Iowa Tears Down Field, Scores in The First Quarter

Hawks Keep Wolverines on Defensive In First Half

Otte Hurt in First Period; Removed From Game

Snatching the lead at the start and holding back the Wolverine rushes throughout the rest of the game, Iowa closed a successful season by crushing Michigan 9 to 2.

FERRY FIELD, ANN HARBOR, Mich., Nov. 22.—Michigan met Iowa here today in the final gridiron battle of the year under clear skies, but with a field possibly slowed up by rain.

Both teams gave an impressive display of punting and kicking, one Hawkeye booting drop kicks repeatedly from the center of the field when he had the quartering west wind at his back.

A small crowd of Iowa sympathizers were in the stand but their cowbell chorus made up for the noise which its members lacked in numbers.

Captain Parkin of Iowa won the toss and selected to defend the west goal with a strong wind at his back.

Scantlebury carried the ball over for a touch down. His kick for goal hit the goal post and bounced back into the field.

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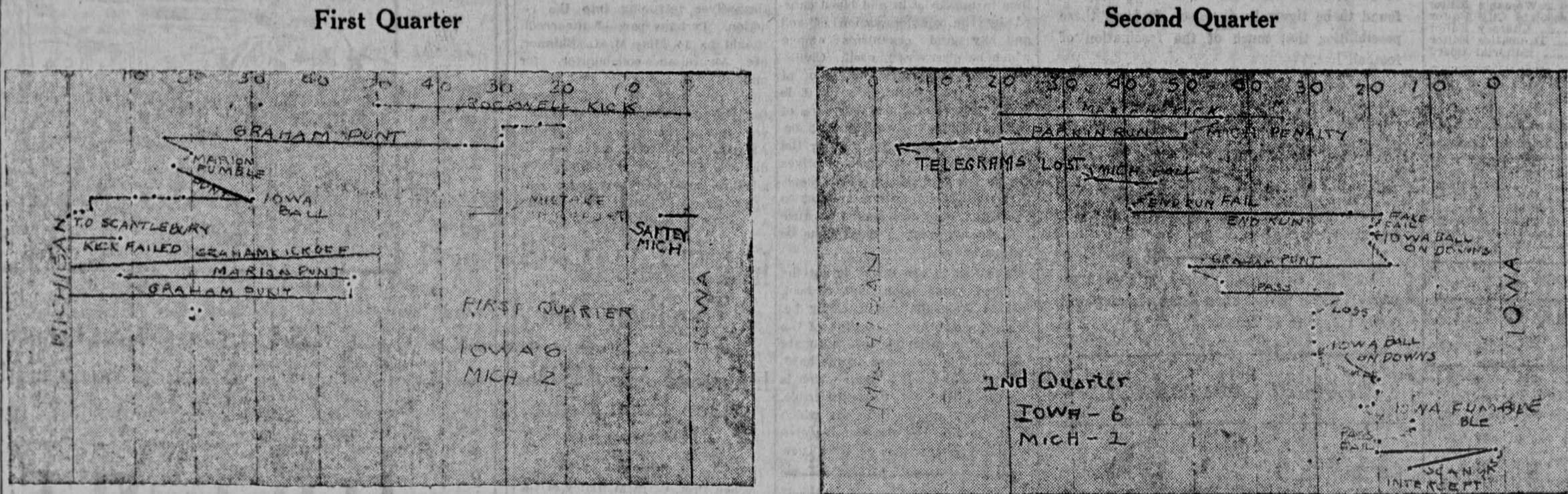

