being examined in Drill Regulations and Manual of Guard Duty, and Sophomores in Field Service Regulations and Firing Regulations.

2. Each man participating in the march is required to deposit with the commandant before the hour of departure, the sum of three dollars to be used under his direction for the purpose of defraying necessary expenses of the march, such as, rations, transportation of supplies, etc. Any residue from this amount after all bills are paid, and the accounts have been audited by a committee to consist of one man to be appointed by the captain of each company, and one from the band, will be returned to those contributing.

3. Aside from the articles carried on the person, the following articles should be taken by each cadet; two blankets or quilts, a rubber blanket or coat, extra shoes, underwear, towel, soap, comb, brush, and tooth-brush. The gray uniform and cap will also be carried. These articles, packed in bundles or grips with the name and company of the owner plainly attached thereto, will be deposited in a car to be located by the quartermaster on the morning of May 23rd.

4. Canteens will be obtained at the office of the Commandant on or before the morning of the march. These canteens have been secured for the march and

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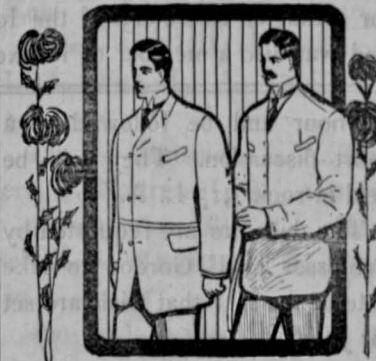

MARSH W. BAILEY

Marsh W. Bailey was born at Richmond, Washington county, Iowa, March 9, 1870. He took the degree of Bachelor of Arts from the State University of Iowa in 1893. Admitted to the bar in 1894, he has practiced at Washington, since. He was city solicitor of Washington, 1895 to 1901, and county attorney of Washington county, 1901 to 1905. He was candidate for judge of the district court in 1906, but was unsuccessful in the convention.

Mr. Bailey is Republican in politics. He was vice president of the American Republican College League in 1892 and presided over its national convention at Louisville, Kentucky, in 1893. He served for a time as Secretary of the Iowa League of Republican Clubs and was also a member of its executive committee.
