## LARGE CROWD HERE FOR COMMENCEMENT

NEW FEATURES CAUSE STUDENTS TO REMAIN.

Frolic Day and Athletic Contests Arousing Much Interest. Program in Full.

Because of the new features planned for this year's commencement, it is expected that a larger crowd of students will remain in Iowa City for it than ever before. One of the innovations is Frolic Day when the seniors of the different colleges will compete for honors in athletic contests. Commencement extends from Friday, June 11, to the following Wednesday. Below is the full program of the five days' events:

## CONFERENCE BOARD MEETS: ADOPTS IMPORTANT RULES.

Is Lenient Toward Freshman Athletics Who Flunk.

At a meeting of the "Big Eight" conference board held in Chicago last Saturday morning, several important topics were discussed and three or four new measures adopted. The entire board was present and the representatives spent the greater part of the morning in making certain rules now in operation still clearer.

Probably the most important and still more surprising measure passed was that of allowing athletes who flunk in their freshman year to take part in the athletics the next year if they make up the deficiencies. This ruling will have a definite effect upon athletics in the "Big Eight" inasmuch as several good men have heretofore been barred from teams because of deficiency in work.

Tennis was also recognized as a conference sport and letters will hereafter be granted to those taking part in interscholastic matches. Another minor action was that of the adoption of a fixed order of events for conference dual meets.

Funny Magazine Planned.

Earl Stewart and Carl Byoir are planning, as editor and business manager, to start a new funny magazine entitled the "Haw Haw Hawkeye." Martin Smith is also to be connected with the business end of the project. Probably the publication will not be started until next September though the projectors are considering the feasibility of an issue during commencement week. Similar magazines are published in other universities, for instance the "Minnehaha."

Install New Chapter.

Carl Byoir and E. C. Robbins went to Beloit, Wisconsin, yesterday to install a chapter of Delta Sigma Rho, the honorary debating fraternity. The charter was granted at the last convention.

MacLean at Boston.

President G. E. MacLean attended the inauguration of the new president of the Boston Institute of Technology yesterday. On Wednesday President MacLean will deliver the commencement address of Syracuse University.

Improvements Tied Up.

Pending the action of the new state board of education improvements on the university campus, with the exception of the Law building are practically tied up. Nothing definite could be mapped out by the retiring board and future work depends upon the will of the new body.

Rapid progress is being made in the erection of the Law building. Work has been started on the roof this week. If no difficulty is met with the building will be ready for use November 1st.

CONTEST SCHEDULED FOR TUESDAY MORNING.

Last Game of the Season—Grads are Enthusiastic over Contest—Kent and Cobb in Box.

On Tuesday, June 15, those who stay for commencement will once more have a chance to see those old stars of the diamond who gladdened the hearts of Hawkeye rooters perform on Iowa field. Coach "Chick" Kirk has arranged to pit his bunch of young hopefuls against a team made up of famous "I" men.

A dozen or more of grads have signified their intention of returning to participate in the game, and a strong line-up is assured. Several of the old men have kept in training and are well qualified to give the '09 team a live game of full nine innings. Those who are expected to return for the final contest of the school year are as follows:

Clyde Williams, Ames, third base; L. D. Dennis, Cedar Rapids, catcher; Leslie Storey, Cedar Rapids, right field; J. U. Yessler, Cedar Rapids, second base; Dr. James McGregor, Downey, short stop; Hal Reynolds, Bedford, center field; "Morey" Kent, Waterloo, pitcher; Dr. Harry Gibbs, Kensett, second base; "Chick" Kirk, Iowa City, left field and catch; E. Vandersteeg, Iowa City, second base and center field; C. E. Wilson, Correctionville, third base; and Edwin Cobb, Independence, pitcher.

With the present coach, Kirk, behind the bat, and the box artists, Kent and Cobb, tossing the ball, Iowa's heavy hitters are expected to have their hands full.

The game will be pulled off Tuesday morning, June 15.

Chemistry Professors Resign.

The following members of the chemical staff have resigned their positions in the university to accept higher salaried chairs in other colleges: Assistant Prof. Powell leaves to become professor of chemistry and physics at the South Dakota Normal school. Instructor Guy G. Tracy has accepted an assistant professorship at the University of South Dakota. Instructor Frederick A. Hull will be in charge of chemistry and physics at Mercersburg Academy, Pennsylvania, Ralph C. Huston, Fellow in Chemistry, is to be an instructor at Washington State College, Pullman, Washington.

It is to be regretted that these men are to leave Iowa as they have proved themselves to be valuable teachers and have made many friends who will be sorry to see them go.

## BASEBALL HOPES HIGH: STRONG TEAM IN 1910

FEW OLD MEN GO—FRESHMEN LOOK GOOD.

Bechtel and McGuire Only Veterans to Leave—Great Material in First Year Team.

With the baseball season ended except for a possible encounter with Grinnell and the commencement week game with the old-timers, the dopest's thoughts naturally turn to our prospects for next year. This is, like all other "dope," very uncertain; yet it is hard to see how Iowa can have other than a strong team from the abundance of material now in sight.

To begin with, it now seems that only two, or possibly three, of this year's fast aggregation will be missing when the first call for candidates comes next spring. These two men are Bechtel, left fielder and utility third-sacker, who graduates from the college of law, and McGuire, who played last season at short, started this year in center field, and took up Stewart's duties as second baseman and acting captain when the leader was hurt in the second game with Ames. These men are certain to be missed, but it should be possible to fill their places satisfactorily. Kohl may also go, but it looks now as if the little flyer would be back causing nervous trouble among the opposing catchers as in the past. Captain Stewart, Hemingway, Bryant, McGregor, Thompson and Collins, this year's utility men, Hook, and every member of the twirling staff will all be here to try for positions next year.

But Iowa will not be forced to rely upon veterans for success on the diamond. This year's freshmen had a team hardly below the varsity in ability. West is a pitcher second to no college twirler in the state, and Hermance, Emery, and Firkin are all good. Firkin in particular should meet the need for a southpaw which was felt this year when "Lefty" Sutherland did not come back. Hansen, Moeller, Creglow, Wright and McWhorter are others of the 1912 team who should make good next year. It is almost certain that next spring will see the classiest bunch of baseball candidates which has tried for a Hawkeye team in years, and it should be possible not only to walk off with the state title, but to make a noise, and a large one, too, in the western conference.

The new educational board of Iowa started its administration right by re-electing W. J. McChesney to the post of secretary which he has so ably filled for seven years. His title is changed to "Secretary of the State University of Iowa." One of the best evidences of the recognized value of his services lies in the fact that his salary is to be raised by \$500.

Though prominently mentioned for the secretaryship of the new educational board's finance committee, Mr. McChesney's wishes prevailed and he was permitted to retain his present position. The board realized that it would be well nigh impossible to secure a man who could fill his place. Furthermore, the old board of regents considered the matter of such prime importance that it officially recommended that Mr. McChesney be appointed to succeed himself.

Mr. McChesney has one of the most responsible positions among the university's administrative officers and no one among them has been more satisfactory than he. Both the state and the university have always been counted fortunate in having this office so excellently filled.

Congratulations are due the new board for its wise selection for we feel perfectly sure that the right man has been retained for the place.

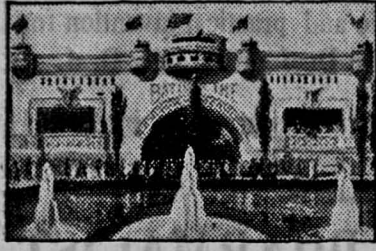
