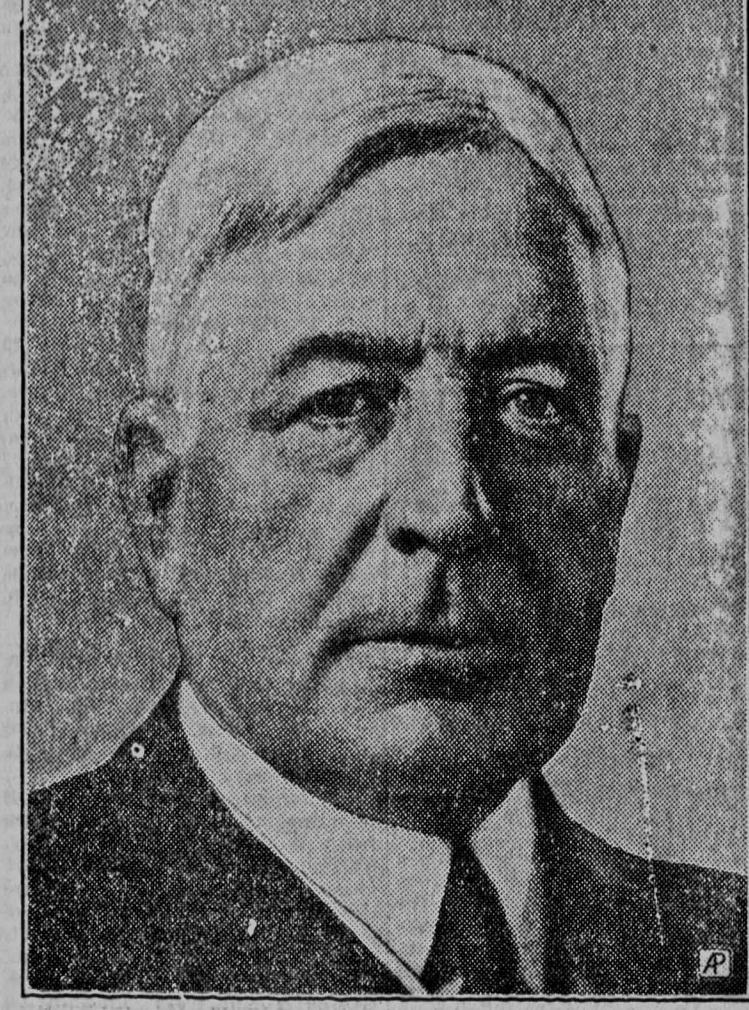

LOWDEN ADVOCATES RESEARCH



EUGENE, Ore., June 11 (AP)—Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, here as the commencement speaker at the University of Oregon, said today that research was the greatest weapon of the age with which to attack what he termed a "grave agricultural problem."

"The history of civilization," Lowden said, "has shown that cities and countries have gone to ruin and decayed when the soils of the country have become impoverished. This, and the fact that cities are drawing more and more of the most ef-

ficent people from the farm represents the problems that this country as well as all others must face. "An impoverishment of soil comes when farmers, to meet forced overhead, must grow the same crops which year after year net the most, he continued, "rather than rotating as they should to enrich and preserve the soil."

"The need for research, not only in material science, but in economic and social phases as well, is paramount," Lowden asserted. "Research should extend particularly to distribution of products."

of the house tariff revision bill, the committee said further: "Tending to revise the tariff in the interest of agriculture, certain selfish interests have been promised new advantages which are without conscience or reason, and which, if enacted into law, will mulct the consumers of the country, farmers included, out of hundreds of millions of dollars of additional tribute per year."

Concluding, the committee said, "We re-declare ourselves for the principle of production cost which properly interpreted, means that the farmer is entitled to the same living standard as that enjoyed by other classes in our great nation."

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—An attack on President Hoover's oil conservation policy and the action of Mark L. Requa, chairman of the oil conference at Colorado Springs, in ruling out of order a resolution favoring rescinding of the executive order barring prospecting on public lands was launched today on the floor of the senate.

Senator Cutting, republican, New Mexico, began the assault by challenging Requa's right to prevent discussion in the conference on any matter pertinent to the issues involved.

The challenged immediately drew from Senator King, democrat, the statement that the oil order was "one of the most lawless acts ever committed by any person." King was joined by Senator Bratton, democrat, New Mexico, who declared that the restrictive policy was an "injustice" to those who had money invested in oil lands.

King announced that he intended to urge the senate judiciary committee to take early action on his resolution proposing an investigation of the president's right to curtail oil production on the public lands.

