

Seven Veteran Professors on Faculty Serve University at Least Half of 73-Year Period

Forty-Four Instruct Classes More Than 20 Years; Professor Wilson Leads in Point of Service on Iowa's Staff

During at least half of the 73 years of instruction, University of Iowa faculty rolls have borne the names of seven professors, each of whom will begin another season of service Sept. 23.

These veterans of the faculty became affiliated with the institution between 1858 and 1892, in the days when the university's student body numbered under 1,000 persons. They are among the 44 professors who have served the university more than 20 years.

Patricians of the active faculty are Charles B. Wilson, head of the German department; Frank T. Greene, head of the college of dentistry; and Elbert W. Rockwood, professor of chemistry and former head of that department. Each of these men will start his forty-second year.

Wilson Leads Colleagues
Professor Wilson, now the oldest member of the faculty in point of service at present rank, came from Cornell University of New York in 1888 as head of the department of German. He then was 27 years old, the youngest Iowa departmental head of the period.

The four other men who have held their posts during at least half of the university's years of instruction are Bohuml Shimek, botany, 39 years; Henry E. Wickham, zoology, 38 years; Dr. Ernest A. Rogers, dentistry, and Prof. Gilbert L. Houser, zoology, 37 years.

Ten serve 30 to 35 years. Ten staff members have been in the employ of the university for 20 to 25 years, and 27 others are ranked in the 20 to 30 year division.

Court Rules Whiting Superintendent Still Heads School System

ONAWA, Sept. 9 (AP)—W. P. Ashton, for the past 11 years superintendent of schools at Whiting, remains as head of the consolidated school system there by virtue of a court decision handed down here today voiding action of the board of education in employing another man in Ashton's place.

Ashton had been re-employed as superintendent by the old board of education prior to its recent relinquishment of duty to a new board. The new board decided to oust Ashton and also made a contract with E. L. Fowler to become superintendent.

Judge C. C. Han'ton, in district court, ruled that the board was empowered to elect "a superintendent" under the law, which was interpreted to mean one superintendent. The judge ruled the contract made with Fowler was void.

Norris Introduces Resolution to Bar Vane From Senate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9 (AP)—The three-year-old dispute over the right of William S. Vane to a seat in the senate was suddenly forced before the tariff minded senate for determination today by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, with a resolution to bar the Pennsylvania republican.

Offered just as the debate on the tariff bill was opening, the resolution was promised precedence over the tariff, to which the Nebraska senator is vigorously opposed. The surprised republican leadership forestalled debate on Norris' resolution for a day but Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, announced he thought the Vane case should be settled now.

It seemed certain tonight that the issue would sidetrack indefinitely the republican tariff measure beginning tomorrow or Wednesday.

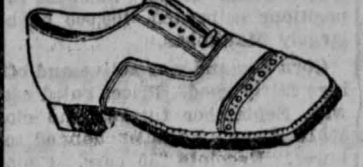

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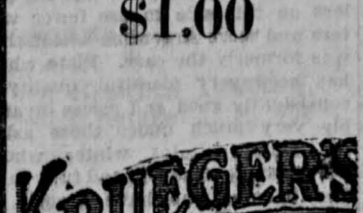
