





### Wets Invoke Irony, Latin in Dry Debate

#### Representative Names Cannon as Dry Cheerleader

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—The ancient classics were invoked today by wets in the house as they debated on the war department supply bill into the field of prohibition to assail the dries for applauding what they termed "dry killings."

Irony and Latin were employed by Representative Black, democrat, New York, as he nominated Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church south, to be a "cheerleader for the dries."

"Of course," he said, "I do not want him to turn any somersaults here because some chips and stocks might fall out of his pocket."

#### Schafer Cites Bible

Representative Schafer, republican, Wisconsin, drew an analogy from the Bible.

"Each day's tragic news," he asserted, "indicates more human lives sacrificed on the altar of prohibition."

He characterized this figure as a "god" of the dries, "which must have blood."

Giving what he termed a theme song of Horace, the celebrated Latin poet, Representative Black shouted "nunc est bibendum (now is the time to drink)."

His delving into the classics was by way of emphasizing his demand that President Hoover's law enforcement commission hold public hearings. He said it should give "a judicial determination whether the prohibition law is workable."

#### General Let Down

"If it does not do that," he said "then the entire congress should re-buke it, because it will have proved itself useless."

"There has been a general let down lately in the speeches made by the dries," he asserted, and cited the speech of Representative Beedy, dry republican, of Maine, yesterday, as a "particular specimen."

#### Professor Bartow Writes of Hearing Homecoming Score

In a letter from Shanghai, dated Dec. 2, Prof. Edward Bartow of the chemistry department wrote that he had heard the results of the Iowa homecoming game. Professor Bartow said he had stopped some time in Peking and had been in Nanking, where he was shown around by a University of Illinois graduate.

Grantland Rice recently told of the success of boy scouts on the football field in naming his all-American selections over the radio.

Some of the all-American stars named this year who have been scouts are Cagle of the Army; Cahoon of Notre Dame; Donohoe of Pittsburgh; Tappan of Southern California; Sleight and Welch of Purdue; Ackerman of St. Mary's; Banker of Tulane; Nagurski of Minnesota; and Capt. "Bill" Glasgow of Iowa.

Other outstanding players of the year who have been scouts are Schwartz of California; Cox of Colgate; Sington of Alabama; McEver of Tennessee; Huffard of Washington; and Wakeman of Cornell, who was a sea scout.

In the February number of Boys' Life, the magazine published by the Boy Scouts, an all-American, all-scout team will be chosen.

### Senate Votes Increases on Rayon Tariffs

#### Controversy Over Next Article to Come up Causes Dispute

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Further increases in rayon tariffs were approved today by the senate during an all day session devoted exclusively to this fast growing industry.

With the exception of the first paragraph in the new schedule, approved yesterday but reconsidered today and deferred for final action until new import statistics are received, work on committee amendments to the rayon section was completed.

Another controversy then began over whether the papers and books schedule, which follows rayon in the bill, or the highly disputed sugar duties, should be taken up tomorrow. That was unsettled when the senate adjourned.

#### Smoot Asks Disposal

Chairman Smoot, of the finance committee, said the sugar rates had been deferred long enough and asked that they should be disposed of immediately. Senator Harrison, democrat, Mississippi, however, asked that they go over until Monday and made a motion to that effect, but Smoot prevailed upon him to postpone offering it until tomorrow.

Not a single record vote was required today, despite a severe assault on the proposed increases by Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, who cited treasury income tax figures to show that 70 per cent of the American rayon mills were foreign controlled and were making millions in profits while paying their workers "pitiable pittance" for wages.

#### Wheeler Makes Suggestion

It was at Wheeler's suggestion that the senate reconsider its action of yesterday in approving slight increases in duties on single and plied yarns not especially provided for.

The Montanan described the minimum duty "as little less than a scandal" and said it was equivalent to an ad valorem of between 60 and 112 per cent. The ad valorem rates in the bill on these yarns are 45 and 50 per cent, depending on weight.

