HAVE RE-ORGANIZED COLLEGE Y. M. C. A.

Cabinet and Advisory Board Enlarged

Officers Elected for Coming Year
—Secretary will be Chosen
This Coming Year

A plan to completely reorganize the Young Men's Christian Association and put it on a greater and more effective working basis has been adopted for the coming year. Each college will have its Y. M. C. A. president; strong leaders, who will have charge and be responsible for the work in that particular college. These men working in conjunction with the University Y. M. C. A. will centralize the work and increase the membership and strength of the association.

The Advising Board, by a recent change in its constitution has been increased from five to fifteen members. This desirable change allows a representative chosen annually, from each Evangelical church, thereby bringing the church and association into a strong and harmonious league. The Board has the power of electing a secretary and acting in a general advising capacity. At a business meeting next week the secretary for the coming year will be chosen and it is thought present Secretary H. L. Heinze-man, who is very popular with the students will be asked to return.

The Cabinet has also been enlarged to carry out the plans and officers for the year have been elected.

The general officers are: P. W. Van Meter, president; G. H. Twining, vice-president; C. W. Carr, treasurer; G. L. Kirkpatrick, assistant treasurer.

The chairmen of the committees are: G. A. Chickering, Bible Study; J. C. Mundt, Religious Meetings; R. W. Sleeter, Social; Ben Butler, Membership; A. V. Ingham, Extension.

The Association presidents for the colleges are: Earl Stewart, Liberal Arts; E. H. Bailey, Engineering; W. M. Storey, Dental; R. H. Gross, Homeopathic. There are three more committee chairmen and a Law College president to be chosen.

PROMINENT EDUCATOR DEAD

Rev. Dr. Stephen N. Fellows
Expires of Diabetes—Filled
Many Iowa Pulpits

Establishing the first chair of didactics in the United States, Dr. Stephen N. Fellows, who died here early yesterday morning of diabetes, at the age of 78 years, was a prominent educator and for twenty years was a member of the University of Iowa faculty.

During his lifetime he was many times honored by the world of religion and education. He filled pulpits at Dyersville, Tipton, Marshalltown, and other cities at different times. He was a member of the Advisory Council of Religion at Chicago. He was a president of the State Temperance Association and one of the organizers of the State Temperance Alliance.

His connection with the University was from 1867 to 1887. He was at one time principal of the normal department.

Dr. Fellows was a member of the Upper Iowa Conference, having held the position since 1856. One of his latest labors was the publication of a volume entitled "Fifty Years of the Upper Iowa Conference."

The funeral services will be held Friday afternoon. Rev. R. D. Parsons of Mt. Vernon will participate in the services. Dr. Fellows leaves a widow, one daughter, Ora, of Iowa City, two sons, Olin and Albion living in the east.

Team Will Play Drake and Grinnell This Week

Burrell to Pitch Against Drake
and Sutherland Against Grinnell—Carberry out of Game

Friday morning the Varsity baseball team leaves for Des Moines where a second game will be played with Drake University baseball team. On Saturday the squad jumps back to Grinnell for the final contest of this season and the men will break training after the game with the Scarlet and Black.

"I expect two hard games" said Coach Maurice Kent yesterday. "Both Drake and Grinnell have good left handers in McCoy and Smithson. These two games wind up the season."

Burrell will probably pitch against Drake as he was effective against the Christians on the local diamond and Sutherland will probably be pitted against the mighty Smithson at Iowa College. Hanlon, early in the season the best pitcher on the squad will be taken on the trip. Since the track season has ended he has resumed baseball practice and will be in condition to relieve either of the other two pitchers. Hanlon abandoned his baseball to run the relays in the two field meets.

The outfield will suffer a shake-up in the last two games owing to the death of Carberry's grandfather at Panora. The right fielder will be detained all week and Bechtel will fill in his position. The infield will be intact and Captain Kirk will finish his last season behind the bat, as a member of an U. of I. team.

McGuire has a bad finger which has caused him trouble but with this exception the team is in good condition for the two remaining games on the schedule.

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The Greater University Committee is about to end its first **RECORD OF GREATER UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE** existence. Its existence has been justified and its future assured by things actually accomplished. A committee on the order of this Greater University Committee, attempting the big projects that it did, found certain difficulties and obstacles in its way. Some things that the Committee found necessary to learn were learned only by actual experience. For instance, it required a certain length of time for the Committee to acquire the correct unity of interests, "team work" in other words. It was found out that only one thing at a time could be considered and that there was a great danger of having too many irons in the fire. Finally a clear discrimination in the choice of projects and an ability to go ahead and do was gained only by experience, by success and by failure.

The Greater University Committee has completed the County Clubs into a definite organization, it has instituted the "University Dinner" as an annual affair, it has started the Iowa Union plan, it acquired a creditable Greater University Committee Fund and it did good service in the entertainment of visiting athletes at the Invitation Meet. This is not a wonderful list of achievements, but it meant work and time on the part of the Committee members.

Next year greater things will be attempted and the year after that still greater things. In fact, no halt will be made until the goal of a truly "Greater University" is reached. Credit is due to the Greater University Committee, not perhaps for what it has already accomplished, but what it has started.

