HAWKEYES MEET AMES FOR CRITICAL CONTEST

FINAL BATTLE OF YEAR BETWEEN TWO TEAMS.

Clarke, Aggie Star, Due For Trimming—Stewart's Men Doped to Pull out Victory.

Hawkeye and Aggie will resume their ancient feud on Iowa Field tomorrow afternoon, when the stalwart farmers come for the final settlement of differences for the year. Already one Iowa scalp is in possession of our dearest foe, and heroic measures seem necessary to prevent the addition of a second. The Aggie bunch is strong this year, and with Clarke, the wonder-working strike-out pitcher, has hitherto been almost unbeatable.

On the other hand, Stewart is in shape to send into the field the strongest and best prepared combination which has represented the Hawkeyes this year. Captain Hook is the only invalid at present, and the dashing leader's sore thumb, which was twice nicked by Morningside sharpshooters on Tuesday, may be all right by tomorrow. If it is still in the sick bay, Von Lackum will go behind the bat, and no one will worry about the backstop position in any event.

The rest of the team is in good shape, and has had a week's practice on the home lot. Alcorn is out again, and may be used in the box before many days have gone by. Baird or Gittins will probably start the game Saturday, however. Baird had the farming gentry backing up after he entered the box at Ames, and is figured as being able to repeat. Gittins has a victory over Wisconsin to his credit, and is generally picked as the most reliable twirler on the staff.

Only one other position on the team is in doubt. Right field has so far been an open question between Williams, Strickler, and McWhorter. It is not likely that Strickler will get the place against Ames, as he is a left-handed hitter; and such have no terrors for the mighty Clarke. McWhorter is good at the waiting game and is the logical man if the Ames star is wild,—which is not his habit, however.

The men are not discouraged by the Morningside defeat, and few of the fans believe that it was a true indication of the merit of the team. The misfortune is attributed solely to a bad start, and the men played a hard, fighting game after the third inning. Local dopesters figure that Clarke, who will undoubtedly work for Ames, is due for a trimming, and expect to see the Hawkeyes pulled into a tie for the state title when the

ENTRIES COMING IN FOR INTERSCHOLASTIC

MANY HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETES PREPARING

Several Schools Already Claiming Meet—Visitors to be Entertained in Style.

Plans for the fourth annual interscholastic track and field meet which will be held on Iowa field one week from tomorrow, May 13, are rapidly nearing completion. The affair, which promises to be the biggest of any ever held here, will be handled in much the same way as the previous ones, except that more elaborate preparations, occasioned by the increase of numbers, will in all probability be necessary.

The first entry was received on Tuesday, coming by special delivery letter. Since then other entries have been coming in thick and fast, and Manager Kellogg has been more than busy filing away the names of the different contestants.

The visiting high school teams will be entertained this year by the athletic board, and the newly organized Hawkeye club may also take a hand in caring for the visitors. According to custom, the teams will all be entertained at an athletic dinner on the day of the meet, the big tables being spread in the Armory for the occasion.

Invitations to the meet were issued some time ago, accompanied by booklets giving various details about the different events. Among other things, the records for the three previous years as well as the best records ever made in the invitation events are listed, in order that the high schoolers may have some definite idea of the competition which they may expect.

Several schools, including Iowa City, Davenport, Marion, Fairfield, and North Des Moines, are already claiming the meet by various margins, and as this will be the first chance for most of these athletes to get together, high-class competition may be expected.

Most of these are still hidden from the public, and will only be known when the music sounds for the grand march this evening.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY IN NOTABLE MEETING

IMPORTANT MEASURES ARE PASSED.

To Co-operate in Production of Biographical Dictionary—New Members Elected.

At the regular business meeting of the State Historical Society of Iowa held Wednesday evening in the rooms of the society in the hall of liberal arts, some of the most important business that has been before the organization this year was transacted. Among other important things it was decided to co-operate with the other learned and widespread historical societies of the country in the preparation of a dictionary of American biography. This work will be very broad in its scope and especially scientific in its character, so that it is fitting that the Iowa society should join in its preparation.

The superintendent was authorized to arrange for research work during the summer. From the preliminary plans that have already been made it would appear that there will be a valuable school of research workers in connection with the Historical society this summer. There will probably be a considerable number who will take part in this work and the superintendent is now working on the arrangements for the various phases of research work which they will undertake. The Iowa Library affords unlimited material for work of this kind, and its resources, together with those of other documents of the state which the students may be able to discover in the course of their study will likely enable some of these to disclose some valuable information about various phases of Iowa History and other subjects that will be undertaken.

Miss Eliza Johnson, the librarian, was granted a leave of absence for a period of three months. She will spend the time in Europe making a general tour, and visiting the more interesting portions of the continent.