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### Members Law Faculty Return From Meeting

Members of the college of law faculty have returned recently from the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the association of American law schools held in New Orleans Dec. 27, 28, and 30.

Prof. H. Claude Horack, as president of the organization, gave an address the opening morning on "Law schools today and tomorrow." He pointed out that although the use of the case system has replaced the textbook system in the law

schools during the last decade, the real case method is not being used. Instead, cases serve as illustrative or supplementary material. He expressed the opinion that in the future a new system might be made wherein the four year law course would be divided into two divisions of two years each, the junior branch of which would use the case method exclusively and the senior branch that method as well as any others suitable.

The possibility of using moving pictures, since the advent of the "talkies," was also suggested as being of especial value in practice court work.

## Mace Brown Banned After Pro Charges

### Iowa Eligibility Ban Hits Vogel's Ace of Pitchers

Another bomb was exploded in the University of Iowa baseball camp yesterday when C. C. Williams, chairman of the eligibility committee, announced that Mace Brown, veteran Hawkeye pitcher had been ruled out of competition, adding the second hurler on Coach Otto Vogel's squad to be declared ineligible. Virgil David, left handed hurler, was declared out of competition just before the basketball season opened. Both pitchers had been accused of playing professional baseball at Marshall, Minn., last summer.

Charges of professionalism against Mace Brown came from three sources, according to C. C. Williams. The first source was a letter from Major John L. Griffith, commissioner of athletics in the Big Ten conference.

Mace Brown has not been enrolled in the university this semester. He was working on the Pacific coast in and around Hollywood, Cal. The North English pitcher returned to Iowa City day before yesterday with plans of registering at the beginning of the next term. His plans following the action of the eligibility committee have not yet been made.

The charges of professionalism are said to be based around the claim that Brown joined the semi-pro baseball team last summer and played under the name of Thompson for the Marshall, Minn., outfit. This club is the same that Virgil David is accused of competing with last summer. With that team Brown was said to have hurled a no-hit-no-run game that added to the fame of "Thompson."

The blow to Otto Vogel's hurling

staff leaves Iowa without the services of any of the three stars that carried the hurling burden through the 1929 season on the southern, mid-western, and eastern trips last year. Iowa came within a half game of being Michigan for the title. Forrest Twoogood, big southpaw was lost by graduation last spring and joined the St. Louis Cardinal farm at Rochester, N. Y., of the International league, where he was transferred to Danville, Ill., of the Three-Eye league.

Virgil David returned to school but upon the report of the status of the Iowa basketball captain, and baseball star by Major Griffith, the Iowa committee found him involved in scholarship difficulties and he was disqualified. Later professional charges were hurled at him. Cincinnati announced the signing of David two weeks ago, and he will likely join them when the Reds go south. Brown came as the third loss to the mound staff.

The pitching situation will be a task for Coach Vogel to work out with a staff made up of sophomores and year reserve hurlers. The Iowa mentor having had success at changing one catcher into a pitcher hopes to develop another hurler out of Elmer Nelson, the Clearfield javelin thrower and backstop in an effort to brace his shattered mound crew.

### Ingwersen Talks on New York Meet

A report by Burton A. Ingwersen, Iowa's football coach, on the meeting of coaches held in New York city during the Christmas holidays was given before the Iowa City Lions club at their weekly luncheon yesterday noon at the Hotel Jefferson. Ingwersen is a member of the new rules committee.

Several changes in the present football rules were proposed at the meeting, chief of which were the abolishment of the point after touchdown, by which so many games were won during the last season; the revision of the rule relating to simultaneous fouls by both teams; and the insertion of a new rule that would permit a team having possession of the ball within five yards of the sidelines to move it out 15 yards from the sidelines without a play by granting a down.

All the proposed changes were rejected, Ingwersen said, because of the fact that the national football rules committee is planning to rewrite the present rule book so that it will be more easily understandable and less subject to controversy on its points. On this account the committee does not wish to have any changes made this year.

In concluding, the Iowa mentor related that the question most frequently put to him was, "why were 13 men declared ineligible at Iowa?"