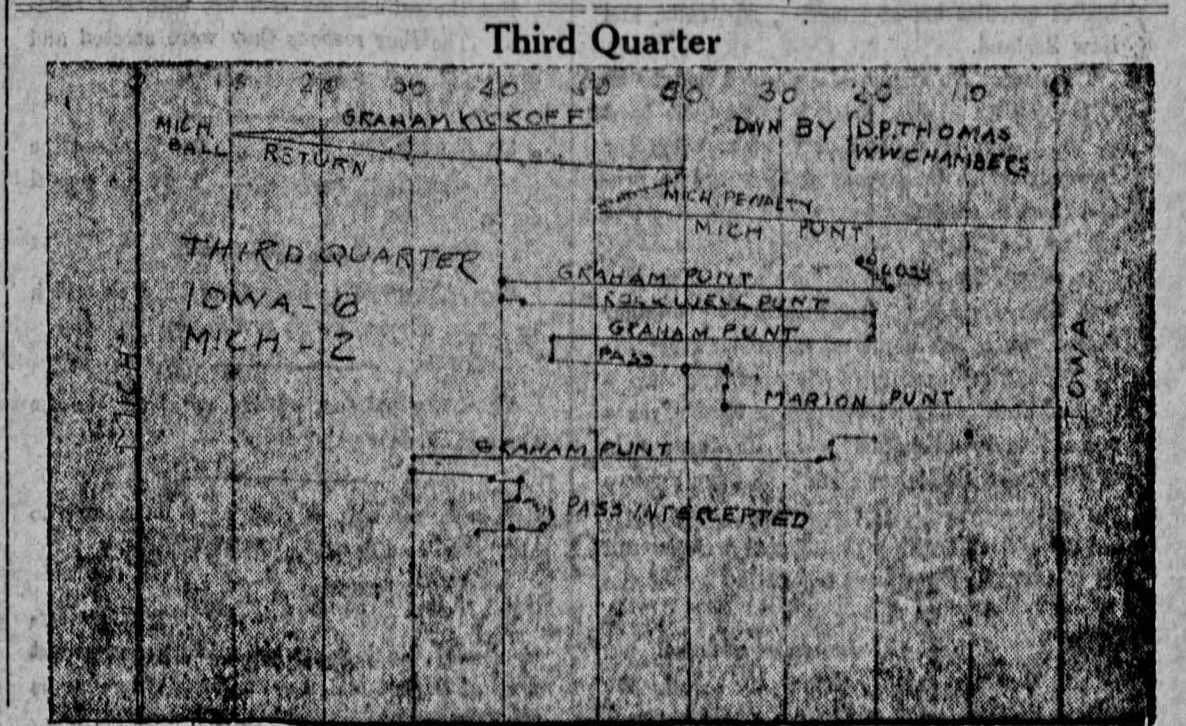

### Faust Is Biggest Attempt of University Glee Clubs

There are many exceedingly difficult parts to "Faust," which will require many weeks of hard practice. For instance, it seems to be very difficult to acquire the correct swiveling movement for the German waltz. The "Soldiers' Chorus," the duel scene, and the prison scene, which is the finale, are very hard to portray.

Many more properties are required for "Faust" than were necessary for the production of "The Mikado." Spinning wheels, spears and swords for the men; antique

pottery drinking mugs and goblets will be used. Special lighting effects are necessary. In the first act Marguerite appears in a vision to Faust. This effect will be very difficult to achieve. More magic will be used when Mephisto causes wine to gush forth from a sign in front of a tavern.

"Faust" contains many famous songs, such as the "Soldiers' Chorus," the "Flower Song," "All Hail Thy Dwelling Pure and Holy," and the famous "Jewel Song," which is sung by Marguerite, and "Invocation to the Night," by Mephisto.

# Dean of Football Coaches Has Big Ten Championship Staring His Star Team, in Face

## Chicago Opponent Has No Conference Win to Its Credit

(By the Associated Press) CHICAGO, Nov. 21—A big ten conference football championship is within the grasp tonight of 62 year old Amos Alonzo Stagg, dean of football coaches in America, for the first time in eleven years.

Tomorrow the Maroons meet Wisconsin, with a clear title in sight for Chicago if they defeat or tie Wisconsin.

Stagg has completed 32 years as coach at Chicago but since 1913 one defeat or one tie has kept the Maroons just back of the leaders. This year Stagg upset "Red" Grange and Illinois by starting the game with an offensive of his own that swept Illinois of their feet, and tied the Illini who had been regarded as sure of the conference championship. Chicago has another tie this season on the record with Ohio State, but so far is the only undefeated team in the conference.

## Yale Bull Dog Expected to Sink Teeth in Crimson

(By the Associated Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 21—Harvard and Yale will come to grips tomorrow in the bowl at New Haven with the Blue a top heavy favorite among critics to capture the forty-third battle between these ancient rivals.

The Elis are overwhelmingly favored to win the "Big Three" title by downing the Crimson and finish their second straight season undefeated. The vast and colorful crowd of 80,000 that will fill the big amphitheater to its outer fringes expects a typically hard fought struggle. Past performances favor Yale, but it takes only a glance at the 1924 record to show how little they have frequently meant, and Harvard followers, mindful of the upsets that have marked both "Big Three" games so far, are confident the Crimson will complete the cycle by overthrowing the Blue.

Tomorrow unfolds a wealth of gridiron tradition, for besides the Harvard-Yale encounter, the only other outstanding eastern games involve long rivalries. At Syracuse, Chick Meehan's Orange eleven, toppled recently by West Virginia Wesleyan from its undefeated perch, faces Colgate, beaten by Nebraska and West Virginia, in the Maroon's biggest games with prospects of a closely waged battle for upstate gridiron supremacy.

At Easton, Pa., Lafayette and Lehigh renew a struggle inaugurated forty years ago, with the Leopards striving to come back while Lehigh battles to keep her place among the five major unbeaten teams in the east.

Only three of these teams fighting for eastern title honors will be seen in action. Besides Yale and Lehigh, the powerful Rutgers outfit, with one of the best records of all, will close its season at Philadelphia with Uncle Charley Moran's Bucknell eleven which conquered the Navy a week ago.

Of the unbeaten outfits Pennsylvania had no game scheduled in order to concentrate on preparations for the annual game with Cornell Thanksgiving day while Dartmouth has rested her case with a record of seven victories and a tie with Yale.

## Canned Heat

The Hawkeyes worked out in Grant Park at Chicago on the way to Ann Arbor. From what we've heard, Grant was a veritable demon at fighting it out on the "line." Wonder if the Hawks absorbed any of this historical influence.

