# Wrestlers Stage Six Bouts at Field House

## Ralph Piergue, Freshman, Defeats Allen Whitten in 145-Pound Clash; Men Fail to Register a Fall

Ralph Piergue of Ft. Dodge, the only freshman to reach the finals of the all-university wrestling tournament, held yesterday in the field house, won the 145-pound title from Allen Whitten of Bayard. His time advantage was five minutes and 45 seconds. In the heavyweight division, Everett Marshall of La Junta, Col., defeated John Gilchrist, varsity wrestling captain, by a time advantage of five minutes flat.

Of the six matches staged, all were rather slow and not a single fall was recorded in the meet. The time advantage in most cases ran high.

The most interesting match was that between Albert Montgomery of Fairfield and Harold Timm of Muscatine. Montgomery managed to run up a 9:10 time advantage, but was unable to pin Timm, who slipped out of head scissors and arm holds with astonishing regularity.

The match in the 115-pound class was postponed, due to the illness of Basil Deegan of Peterson who was to have participated in the bout. This match will probably be held after the holidays.

The 175-pound class bout was not staged, neither of the men scheduled appearing for their match.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 15 (AP)—The University of Pittsburgh basketball team lost its third game in as many nights when the University of Wisconsin five defeated them, 34 to 24, in a wild contest here tonight.

Previously, Pitt's Panthers had fallen before Butler and Northwestern. The game was marked by wild scoring rampages by each team, the Panthers caging five quick points at the outset. Then Kowalozky and Miller made 10 quick points. The half ended 13 to 8 in Wisconsin's favor.

The second period started slowly with the Badger five man defense impregnable for the first ten minutes. Then Charles Hyatt, brilliant Pitt forward, who scored 232 points last season, and who had been held scoreless in the first half, caged two quick baskets. Behind him were his teammates, Cohen, Wunderlich and Zehfuss, and the three brought the score to 21-20. Hyatt featured with his fast floor work, while the whole Badger defense was outstanding. Bud Foster, the Badger forward, led the scoring with 14 points.

Armour collected six birdies and an eagle for the 18 holes, dropping a stroke on the ninth and one on the sixteenth. Armour entered tomorrow's 36 hole finals with an edge of three strokes on John Golden of New Jersey, his nearest competitor, who in turn is one stroke ahead of Eddie Loos of Pasadena.

The University of Pittsburgh was closed last Thursday as a precaution against the spread of influenza. Efforts will be made by Harrison to schedule the game at a later date in the season. Dr. Paul E. Deiting confirmed the report late last night.

The game will be the only post-season contest sanctioned in 1930 and may be continued annually. Proceeds are to go to Shrine hospitals in the south.

## Road Commission to Plan Legislation for County System

DES MOINES, Dec. 15 (AP)—The state secondary road commission which meets here Tuesday to draft legislation looking to a more comprehensive secondary road system for the state, will not advocate turning over jurisdiction of county or township roads to the state highway commission, Louis H. Cook, secretary of the legislative commission, said tonight.

Clifford L. Niles, chairman of the state highway commission, declared the commission does not desire to assume control over the secondary road system at this time.

The state highway commission, Mr. Niles said, will make no recommendations to the legislature concerning secondary roads, but will assume a "hands off" policy since the commission will have plenty to do completing the primary road system.

A revision of the constitution of university players was read and adopted, and according to that revision a board of governors was elected at a meeting of the organization at 4 p.m. Friday in the studio theater. The eight members of the board as elected by popular vote are Lee A. Weber, A4 of Iowa City; Don Howell, A3 of Iowa City; Drew MacDougal, E4 of Nichols; Dorothea Boatwick, A4 of Denver; Col. George Jones, A4 of Iowa City; Marguerite McConkie, A4 of Nevada; Isabel Heupel, A3 of Lyons; and John W. Young, A3 of Hutchinson, Kan.

The creation of the new board of governors will make for more active student leadership in the university theater.

Requirements for admission have been so changed in the constitution as to make the university players a student organization composed of persons vitally interested in and capable of bringing to it talent in any line of work connected with the theater.

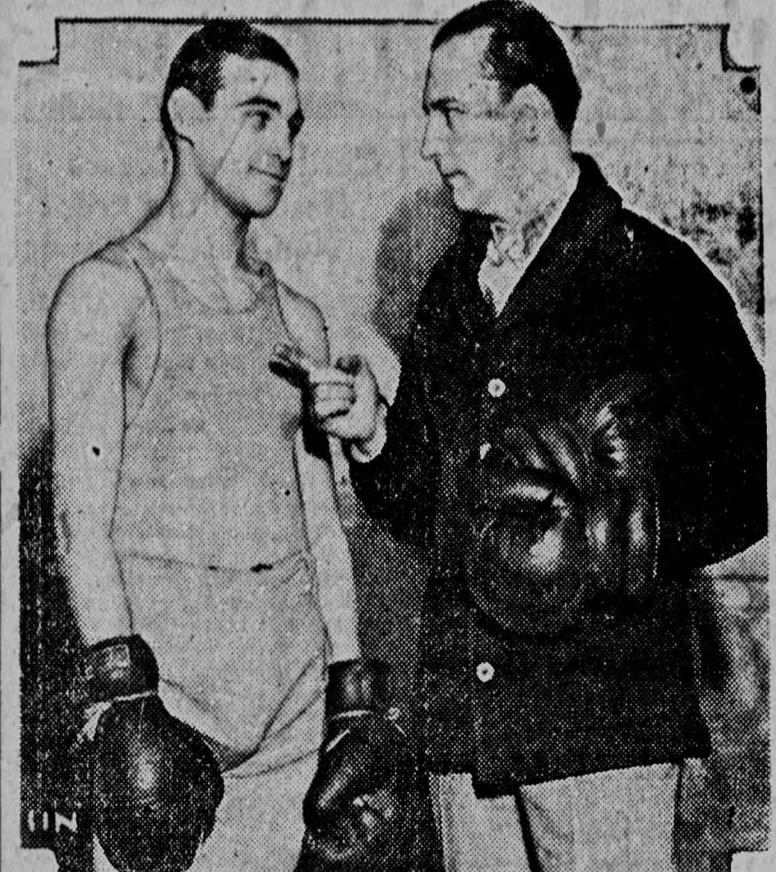
**To Elect Board in Spring**  
The board of governors will include not only the eight persons elected but also the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer of the organization. Election to the board will be held in the spring of each year. Nominees must be juniors or seniors who have had one year of active participation in the university theater, and must have carried a principal role or major responsibility back stage.

The duties of the board will be to select members for university players, and to place activities of players, in other words, to become the governing body of the organization.

### Chicago Authorities Investigate School Conspiracy Charge

CHICAGO, Dec. 15 (AP)—The awarding of contracts for construction work on Chicago school buildings was suspended today and States Attorney Swanson began investigation of charges that school board employees were engaged in a conspiracy to sell contracts.

H. Wallace Caldwell, president of the school board, announced that he had been collecting evidence of the alleged conspiracy since he took office early this year, and calling

off all new contracts, turned the matter over to the states attorney's office.

"From the time I first went into office I have known that the awarding of contracts for school construction work has been tinged with graft," Caldwell said. "At this time I have no incriminating information, but I have ordered all contracts held up pending a complete investigation."
