HAWKEYES LOSE CLOSE AND HARD FOUGHT GAME.

Daring Base Running by Fellows in Eighth Inning Brings Victory To Wisconsin

One deafening crash, coming be-

fore the fans had realized that disaster was even in sight, sent the only run of the game clattering across the plate in the eighth inning of Friday's contest against Wisconsin and gave the visitors the margin in the cleanest-played encounter of recent decades. Until the fateful inning rolled around the game had been a stubborn pitcher's battle between West and Nash, with honors even and nobody getting farther than the second sack. Fellows, first up for Wisconsin in that round, was given a walk after a long and arduous session at the plate. Here came the play which put the game away. Flanagan, that's him, was up, with the all too evident intention of sacrificing. So Hanson and Schmidt closed in, while Stewart ran to cover first and Wright guarded second. The ball rolled from his grasp, and Fellows, having the assistance of the coacher in getting to his feet, trotted in home while the rescue squad rushed to the aid of the injured third-sacker with sponges, water and liniment.

Until this unlooked for happening, neither side had anything that looked like an opening for scores. West and Nash were both in form, and had the batsmen calling for aid at all times. Wright's clean single to center at the opening of the fifth was the only Hawkeye safety of the day, while the enemy piled up three scratches and two clean drives off West. The local star was much the steadier, however, and balanced the sheet by his superior control. Nash was inclined to be wild, as his four walks and three mutilated batsmen show. 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