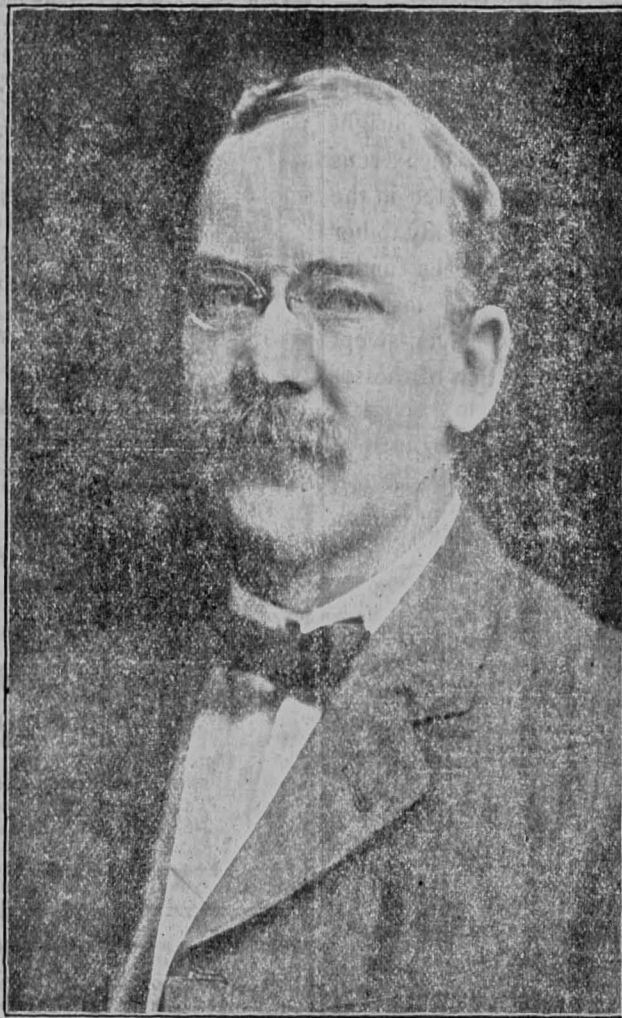

PROMINENT ALUMNI--No. 38



W. R. PATTERSON

Dr. W. R. Patterson was born near Cedar Falls and received his early education in the rural schools of Iowa. In 1892 he was graduated from the State Normal School at Cedar Falls and for one year engaged in the profession of teaching. Between the years of 1893 and 1895 he studied in the State University of Iowa, receiving his degree from the College of Liberal Arts in 1895.

In 1895 Dr. Patterson entered the Wharton School of Economics and Finance of the University of Pennsylvania and in 1897 studied abroad, chiefly in Berlin. Returning in 1898 he received his Ph. D. from the University of Pennsylvania. The subject of his thesis was "An Investigation of Pawn Shops in Europe."

Having received the appointment of Instructor of Economics in 1898, Dr. Patterson returned to the State University of Iowa. In 1900 he was made Assistant Professor of Economics and in 1901 accepted a call to New York City to serve as Expert Statistician in the then new Tenement Department. After two years' absence, he returned to Iowa to be Professor of Commerce and Statistics. This position he resigned in February, 1906, and again accepted a call to New York City to take part in the organization of a bureau of Municipal Statistics. Pending the organization of this Bureau, under the title of the Bureau of Municipal Research, he served as expert Accountant for the firm of Haskin and Sells. Since the organization of the Bureau of Municipal Research in New York City Dr. Patterson has been Chief Statistician and one of the expert accountants of that Bureau.

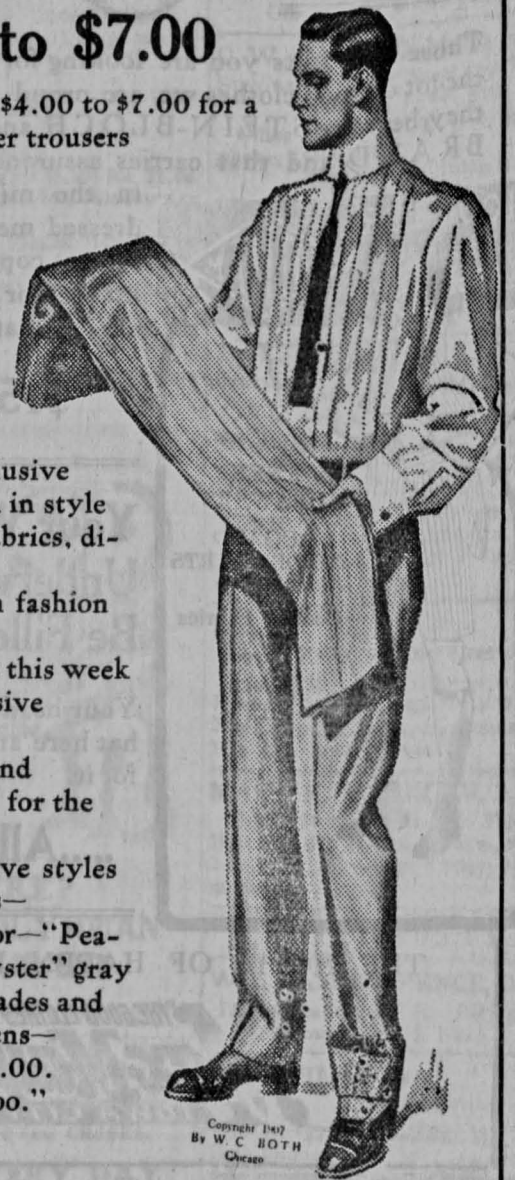
