

Yoder Announces Summer Speakers Course Gives General Idea of Social Work Field

Lecturers for a special short course in social training work during the first term of summer session have been announced by Dale Yoder, chairman of the committee in charge of the courses. The object of this course is to give, in six weeks, a general knowledge of the field of social work. It is intended for students not wishing to become professional workers in the field.

On the lecture staff, with the subjects and weeks that the lectures occur, are: Philip Jacobs, director of personnel and public relations, national tuberculosis association, New York city, "Public health," June 19 to 24.

Edie Dean, general secretary of family social service, Des Moines, "Child welfare," June 17 to 21.

Agnes Schroeder, director of training in medical social work, Western Reserve university, Cleveland, and Robert E. Neff, administrator of the university hospitals, "Medical social work," June 24 to 28.

E. L. Morgan, professor of rural social work, University of Missouri, "Rural social work," July 1 to 5, together with T. J. Edmonds, executive secretary of the Iowa Tuberculosis association, Des Moines; Ralph J. Reed, secretary of the Public Welfare Bureau, Des Moines, "Publicity for social workers," July 15 to 19.

The week, July 8-12 will be given to the subject of "Community organization" but the leader has not yet been announced, according to Mr. Yoder.

Three Reel Film Shows Phases of New York Times

"The making of a great newspaper," a three reel film showing all phases of work behind the pages of the New York Times, will be shown tomorrow at 4:15 p.m. Although journalism students in the university and the city's two high schools have been specially invited, anyone who wishes may attend.

"Very interesting and highly instructive" was the verdict of Prof. Fred J. Lazell, who was president of the American association of schools and departments of journalism when the film was shown before its annual convention here in December, 1927.

Every step in the making of a newspaper is shown. The process of building the finished product includes news gathering, news writing, copy editing, and the mechanical aspects of typesetting, stereotyping, making up forms, press work, elevating papers in a rapid stream to the mailing room, and putting the bundles in trucks or the paper bags of carriers.

Included in the pictures are some on the process of making illustrations from drawings prepared by staff artists. Various types of engravings are explained visually. The designing of advertisements and page layouts is also brought out.

Ruth L. Wilkinson Wins Fellowship at Oyster Bay School

Ruth L. Wilkinson, instructor in the department of graphic and plastic arts has been granted a two month fellowship this summer at the Louis Comfort Tiffany foundation, Oyster Bay, Long Island. Miss Wilkinson will spend June and July studying under the fellowship. Approximately 18 or 20 women are admitted each year, six at a time.

Miss Wilkinson graduated from the Cumming Art school in Des Moines and has taught Saturday classes and summer school there. She has been on the faculty of this university for five years. Last summer she studied with Charles W. Hawthorne, painter, at Provincetown, N. J. She is a member of the Iowa art guild, and during the last two years has been represented in the exhibitions of the Norske club in Chicago.

Edith Bell, Harry Stinson, instructors in the same department, and Catherine MacIntyre and Edna Ratzig, both assistant professors, have studied under similar fellowships in previous years.

Wednesday night he will speak at the Creston junior college, Thursday evening at the Elion high school, and Friday night at the Clarion high school commencement ceremony.

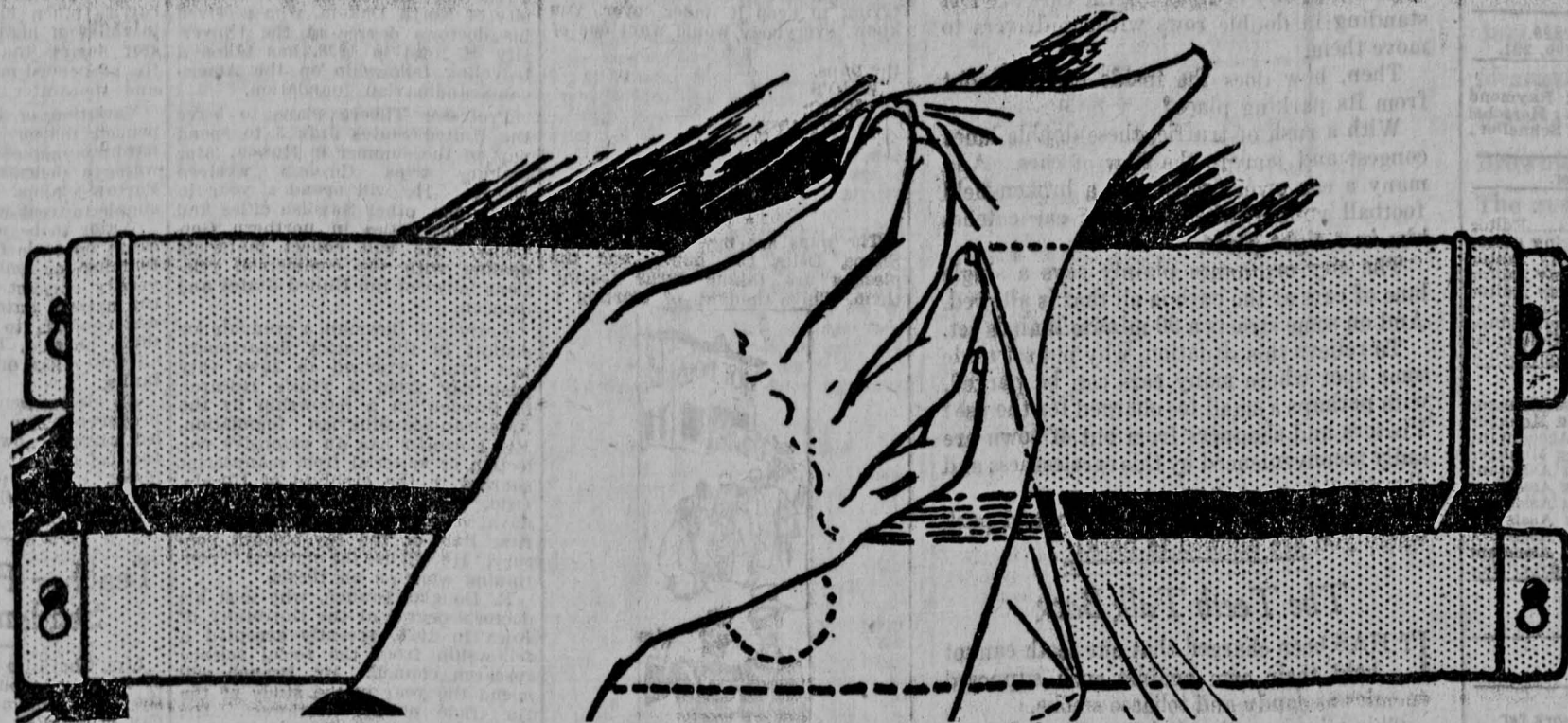
Professor Martin expects to return to Iowa City Saturday.
