## DUCKING FOR DRAKE; EVERYBODY SAYS SO

### GREATEST MASS MEETING OF ALL TIME SO DECIDES.

#### Confidence Marks Memorable Rally—Hyland Demands Trimming for Chesty Bulldogs.

Stirred by memories of two straight defeats by Drake, Iowa students turned out last night two thousand strong to help the team in its efforts to break the hoodoo next Saturday. Without much doubt, the mass meeting which resulted was the largest and most enthusiastic ever held here. Long before the hour set for the meeting arrived, the upper packed and jammed; and by the deck of the big auditorium was time the team appeared the lower floor was filled to overflowing, chiefly with the feminine portion of the rooting section.

That Drake is going to be beaten if there is any possible way of doing it was pretty evident from the general trend of the remarks and from the spirit shown at the monster gathering. Strong in the knowledge that they can beat Drake and do it well if they play their game, the men showed a grim determination and a resolve to fight which means a bad afternoon for some people from the capital city who are coming to Iowa Saturday.

Before the real business of the evening began, the various rooting sections engaged in complimentary cheering contests, and kept up a torrent of noise until the team appeared on the stage at 7:15. Here Prof. A. G. Smith, who always leads rallies before big victories, took charge of the affair, and began his evening's work by telling of the records of past Iowa-Drake contests. In the twelve games played, Iowa has secured 217 points to Drake's 57. Out of these twelve contests, Drake has won three—in 1898, ten years later, in 1908, and again last year, in 1909. This, as anyone can see at a glance, is more than enough for the Bulldog team, and all agreed with Prof. Smith that the Drake inning habit must be broken at once.

The first speaker of the evening was Dr. Howard of the medical faculty, who spoke of the Canadian football. This, he said, was responsible for the introduction of football into the U. S., as McGill University of Toronto introduced the game to Harvard.

Dr. Howard was followed by N. A. Kellogg, the new manager and track coach, who dwelt upon the advisability of sending Drake home not only beaten, but well beaten.

Prof. Smith then called upon various members of the team. Only three men will be lost this year by graduation or the expiration of their playing time. Captain Hyland and Neidig are both completing their last

## HAWKEYES LOOK BEST IN GAME WITH DRAKE

### HAWLEY'S MEN SHOULD BEAT BULLDOGS SATURDAY.

#### Drake Team Held in Great Respect, But Iowans Are Expected to Prove Superior.

Drake is coming tomorrow for the game which will in all probability decide the ownership of the state title for another year. The Blue and White still has its record unmarred by any state team with the exception of Andy Chalmers' Des Moines College bunch, which slipped over an unconsidered early season's defeat. Iowa also has a clear state, having met and defeated Morning-side and Ames of the state aggregations. If the Hawkeyes win tomorrow's battle, there will be none to dispute their title to first honors. Cornell is as yet undefeated, but the Purple has played a very easy schedule, and while the Mount Vernon team is undoubtedly strong, there are few who think that it would be able to stand before the onslaught of any one of the three big teams of the state. On the other hand, if Drake wins, the husky Aggies will still loom large in its path to the

state championship. But if the Blue and White succeeds in defeating Iowa on the local field, there seems no reason why Ames can not be worsted in Des Moines Thanksgiving day. So viewed from almost any known or unknown angle, the clash on the local gridiron next Saturday appears as the real decisive struggle of the year.

The varsity took its last hard work-out last night, and finished its week's preparation in fair shape for the contest. Hyland will be back in the game, but Thomas may be compelled to view the fray from afar. In this case, Powell or Banton will be found at left half in place of the injured hero. Otherwise the Iowa line-up will be the same as that which trampled the Aggies last Saturday.

Down at Drake, Griffith is sending out one bear story after another in a strenuous endeavor to lull the Hawkeye hosts into a sense of false security. But the way in which the Drake team tore up the Grinnell defense in the last half of the game last Saturday is proof sufficient of the real strength of the Christian aggregation. This much is certain—the Drake contingent has a lot of quiet confidence, and is coming to Iowa City on Saturday in force. Advices from there are to the effect

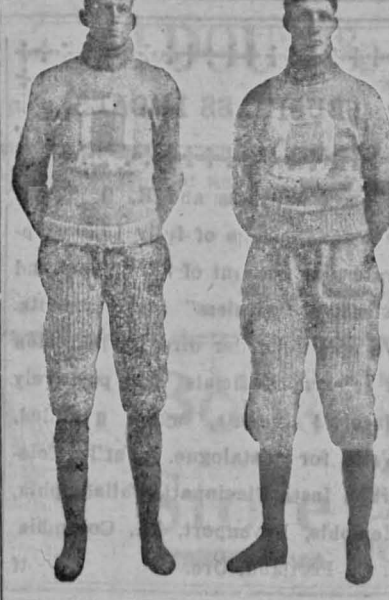

#### The "Lampoon" of Iowa To Be Given First Test of Student Sentiment Monday.

Placards announcing the first appearance of the year of the university humorous magazine, the Haw-Haw-Hawkeye, have made their appearance on the campus. Lovers of the humorous are promised soothing satisfaction for their particular hobby, and a good, hearty laugh is in store for all. Monday, Nov. 14, is announced at the date of sale.

The magazine is totally dissimilar to the single number issued last year being essentially a humorous book of real merit, so it is said. The book is not being issued as an anonymous publication as before. The board of editors, consisting of Chester Corey, Frank Baldwin, Vernon Seeburger, and William Jones, have been busily engaged since the beginning of the school year in an attempt to establish a real, live humorous book, which it is the intention to make a permanent institution here at Iowa. The movement is right in line with the rest of the big universities of the country, notably Harvard, where "The Lampoon" has flourished since the year 1876.

The policy of the book, also, is radically different than that which characterized last year's number. The editors assert that the primary purpose is that of humor and not scandal of a questionable type. Cognizance was taken by the present editors of the unfavorable comment on last year's book, and every effort on their part has been bent in the direction of ridding it of the undesirable personal element. While all ideas relative to the subject matter other than that previously mentioned have been carefully withheld even from the most inquisitive, it is assured that the book will more than fulfill even the most sanguine expectations and prove an agreeable surprise to all.

Many of the alumni have long believed that there should be such a magazine in the school. This belief is apparently shared by the present student body judging from the numerous daily inquiries as to when the book will appear. The present board has made the announcement that if the students take hold of the project in the proper manner, six issues will be gotten out during the year with the number appreciably increased from year to year.

Berry at center, Jones at tackle or end, Hoffman at guard, and Carlson and McCreight at ends are all veterans. With this array of experienced material and with the stars that have been developed this year, the Drake team possesses the ability to push any team in the Missouri Valley.

On the other hand, the Iowa eleven is generally regarded throughout the state as the best in recent years.

Some there are who claim that the present Hawkeye line is the superior of any seen here since the days of 1900. Certain it is that it has resisted the best efforts of most of the backfields met this year. Purdue was helpless against it, and Ames was even less successful than the Boilermakers in penetrating the
