UNPROFESSIONALIZED LITERATURE

INJITH the development of the recent tendency in VV education, which is to further and encourage self-expression, and to seek out and aid the talented child, comes the possibility of a revolution in the field of letters. It may bring about the unprofesionalization of literature.

The fact that an author has been a professional has always been a hindrance to the production of the greatest, freshest, art. Being dependent upon the publisher, and hence upon the taste of the public, he has had to produce what the public would buy, whether he has been best fitted for that form of writing or not. Thus a great poet like Marlowe was forced to become a dramatist; not because he could write plays better, but because he could sell

Grub street writers have always had to write what the people wanted, and they have often had to turn it out. This has caused them to throw together in loose form that which might have assumed beautiful proportions had they had time to prune and polish their first hasty draught. They have had to write ten poor novels where they might have written two good ones. Then, having once met public approval, they have been able to pass out any old rubbish, which the public has swallowed as literature. As a result we have to thumb through volumes of trash to find one real work of art.

With our newly developing system of education, everyone learns self-expression in writing, so each has his moments of realized beauty. It is conceivable then, that in the future, many more will struggle to write. One fleeting, beautiful thought, that otherwise would have perished, will be caught in its passage and spun into a poem of of the trash that often comes from the pen of the professional writer, and will fail to worship at the feet of the popular idol as soon as his productions loose brilliance, value, and power. Instead of the pile of worthless best-sellers from the few, we will have no writing without inspiration, and will enrich our literature with a strong current of fresh, original, productions.

"ATHLETIC HEARTS" (New York Tribune) THE French Academy of Medicine has undertaken

We are not aware that in this country, where athletic contests of the most exhaustive character are carried to at least as great an extreme as anyport of cardiac lesions induced by such exercises, r that any undue number of athletes and former athletic champions die from heart ailments. 




