### FALL TRACK MEET TO BE HELD THIS YEAR

#### NEW IDEA IN ATHLETICS WILL BE INAUGURATED

Excellent Opportunity Will Be Given  
to All New Men For  
Early Training

Plans are under way for a fall track and field meet to be held on Iowa field this fall. While for the purpose of getting out freshmen and "green" material, it is still open to all classes and colleges of the university. The purpose is to thoroughly arouse enthusiasm, instill the "pepp" and find out what material there is in the university for the building up of a strong varsity.

Medals will probably be given to the winners of most points. There will be no limit to the entries in each event and all men, whether they have ever been in track or not, will have an equal chance. Everything that can be arranged will be started at a very moderate point so that all can have the opportunity of getting the competitive practice which is necessary to the making of a strong and consistent athlete.

In order that the meet be a successful one, it needs the entire co-operation of all men intending to go in to help get other men out. It makes no difference now "green" at the sport he may be, he can make up his mind to go in and do something. In the University of Iowa there are enough men to develop one of the strongest track teams in the middle west, and there is only one thing lacking and that is the one great thing necessary to a winning team, the active support from every man in the university.

It requires competition to build a championship team, something to make a man work for his place. He must give to his school all that he has and when that is done a winning team comes to the front and that's what Iowa is going to have.

In other universities and colleges they have their fall meets usually known as sophomore-freshmen meets, their purpose being to get out the "new" material and the old high school stars and instill in them that quality that brings the points in the future for a strong winning varsity.

The summary of the points will be added up to their respective college and in this way enthusiasm and "fight" can be instilled. It will be a big honor for the college winning the first fall meet.

The date for this meet is as yet undecided but it will be pulled off early this fall. Let everybody get the "I will for Iowa" spirit and boost this affair and get spring athletes started this fall with such life and "pepp" that we in the near future can turn the tide of the state collegiate meet toward the camps of the "Old Gold."

### "DAD" ELLIOTT HERE SUNDAY WILL SPEAK IN AUDITORIUM

Y. M. C. A. International Secretary  
is Well Known Here.

"Dad" Elliott, the international secretary of the Y. M. C. A. will be in the city Sunday and will address the men of the university in the auditorium of the natural science hall.

Mr. Elliott is a graduate of Northwestern of the class of '02. While in school he was a member of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity and was the captain of the track and football teams his last year in school. He was the only man out of twenty-two who stuck and played the game out, when Iowa defeated Northwestern in 1900. While Elliott was a strong factor in the athletics of Northwestern he was prominent socially. There was not a better liked man in school than "Dad," and he became known by that name only, and it still clings to him. Strong in athletics, strong socially, he did not forget the spiritual side of a college man's life. Throughout his college course he was an active worker along religious lines.

After his graduation he felt himself called to unite with the interests of the Y. M. C. A. and since that time has been a well known figure in association work in the United States. He has been at Iowa a number of times and has always held the university in highest esteem. He has a large circle of friends in Iowa City, who welcome him in his return to the university. It is for this reason that the local association does not want him confused with Mercer who was here last year.

Mr. Elliott will arrive in the city some time Saturday and will stay over Sunday. While here he will meet with the advisory board and with the various faculty committees. He will hold a special meeting with the local cabinet and will help in outlining the year's work. Sunday afternoon he will address the men of the university in the auditorium of the new science hall.

The department teams will therefore give him the opportunity he has been looking for and it is from these candidates that the captains will look for their teams. Other universities have such a league and there is no reason why Iowa cannot.

A schedule has not been framed as yet but will be ready by the first of next week. Each team will get a chance at every other and the one winning the majority of its games will get the championship. The first game will probably be played a week from Saturday morning.

A squad of twenty husky Hawkeyes left for Minneapolis last evening in a private interurban car. From Cedar Rapids they took a sleeper and will arrive at the home of the Gophers at eight o'clock this morning. The following men were chosen after the practice yesterday afternoon to make up the squad which will battle with the northerners tomorrow: Centers, O'Brien, Callander, Comley; guards, Hazard, Hanson, Bell, Bateson; tackles, Gross (Capt.), Hull, Alexander; ends Hyland, Kresensky, Hanlon, Alderman; quarter, Stewart, Dyer; halves, Murphy, Ehret, Collins; fullback, Wright. These men were accompanied by Coaches Griffith, Moore, Hastings and Eby, Trainers Tommy O'Brien and Field, Manager Smith and Prof. S. H. Bush. The Iowa delegation will stop at the Hotel Plaza and will practice today on a field near there. In case of rain they will take a workout in an armory near the hotel.

The band and a large number of students congregated at the interurban depot last evening and gave the Hawkeyes a hearty send-off. A band of twenty-six pieces will leave for Minneapolis tonight and will be on the field tomorrow to help in the rooting. It is estimated that at least one hundred Iowa followers will be at the game to lend inspiration to the players.

Coach Griffith put the squad through a stiff signal practice yesterday afternoon but gave them no scrimmage. The men are in fairly good shape and will undoubtedly make a good showing against their strong opponents. It is doubtful if Stewart will be able to go the entire round at quarter but Dyer has been practicing steadily in this position and should fill the place in a satisfactory manner. Most of the men taken on the trip will probably get into the game tomorrow. Several of the places are being closely contested for and nothing short of an actual participation in a game will settle the dispute.

Nothing definite as to the strength of the Gophers can be learned but the way in which they snowed Lawrence under last Saturday is an indication that they are a fast bunch.