Committee Fights Tariff Revision, Farm Relief Bills

Organization Favors Equalization Fee Principle

DES MOINES, June 11 (AP)—The corn belt committee today adopted a resolution expressing opposition both to the amended house farm relief bill and the house tariff revision bill. It added, however, that it had "no desire in any wise to interfere with the passage or operation" of the farm relief bill.

"In connection with both the pending farm relief and tariff legislation," the committee, representing 95 farm organizations, said, "we have a feeling bordering on contempt for certain corn belt congressmen, who, throughout the special session, have acted as mere errand boys for special privileges. No names were mentioned."

"The so-called house farm relief bill as amended in conference," the resolution said, "does not manifest the slightest commodities, and, without this, the pledge of the republican party to assure equality for agriculture in the last campaign becomes utterly farcical."

"The committee reiterated its former position on the equalization fee principle, which it called "the only one that will assure genuine equality to agriculture, make the tariff effective and place the loss on the various farm surpluses where it belongs, and where it will act as a deterrent against overproduction, and we deeply appreciate the courage of certain members of the senate who apparently realize that the only thing that will save agriculture from final and complete collapse is a higher price for what the farmer produces."

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The tariff bill passed by the house May 28 after a journey of nearly five months through committee and floor debate will start its long doubtful senate travels tomorrow with the opening of public hearings by the finance committee.

The full committee composed of eleven republicans and eight democrats will receive testimony from nearly a score of witnesses on valuation methods.

Two of the four sub-committees organized to hear arguments on the 15 rate schedules of the bill will get into action Tuesday between that date and June 24, two or three of these groups will be sitting simultaneously. On the latter date all four sub-committees will begin to function at once, hearing testimony on four of the most important sections in the measure, sugar, wool, metals and sundries.

A statement by Senator Allen, republican, Kansas, that he was not satisfied with the bill as it passed the house drew from Senator Robinson of Arkansas, democratic leader, "a welcome into the ranks of pseudo-republicans."

Allen said that the president had specifically asked for a limited revision.

"I see no occasion for a general revision at this time," Allen added, "I came here for a limited revision, on some of the schedules affecting agriculture."

The finance committee hearings will terminate July 10. Then republican committee members will begin rewriting the measure.

Bucher was seriously injured. Authorities learned that the car was standing on the track to let a train on another track pass. Bucher's parents are Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Bucher of Winthrop, Ia.

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The future status of Des Moines university remained unsolved tonight after a meeting of the board of trustees adjourned until June 19. A quorum was lacking.

Dr. T. T. Shields, chairman of the board, was not present but Miss Edith M. Rebmam, secretary, attended. The board was to consider applications for positions on the faculty. Miss Rebmam said she had a large number from instructors desirous of teaching in the classrooms from which Dr. H. C. Wayman, president, and the faculty of 40 members was dismissed before a student riot a month ago today.

The dismissals were effective June 4, the day after Dr. Wayman and the faculty issued diplomas to 50 seniors under a court injunction which kept the school open despite Dr. Shields' order to close it. The graduates never have received the sanction of the trustees.

The June 19 meeting is expected to consider this matter also. Trustees have indicated that some of the degrees granted may be substituted with diplomas signed by Dr. Shields and Miss Rebmam. Others issued to students who led the riot of May 11, may be denied.

