ENTERTAIN THE HIGH

Now is the time for Iowa students to prepare for the inter-scholastic meet to be held here May 15. This being an invitation meet, it devolves upon the students to aid in entertaining visiting athletes.

Seventeen schools participated last year and a great many more are expected to enter this year. Thus for the majority of the visitors this will be the first glimpse of Iowa University and her life.

The Board of Control have the lion's share of the responsibility and it is depending upon the students in general to render positive assistance in entertaining the visiting athletes. Nothing much need be said about the urgency of the fraternities and country clubs doing their share in this work and students outside of these organizations will have the opportunity to assist, which they should not neglect to improve.

Much of the success of this as well as the future meets depends upon the support shown this year. It is easy to see how track prospects of Iowa for coming years are very considerably affected by the impression left upon the visiting high school students.

The meet means a great deal to Iowa. It can bear much fruit in the realization of a greater University.

The only way to show the visitors a good time is to give every one of them personal attention. Fill every minute of their time with some form of entertainment; show them the University as it really is and also give them a picture of the greater University of the future.

Every effort possible should be made to show Iowa University spirit in its true light. Enthusiasm is catching. Make clear that you have it in something more than dormant form. Then our high school visit-

ors, catching the spirit, will go away resolved to return as students to the university of their own state.

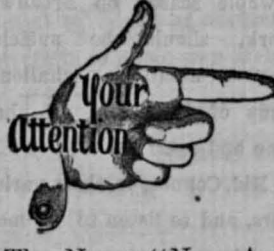

making a transcript of Col. Henry Dodge's military order book. This contains a note-book of 180 pages, written in the years 1833-36.

Henry Dodge was a noted Indian fighter, one of the heroes of the Black Hawk war, a western explorer, and governor of the original territory of Wisconsin when Iowa was a part thereof. The document is in his own peculiar hand-writing and contains orders to ranger captains and to officers of the U. S. Dragoons. There are recorded talks with Indians and accounts of marches and garrison duty, drills and camp life. The document is in possession of the Historical Department at Des Moines and is at present being used in preparation of a biography of Henry Dodge.
