





### THE FREEDOM OF THE WEST

more apparent use to civilization than a harboring place where Indians, animals, and a few hardy settlers might congregate. So undeveloped were its possibilities that there was ony a scanty dream from even the most optimistic pioneers that this land might someday become the home of the most prosperous, the most literate, and the most patriotic citizens in the Union.

During the century which has intervened many of the possibilities which settlers once dreamed a comfortable degree from the more crowded eas- and form and affords a means of learning the simpness of environment, the people of the west have to improve our income tax reports. The westerner is primarily a creature who is not so closely intertwined with society that his individuality is encroached upon; he does not have a precedent which requires a rigid adherence; and he is able to obtain the simplest needs of life without extreme labor.

With all these conditions, there remains only the necessity for a few decades of rest from the strenuous labor of the pioneer's life until the midlle west will not be far from the realization of a creative life in political, commercial and educational fields. Then it will no longer fall in line behind the example set by other regions but will think, act, and s, suk for itself.

### THE SUPREME COURT, A USURPER

THERE is no doubt in my mind that the Supreme I Court of the United States has usurped the power and right under which it declares acts of Congress unconstitutional," a United States senator recently declared and then proceeded to argue that the framers of the Constitution never intended any court to have that power. The argument advanced by him was to the effect that when the majorice of the people, through their representatives in Congress, enacted certain legislation that it was constitutional and that Congress slone has the right of declaring whether or not an act is constitutional .

The argument is not an uncommon one, especially common among oratorical reformers and forensically inclined sophomores, who settle all the problems of the world in their arguments. The argument is always accompanied by much cheap talk, plentifully interspersed with quotations from the Star Spangled Banner and from the Gettysburg Address. But the fundamental argument against the proposed change is never answered.

The defenders of the Supreme Court's right to declare acts of Congress unconstitutional caunot well argue against the fact that the will of Congress, theoretically aleast, entered the will of the people but the "sacreumes" of this legislative ma-

hammering in defense of their proposition, is a fal- Fourth Meeting Of Change Of Rates

This is a government not for the majority but for the entity. Individuals, under all the gent American charters, are believed to hold cortain rights against the state and against all other cit izens of the state. The will of the majority cannot take from certain individuals these rights and the enactment of legislation which does this, either directly or indirectly, is opposed to the fundamental law of the land to the protection of which these citizens are entitled. Our entire code of inquidual rights and our much vaunted freedom would vanish

All governmental power is liable to abuse and in the past, Congress has shown itself not unwilling to take from citizens rights which the Constitution guaranteed them, and the Supreme Court has rightfully interposed and declared the acts unconstitutional. A move to take the right of declaring acts unconstitutional, from the Supreme Court strikes at the very heart of the constitution and the very fundamental system of citizens' rights and would supplant constitutionally controlled and equitable legislation with the tyrany of an absolutely-powerful and uncontrollable congress.