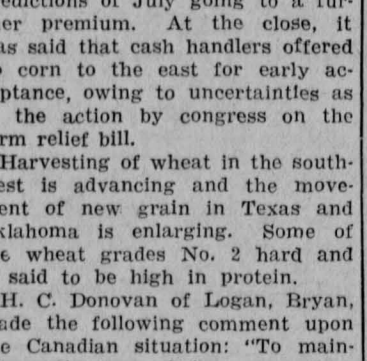

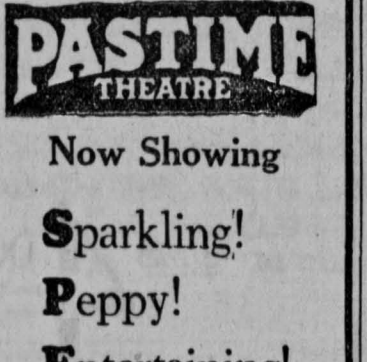

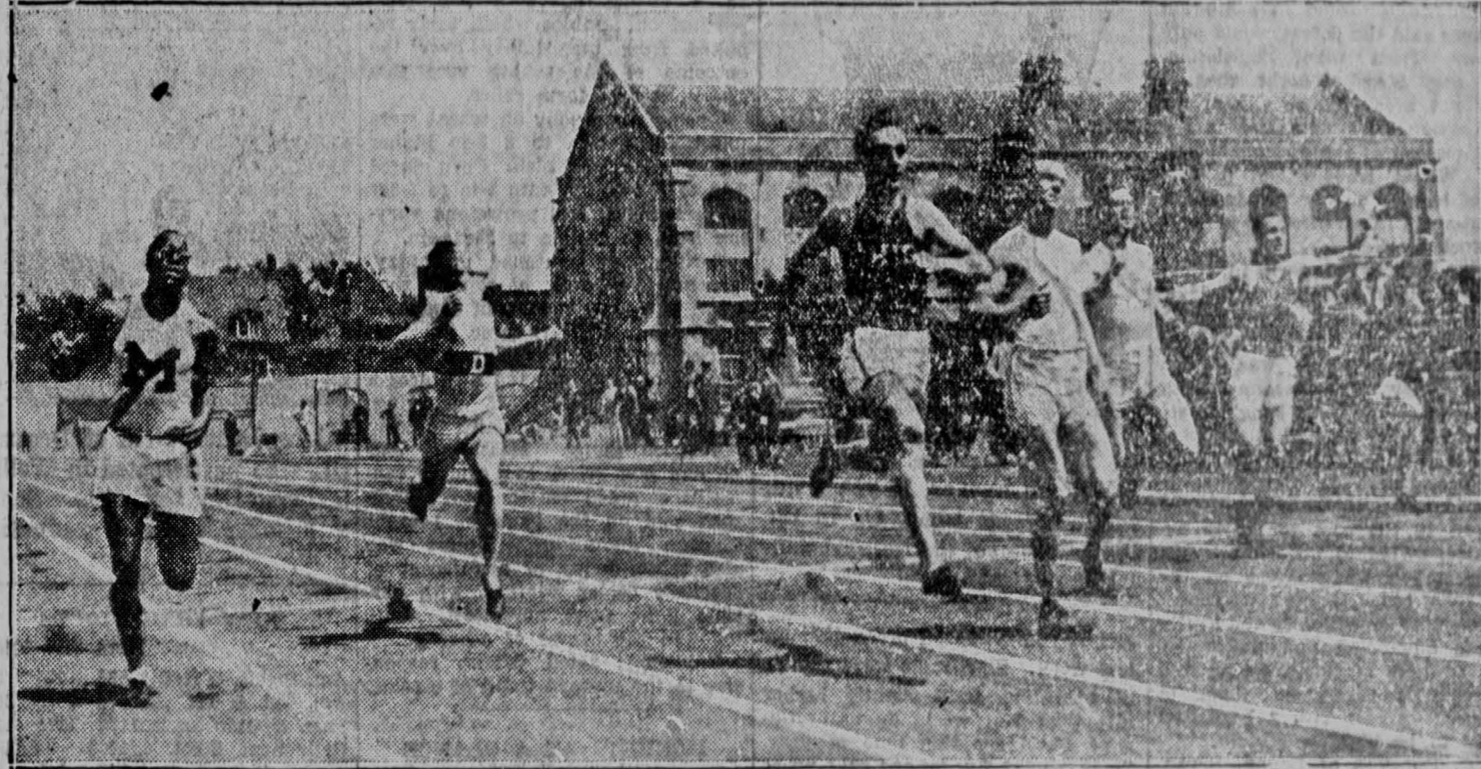

CHICAGO, June 11—He came back smiling. Silently, without a word to anyone, George Simpson, Ohio State's cinder path cyclone, trotted into the dressing room at Stagg field last Saturday after electrifying the world by running the 100-yard dash in the national collegiate annual track and field meet faster than any human being has ever run it. But that is characteristic of Simpson. He has little to say at all times, and less often has something to say about himself. If it hadn't been for the keenness of a high school coach six years ago in Columbus, this same reserve and reticence might have deprived the world of one of its greatest champions. George wasn't participating in athletics at that time. He didn't like to shove himself ahead then any more than he does now.

"You come out for track tonight," the coach of the Columbus, O., Central high school team said one day. "You look like you might be a runner."

So George went. He was the sensation around Ohio and particularly his home town of Columbus during those days and finally enrolled in Ohio State. Simpson has been one of the most consistent sprinters in the country for two years. He has always won his races in better than even time. In the Olympic tryouts at Boston last summer he pulled a tendon in the final heat with a lead. Saturday's race climaxed his year's athletic activity with a performance which should stand for years. Simpson's father and mother sat in the stands and saw their son triumph in world's record time.
