

Scantlebury Ruled Ineligible for Football

Ingwersen Must Find Men to Replace Former Stars

Wilbur E. Scantlebury, rated as the hardest-hitting University of Iowa fullback since the days of Gordon Locke, will not be eligible for competition next fall, was the announcement from Coach B. A. Ingwersen today. The faculty committee on eligibility has ruled that Scantlebury has completed his three years of intercollegiate competition.

Scantlebury, who is a student in the college of law, captained the baseball team from the position of shortstop this spring. He developed fast in football last fall and was responsible for much of Iowa's success in the Michigan game when his line plunged netted many yards and a touchdown to win the game from the Wolverines.

The loss of Scantlebury has added more troubles to those of Coach Ingwersen who points out that of his team which tied for second in the conference race last year: Captain Parkin, all-conference quarterback; Lowell Otte, all-western end; William Fleckenstein, all-conference guard; Forrest Olson, who has played all of every Big Ten game in the past two years; Darrell Fisher, regular back; Wilbur Scantlebury; Scott McIntyre, guard; are all lost. It is a question whether Paul Krauski, guard and tackle, will be eligible so the powerful Hawkeye line will have only Roney, Griffin, and Galloway from last year and the backfield will have Graham, Schirmer, and Dauber, the latter two who have played only part of the season. There is no cause for optimism in the Iowa camp, say those officials in close touch with the situation.

Coach Armbruster Gives Rules for Safety on River

"The best preventive for accidents on the water is for everyone to learn to swim," stated Coach David A. Armbruster today. Following accidents on the river which have taken three lives in the past few weeks, the Iowa swimming coach has suggested some simple rules for canoeists and swimmers.

For the canoeists, Armbruster points out these facts:

Always keep your weight and balance in the center of the canoe and as low as possible. Sit on the bottom especially if learning to paddle.

A canoe is safe if handled with common sense and caution.

If you cannot swim, do not go canoeing unless with some one who can swim for two.

If you fall out of a canoe, get back to the canoe and stick to it until another boat arrives.

When you reach the canoe, swim beside it, and put just enough pressure on it to keep your face above the water. Do not try to climb on top of it.

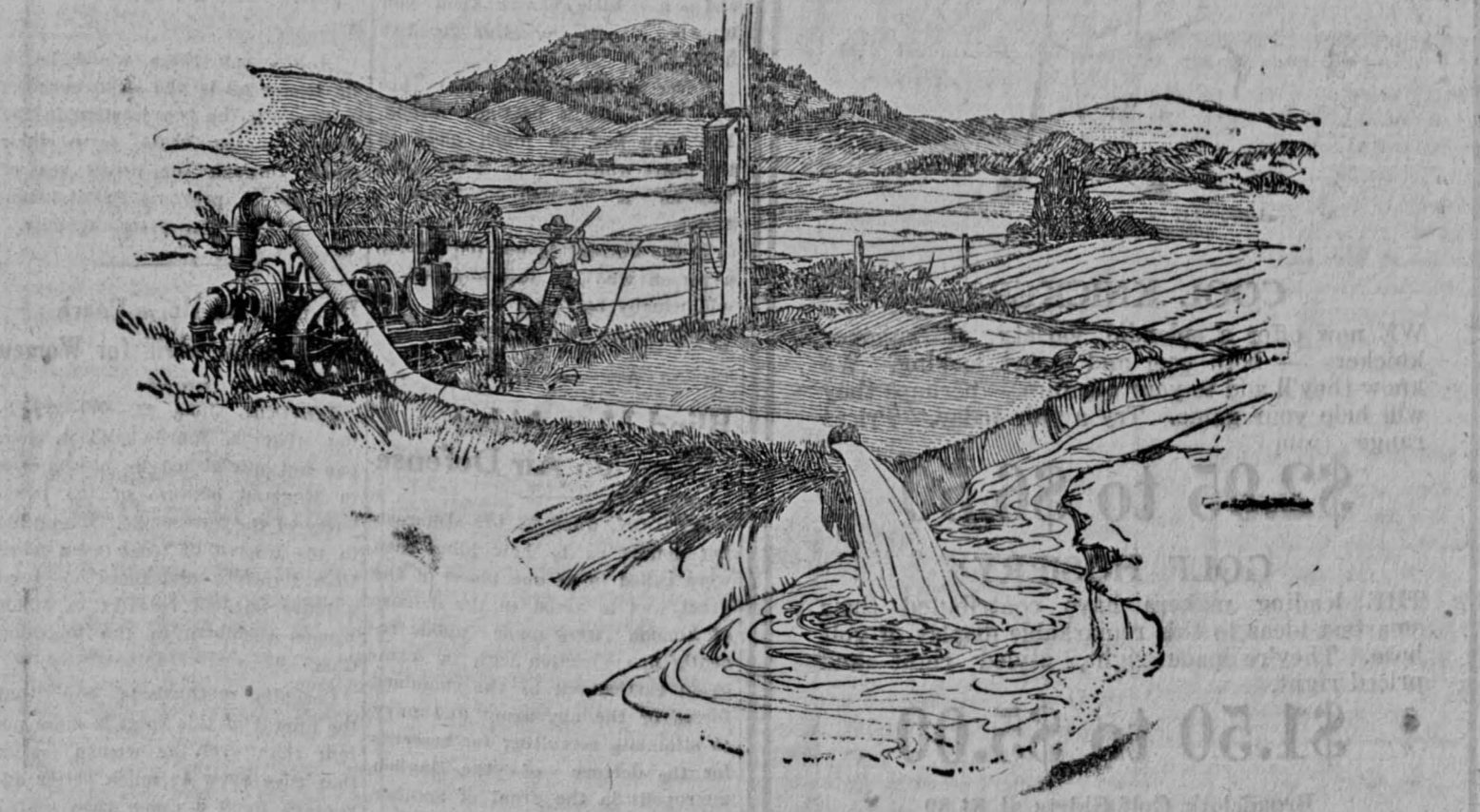
