Red Chicago

FOR the fifth time in the past three weeks a Chicago gunman has murdered a policeman on the streets of that city. This time robbery was the motive. The crime was committed in daylight in a crowded section of the city before many school children, shoppers, and motorists travelling along the boulevard. The murderer escaped with his accomplices in their automobile. This brings the total number of killings there to nearly two hundred since January 1 of this year. Some sort of action to curb this wanton destructionof life is imperative.

Many people assume an attitude toward all criminals that is based upon false sentimentality. They talk much about giving the criminals a second chance. This may apply to the man who experiments in his cellar and is so pleased with his product that he sells some of it to his neighbors, the bank clerk on a small salary who is tempted beyond his ability to resist, or the thief who steals to provide for a starving family. This sort of criminal may be brought to the realization of the seriousness of his offense and helped to reform. None of these show a vicious nature or a heart of stone.

The man who holds up another at the point of a gun and in meeting with resistance shoots to kill is so bad at heart that there is little possible chance of his reform.

The recent news dispatches from the same city have carried the story of the death from wounds of another killer who has been duly convicted and awaiting execution of his sentence since July, 1922. He has been granted reprieves repeatedly. Such delays in the execution of sentences do much to defeat justice in many cases.

The abolition of professional bondsmen, with the institution of fair but speedy trials, lawyers who are interested in bringing all the truth to light, fearless judges who will mete out punishment that fits the crime, and finally officials who are not swayed by the cheap politician or the sob sisters of the public, and who will carry out the sentences of the courts, will do much to reduce the number of violent crimes that fill our newspapers today.

Two From Four

THE passing of Senator Edwin Fremont Ladd of North Dakota has been the Second overwhelming blow to the Republican insurgent bloc in the senate within five days. The La Follette bloc of four has been reduced to two, a loss which may end it.

By a strange trick of destiny, the North Dakotan died on the funeral day of La Follette, whose policies he had followed. Together they had waged their fight in the independent campaign of 1924 against the constituted ticket, and together they were read out of the Republican party by the senatorial

Another member of the broken bloc is Senator Smith W. Brookhart, whose seat is still insecure.

Senator Ladd was caught in the post-election whirlpool, in which the insurgents were purged of their committee chairmanships by the Republican regulars. Frazier of North Dakota, Brookhart of Iowa, and usually Wheeler of Montana are the remnants of the stubborn, belligerent bloc.

"The King is dead; long live the king!" is the cry. But there is no king now. The bloc may fall, or there may be a long period of regency until a new king, now adolescent, comes to his own.

Religious Cooperation

DELIGIOUS workers attending the ninth N annual conference now in session here are meeting to consider, among other things of spiritual interest, "Community Cooperation Versus Disintegrating Denominationalism," one of the vital issues of the liberalism-fundamentalism controversy.

Too many religious sects in any community and especially in a small community will

stunt the religious, social, and commercial growth of the group. Laymen, when uninfluenced by the clergy, tend to cooperate, recognizing general principles, ignoring insignificant details, to attain the common end, a prosperous community. In the past, the clergy began early vividly to impress upon the minds of their flocks that "this and only this is the way to heaven; all others lead to eternal damnation." In this way communities were divided into hestile groups by the little demon, Self-righteousness, who made religious differences the grounds for social and political community battles.

Modern thought, recognizing that certain religious fundamentals are universal in Christian doctrines and believing that the various sects may well learn to work together, overlooking slight differences of theological opinion, is making an attempt to bring opposing forces together on a common ground to consider the situation in an effort to create a common tolerant attitude.

Religious workers now gathered to consider this problem deserve to be commended and supported in their effort to achieve such

The expedition after touching at Wiscasset, Me., and then at Syd, ney, N. S., for coal and other supplies, will go direct to Etah, Greenland, where the main base will be established. From there the airplanes will go to Cape Hubbard on the northern point of Axel Heiberg land, to establish an advance flying

Veteran Ships Used