Ben Friedman, Michigan halfback, who worked as a stevedore the past summer, will find the Hawks a little harder to handle than trunks.

The four horsemen of Notre Dame have ridden everything from the Army's mule to the Princeton tigers, but in this season of upsets one of their mounts might throw a shoe in the Northwestern game.

## He Tied Illinois

Down at Indiana University, President Bryan impresses upon his student family that "it's the last yard that counts."

Mr. Austin McCarty, halfback of the University of Chicago, is teaching his schoolmates to make it five yards. In fact, McCarty has earned

It was McCarty who ripped five-yard holes in the Illinois defense and enabled the Maroon team to give Illinois the scare of its life and then hold it and Red Grange to a 21 to 21 tie. It was McCarty who tore off five-yard gains against Britton, McIlwain, Grange, et al, after making those holes.

As one Illinois man remarked after the game, "You've got to have a man on every part of McCarty to stop him."

McCarty literally lived up to his name of "Five Yards" against Illinois. Seldom did he make less than when given the ball. Frequently the last yard or two was secured with from two to four tacklers draped around him. Once off his feet, McCarty still squirms for the last foot or two.

Those who have lived in Chicago know of "Butch" Hanlan's Hyde Park high school team. Well, McCarty is the product of that school. For three years he stood out as the greatest high school backfield man in and around Chicago.

Going to Chicago U. in 1922, he was made captain of the freshman team. Stagg himself stated that McCarty, in his first year up, was as formidable a backfield man on offense as many of the men playing regularly on Big Ten conference eleven's. The following year, McCarty would have been a regular but for the presence of the Thomas brothers, Bill Zorn, and Jim Pfohl. He did, however, break into the Big Ten games and the opposition knew he was in.

Stagg, this year, has used McCarty as a battering ram.

In the Illinois game, McCarty was named in the opening lineup. Away he hammered until Chicago had scored the first touchdown. Then Stagg withdrew him until he "got his wind". Then back into the game he went. Fans forgot Red Grange, temporarily at least, to watch the Chicago "tank" in action.

McCarty must be rated as one of the greatest line plungers and driving backs in the game today.

(By the Associated Press) AMES, Nov. 21—The Iowa State college football team is in the best possible physical condition for the game with Drake University here tomorrow, it was announced tonight. Anderson, substitute tackle, is the only man on the squad who was not reported in good shape. Preparations are being made to take care of a record crowd.

Coach Sam S. Willaman today was presented with a gold watch by the student body in appreciation of his services as head football coach here for the last three years.

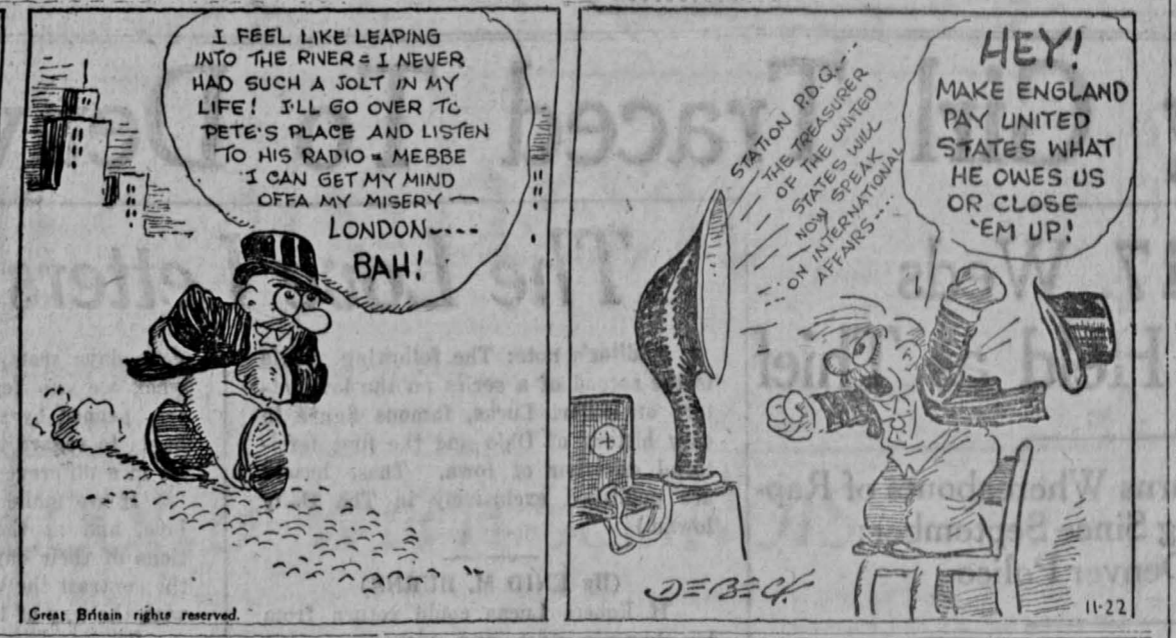
