# McClintock Leads Tankers

## Local Star Named Last Night; Sorenson Captains Water Polo

John C. McClintock, A2 of Iowa eye swimming team, succeeding Ned Ashton, S4 of Lyons, captain of the 1924-25 Hawk during the past season. The elec-

tion took place at the tank room in the men's gym. Aral C. Sorenson, M1 of Iowa City, was elected by members of the water basketball team to the captaincy of the water polo team for next year, since it was decided that the polo games should replace water basketball. Sorenson was captain of the water basketball team this season.

McClintock is a graduate of University high, and while in high school was recognized as a national interscholastic tank star, having placed in a number of national events. During the past season McClintock, swimming in the dashes, was highest individual scorer on the Old Gold team in conference meets.

Sorenson, who will captain the water polo team, was rated one of the best forwards in the conference during the past season. He

did practically all of the scoring, making all but two of the points against Northwestern, who had gone through the season undefeated until they met Iowa.

# Gridders Finish Sixth Week of Spring Practice

The practice yesterday afternoon closed the sixth week of spring drill for the Old Gold gridgers. The first call for candidates was issued by Coach Ingwersen February seventh and in response about fifteen enthusiastic grid men reported. Since then the squad has increased steadily having reached about thirty five men but the coaches still have been asking for more material.

Beginning the practice at a time when other sports were having full sway the coaches labored under extreme conditions. However, the number of men has never caused the practice to be held up, for the coaches would work with any number, always stressing the fact that it is the men who receive the benefit of the spring drill and realizing the need to better acquaint the new men with the varsity tactics.

**Worked Inside at First**  
At the beginning of the season the practices were held in the New Army and the fundamental tactics were predominant. Gradually working the men into condition the drills have been held outside until at the present time the Old Gold gridgers have been given lengthy workouts six days a week and the medicine that they have been receiving has been in the form of actual scrimmage and hitting the line. As a result, a few of the players are carrying the bruises and scars that are common during the football season.

**Drills Have Been Hard**  
Having no definite date set for the closing of the spring camp and realizing the extreme circumstances that the squad is in due to graduation and ineligibility, the coaches are pounding the men through strenuous practices in order to find the men to place in the vacant holes.

And, for the most part, most of the men realize that the conditions are favorable and always having in mind the pleasant trips that next year holds in store, they have been working faithfully.

The results of the spring drill have become evident. After several weeks of outside work the rough edges have been worn off and the plays have been running in a very pleasing manner. Shifts in the line have been frequent and hardly a night passes without every man getting a chance.

Yesterday afternoon the squad was pushed through the usual hour and one half of drill.
