Salient Points of the Bidding
West correctly bids one Diamond instead of No Trump because of his worthless singleton North's strength and distribution warrant his informative double. East, holding practically as good as an original Heart bid, correctly shows this suit over the intervening double. Hearts being West's weak suit. West then goes to one No Trump. North, not being strong enough to double positively, passes.

Trick 12. North leads a low Spade in preference to the King, as his partner is marked with the Queen, the Jack having forced the Ace on the first trick.

CHICAGO, May 11 (AP)—University of Chicago golfers defeated Iowa's team, 10 to 7, over course number one at Olympia fields today.

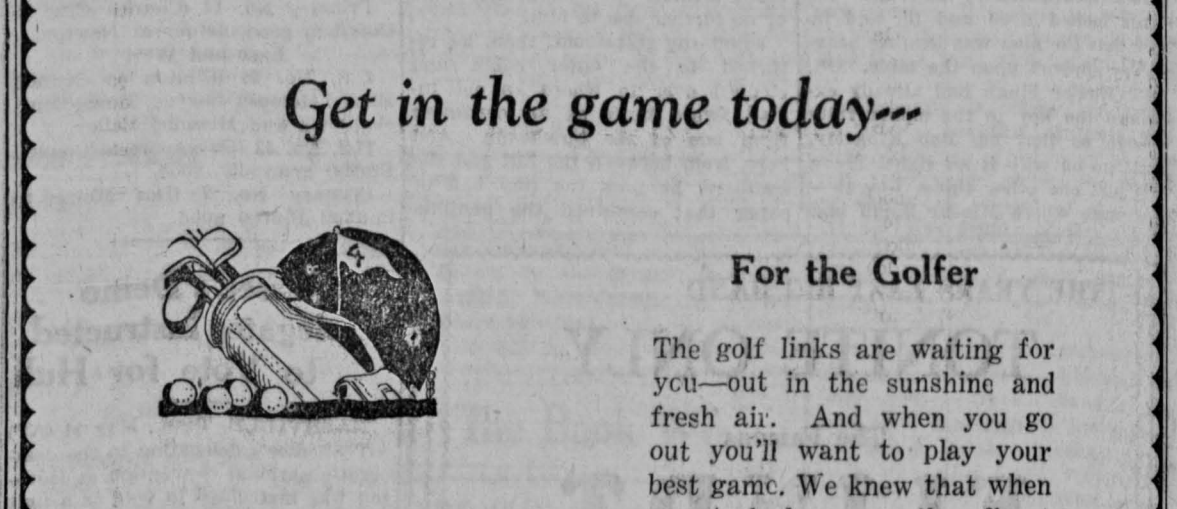
