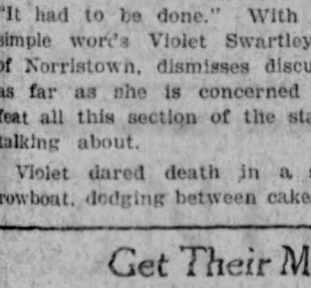

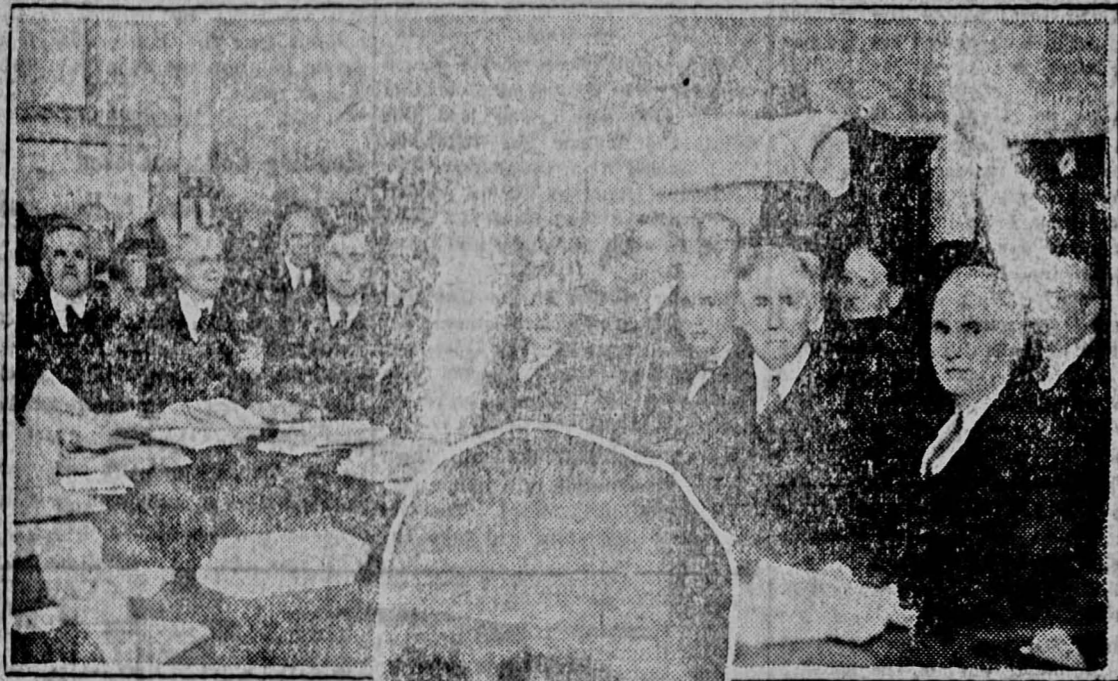

## Criminal Action May Follow Oil Lease Probe

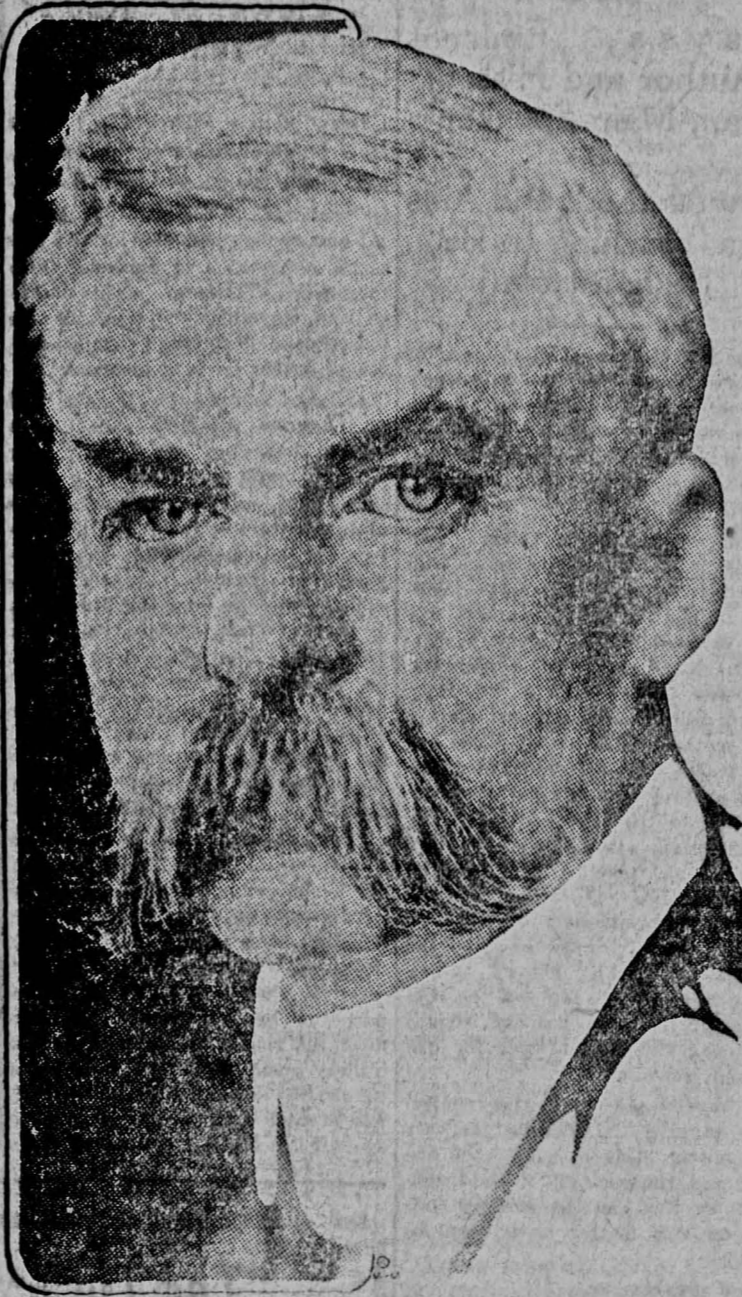

previously that he borrowed the money from Edward Beale McLean, Washington and Cincinnati publisher. Mr. McLean did not confirm the statement. J. W. Zevely, counsel for Harry Sinclair, lessee of Teapot Dome, told of another \$25,000 loan to Fall without security. These loans were made because of friendship, both Doheny and Zevely declared. The \$100,000 loan was arranged that Fall might increase his holdings and get a water supply to aid him in the development of his other holdings.

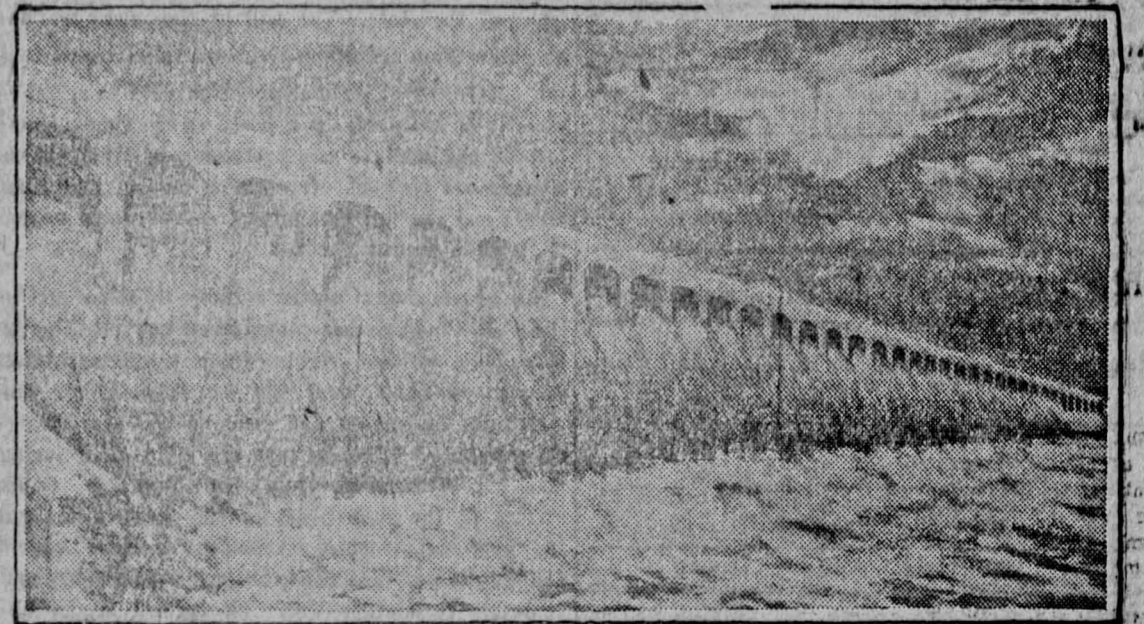

## Muscle Shoals Dam Nears Completion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—From the look and smell of things in the nation's capital, it is easy to guess what one of the issues in the Presidential campaign will be. There will be others, too, and one of them is likely to be Muscle Shoals. Southern delegations are tired of the inaction surrounding the Government's attitude toward Muscle Shoals. None of the enthusiasm awakened in them by Henry Ford's glowing proposals regarding the Shoals has diminished in the many months since he broached the matter. They want something done about it. If the government cannot accept Ford's bid, then they want one of the other bidders to have it. Consequently they will make a determined effort to bring Muscle Shoals into the battle of 1924. Three responsible bids have been made for the project. Henry Ford's proposition is, of course, well known. Sometime ago various Southern power companies got together and presented a joint bid for the project. The most recent proposition is that submitted by the Union Carbide and Carbon Co. of New York. Construction of the Wilson Dam, the pivot piece of the project is, going forward at such a pace that it probably will be completed by the summer of 1925. The dam will be the largest concrete mouth in the world surpassing in size the famous Assouan Dam in Egypt. It is the greatest hydro-power project ever undertaken, its 18 turbines being designed for 625,000 horse-power capacity. Over the illuminated parapet of the dam will cross three national highways—the Lee Highway from Washington, D. C., to San Francisco; the Jackson Highway from Chicago to New Orleans, and the Seenic Highway from Jacksonville, Fla., to Seattle, Wash.

