WISCONSIN AND IOWA DEBATERS COMPARED

RECORDS OF MEN WHO DEBATE AT THE AUDITORIUM FRIDAY

Close and Hard-Fought Contest is Expected—Badgers are Strong on Debate and Oratory

A comparison of the records of the Wisconsin and Iowa teams which meet in debate on Dec. 11th at the auditorium shows that one of the best debates of years may be expected. Wisconsin, always strong in debate, is represented by a team chosen only after a thorough trial of all the debating material to be found in the university. The records of the men follow:

Walter M. Atwood is a junior in the college of Pharmacy, and a member of the Athenae Literary society. He took part in the freshman and Sophomore class debates and won the Stensland prize in debate in 1907. He also participated in the final oratorical contest. This is his first inter-collegiate debate.

Hal R. Martin, a junior in the college of Letters and Science, is a graduate of the Stevens Point Normal school. He took part in the Stevens Point-Milwaukee Normal debate in 1906, and won the Stevens Point Oratorical contest in 1907. He is the junior orator from Athenae for 1908. This is the first inter-collegiate debate as a representative of Wisconsin. He is a member of Athenae Literary society.

Gerhard A. Graelle is a graduate student in economics in the college of Letters and Science. He is a graduate of Stevens Point Normal school, which he represented in debate with Milwaukee Normal in 1905 and with Oshkosh Normal in 1906. He represented Athenae society in joint debate with Philomatheia Society in 1907. This is the first debate in which he has represented Wisconsin.

A comparison with the records of the Iowa team shows that the two are about equal in experience.

George A. Luxford, of Harlan, the leader of the Iowa team, is a member of Zetagathian Literary society. He was a member of the Iowa team which defeated Illinois last year. His work in the try-outs last spring earned him the honor of leading the team against Wisconsin. Mr. Luxford is a senior in the College of Liberal Arts and a senior in the College of Law. He is a member of the Delta Sigma Rho forensic fraternity, of the Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity, and of the Wendell Phillips Club. He is president of Zetagathian society, of the republican club, and is the winner of the Lowden third third prize in debate, 1907.

Clyde Robbins of Cedar Rapids is a junior in the college of Liberal Arts, and a member of Zetagathian society. He was the leader of the Zetagathian freshman team in the joint debate with Irving in 1907.

MARY WOOD CHASE SPEAKS BEFORE HUMANIST SOCIETY

Lecturer Tells of the Relation of Music to Culture

Miss Mary Wood Chase, head of the instrumental department in the School of Music, lectured yesterday on "Music and Culture," before the Humanist society. The lecturer said in part: "Music as an art is sometimes considered a display of the skill of the composer. But it is truly valuable as an influence, when it expresses spirit and emotions of humanity. Music is an expression of life in art forms, it does not try to imitate nature, but the emotions. It is the language of emotion.

"We exist by the real, but live by the ideal. Thus the sublime and beautiful combined are necessary to complete the aesthetic education. It enlarges the sympathies and understanding of men.

"Music expresses a truth, just as poetry, painting, architecture, or literature does. The pure music is uplifting and elevating and it is only when combined with the other arts, that it can be sordid.

"In all colleges and universities there should be a place for the study of music as well as for the literature of music and musicians."

MORE HIGH SCHOOLS ADDED TO U. ACCREDITED LISTS

Graduates of Such Institutions Admitted Without Examination

By a recent University action a number of high schools have been added to the accredited and partially accredited lists. The high schools of Correctionville, New Sharon, Sabula, Tabor, Prairie City, Pomeroy and Randolph have been fully accredited for one year. At the end of that time, satisfactory progress being indicated, the condition will be removed and the schools will be classified as permanently accredited. To the partially accredited list have been added the high schools of Emerson, Essex, Faragut, Lineville, Manson, Marcus and Sioux Center. Graduates from these schools will be received in the University and given full credit without examination for all subjects properly classified by the principal. Most of these schools are in direct line of advancement to the fully accredited list.

CANADIANS HAVE MANY ENGLISH MANNERISMS

FRANKLIN THOMAS WRITES AN INTERESTING LETTER.

Canadians Delight in Winter Sports — Displayed Enthusiasm in Our National Election.

In a recent letter to Dean Raymond, Franklin Thomas, B. E., '08, has the following interesting things to say concerning life at McGill University:

"I have never been among people before who anticipate winter with so much pleasure as they do here. They seem to bear with the other seasons just because they must. All kinds of winter sports are possible on account of the uniformity of the weather, and are enjoyed by everyone. Hockey matches cause as much interest as a pennant series of base-ball games does in Chicago.

"The United States elections were watched with a great deal of interest here. On the night of election day, I attended a concert given by The Sheffield Choir from Sheffield, England. During the evening a bulletin was displayed announcing the election of Mr. Taft, and the enthusiasm it caused was surprising to me, and certainly must have made the English feel that the Canadians were more interested in Uncle Sam's affairs than was proper."

"McGill had a distinguished visitor recently in the person of Lord Milner who has been touring Canada. A special convocation was held and the degree Doctor of Laws conferred. As usual the students provided considerable entertainment. As the stately convocation procession in their scarlet gowns and many colored hoods entered, the fellows (who, by the way, sit down stairs here) stood up and sang to the tune of the Doxology, "Good morning, have you used Pear's soap?", and in lieu of an Amen sang "Sapolio." It was so ridiculous that even the procession was forced to smile."

"Early in each year McGill observes 'Theater Night.' The Students' Council buys the house of one of the theaters and sells it out to the University people. The first and second years wear fantastic red and white kilt costumes and make a parade through town led by a band and make a display of fireworks. The affair was very successful this year and was quite orderly. It is a source of considerable income to the Students' Council. This council is composed of the presidents of the representative organizations and is a supreme court in all matters of discipline, besides supervising University athletics and other enterprises

"Quite a number of the faculty men are English and a few English traditions are observed. Among them the wearing of gowns at classes. The instructors invariably wear them and the students in Arts and

Law. Fortunately the Engineers are spared. The lecture system is used almost entirely here, and until examination, to which they attach great importance, comes, the faculty know little of the student's standing. The passing grade is 40, but the marking is very strict.