The superintendent of the society, Professor Benjamin F. Shambaugh, and Dr. Dan E. Clark were authorized to represent the local organization at the fourth annual meeting of the Mississippi Valley Historical Association which will be held at Chicago and at Evanston on the 18, 19, 20 and 21 of this month.

Two libraries in the state were admitted to the society as library members, namely: the public library at Alta and the library association at Oelwein.

Noted Scientist Comes.

Professor Svante Arrhenius of Stockholm, winner of the Noble prize in chemistry, will lecture in the chapel of Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, Saturday at 8:00 p. m. There is no admission fee and the faculty and students of the university are invited to be present.

Professor Arrhenius has been connected with the chemistry and physics departments of the University of Stockholm since 1891. He is at present making a tour through the United States, having already visited Columbia and Harvard, with Wisconsin and Minnesota still on his itinerary.

In science Professor Arrhenius is known particularly on account of his success in establishing on a firm basis a general theory, which is now all but universally accepted by the scientific world, viz., the so-called theory of electrolytic dissociation.

Football League to Start.

Elaborate plans for the intra-collegiate football league for the season of 1911 are being made. The Hawkeye club at its meeting on Wednesday evening inaugurated a movement looking to the beginning of a campaign for a more successful league next fall, and the project was taken up by the athletic board at its session later in the evening.

A resolution was passed by the board instructing Director E. G. Schroeder to appoint the managers of the different department teams at once in order that they may begin to size up their material. Present plans look to the playing of most of the league games before the import-and contests of the varsity season start, in order to give Coach Hawley and his assistants a chance to look over the material thus brought out.

Over thirty complete outfits have been set aside by the board for the use of the teams. This will allow each team two practices per week in uniform, with the schedules for these to be arranged by the managers and Director Schroeder.

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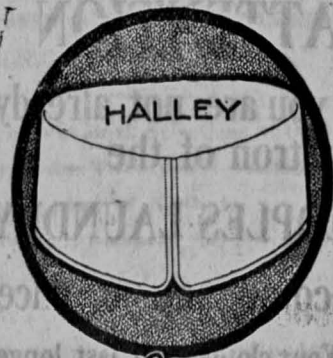
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Horack Article Purchased.

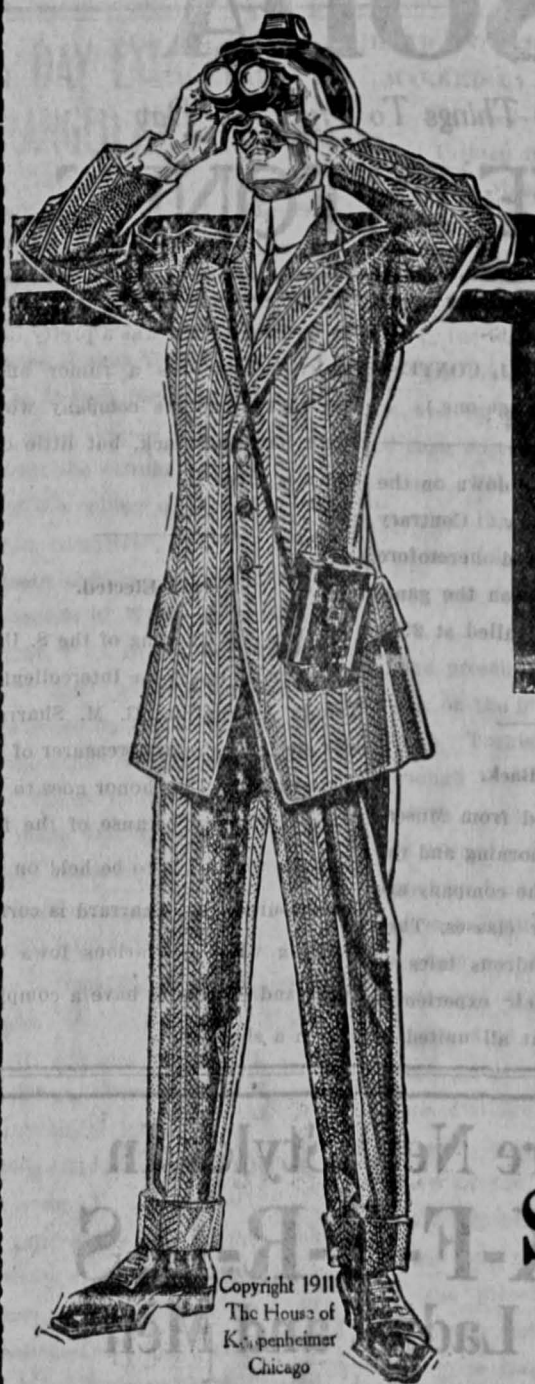
"Pep" Griffith Successful.