The scandal surrounding the leading of the naval reserves has extended to naval officers as well as civilian officials. As long as Admiral Robert S. Griffin was head of this bureau of engineering of the navy he made attempts to block the transfer control of the reserves to the interior department, but when he retired and was succeeded by Rear Admiral John K. Robinson, the transfer was made. This was revealed in the senate probe by Senator Walsh of Wyoming, who said that after a conference with Doheny, Admiral Robinson became imbued with the necessity of leasing the reserves, adding that it was a "striking coincidence that among all the officers of the navy, Admiral Robinson was the put in charge of the oil reserves."

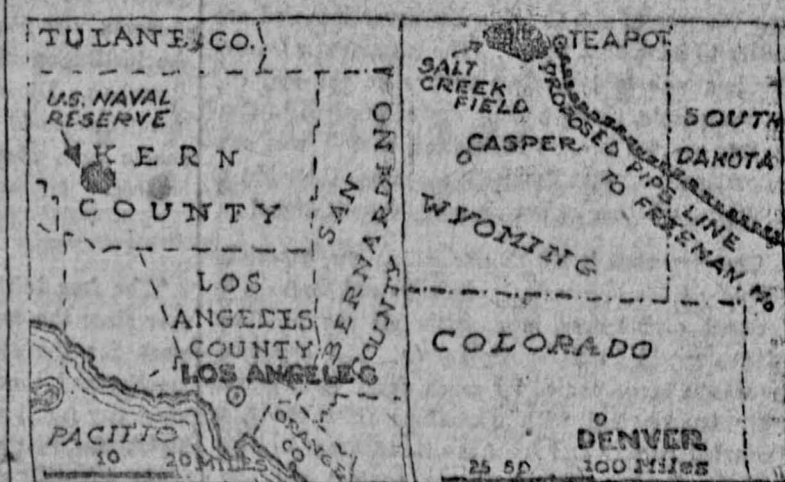

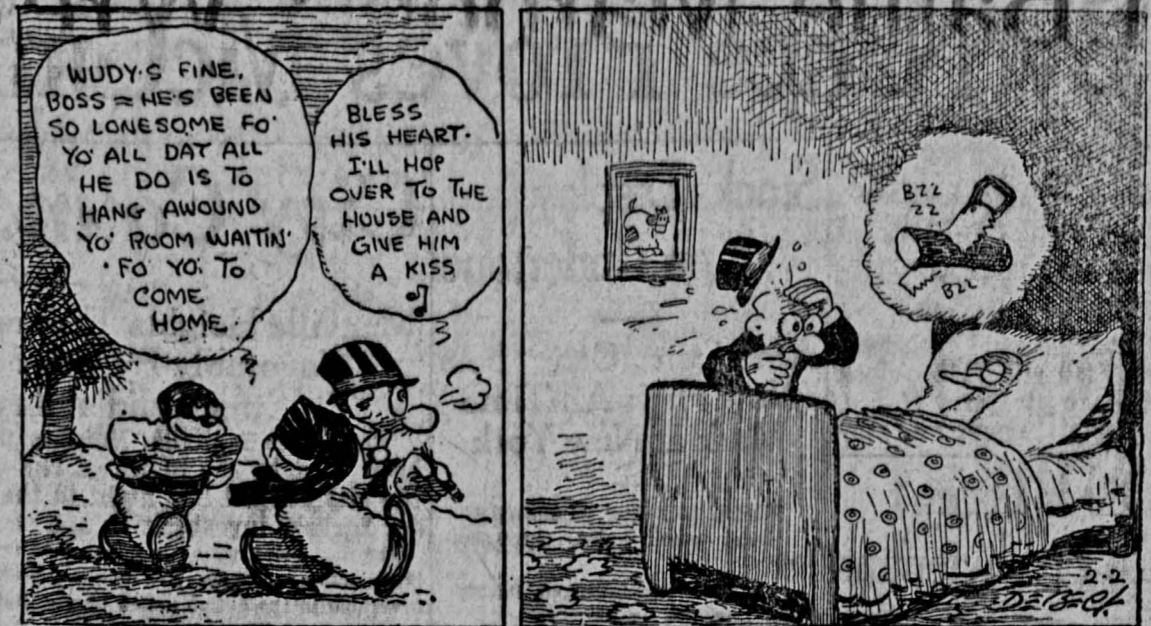

Chief Justice Taft called at the home and left his card. In the house, at the motion of republican leader Longworth, an impending partisan debate over the Teapot Dome disclosures was adjourned. Another of those who called was John W. Weeks, secretary of war. There were several of the former president's old friends admitted to the house, but none was permitted to enter the sick room. False Rumors Alloat The sudden collapse of the former president meantime had started many rumors of his death, and at one time late in the afternoon the flags on the great State, War and Navy buildings across from the white house were lowered to half mast. Had Seen Improvement To most of these observers he has appeared during recent weeks to have been somewhat improved in health. He took on flesh after he left the white house, and the filled-out appearance of his face often was mistaken as a sign of returning health.
