The entire board was present and the representatives spent the greater part of the morning in making certain rules now in operation still clear-

still more surprising measure passed was that of allowing athletes who flunk in their freshman year to take part in the athletics the next year if they make up the deficiencies. This ruling will have a definite effect upon athletics in the "Big Eight" inasmuch as several good men have heretofore been barred from teams because of deficiency in work.

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
