Parents Hear Faults During First Day of Welfare Meeting

Dr. Sherman Tells Mothers of Child Needs

250 Persons Register for Child Study Conference

Parents Need Education to Rear Children

Mrs. Gruenberg Puts Blame for Error on Ignorance

Registration was expected to reach 500 by today, although more than 250 persons had signed up by last night. The business end of it went along smoothly, according to Esther N. Cooper, co-chairman of the conference. Visitors were registered, housed, fed, packed off to exhibits and lectures, and finally sent home to bed, without a hitch.

Now for the sidelights. Mrs. Sidonie Gruenberg, one of the keynote speakers, attended the first meeting of this sort held here four years ago. Her husband, Max Gruenberg, also an authority on child development problems, was on last year's program. The Gruenbergs have four children, who are being reared in the modern manner.

Myrtle Meyer Eldred, who for many years has written "Your baby and mine," a feature syndicated by the Des Moines Register, is one of the journalists attending the conference. For a number of years Mrs. Eldred has made her home in New York but has recently returned to Des Moines to live.

Interest in the round tables is being shown by Sinaida Hoodnitzkaya of Moscow, who has been sent to the United States by the soviet government to study educational methods in this country. She is particularly interested in parent education, and hopes to introduce many of the methods followed here into her own country.

Speaking of round tables, one woman declared that practices as such were bad for children, to which Prof. Amy L. Daniels replied that perhaps it isn't the pancakes that are bad for them; it might be the cook.

During the discussion on hard and soft boiled eggs, an appropriate topic at such a time, one of the male round table enthusiasts asked the proper length of time to boil eggs for his children. The chairman promptly gave him a pointer in home economics, to wit: never boil your eggs; that's what makes 'em tough.

God, shall he be to my child a huge phosporus being until the child is 12 years old, with possibility of wrecking his concept altogether in rebuilding it, or shall God be a vague something too indefinite to be understood by the child until he is grown and perhaps not then? Parents at the round table on religion asked themselves that yesterday afternoon.

While the children sleep, stay-at-home parents may listen in at 8:30 tonight on a lecture by E. A. Bott, head of the department of psychology, University of Toronto. His talk on "Parent education and a community program of mental hygiene," will be broadcast by station WSUI.

Except that he has been brought up to it the 1930 Thomas Sawyer chafes in much the same confinement which drove Huckleberry Finn to run away. He is caged in dress up clothing, shoes. To prevent accidents he is carefully kept in check. He takes the equivalent of Aunt Polly's "pain killer" to ward off all danger of disease. Unlike Huckleberry Finn, he stands no chance of running off. Police captures are too efficient when the pursued are juveniles.

So parents, who grew up in more of a Tom Sawyer environment, parents who are much less elastic in adapting themselves to this changed situation—parents really need educating as much as the children if they are to lead rather than to watch the development of their children, Mrs. Gruenberg said.

Radio and Cinderella
To illustrate she mentioned the absence of means in a city-bred youngster of references in his literature to a village blacksmith who working under a chestnut tree. She cited a case of children to whom Cinderella's fairy ball was a bridge party with a radio playing music.

In all this routinization, this usurping of the home's functions by other institutions—has the family lost its power? Not in the opinion of Mrs. Gruenberg.

"The home is the innocent victim of changes over which no individual seems to have control," she admitted, "but under these changed conditions and even with many of its functions taken away, it has assumed more importance, has become more of a home and less of a household."

There is greater opportunity to concentrate on those things always considered essential—the interrelationship of younger and older, guiding and developing youth and interpenetrating the world.

Old Excuses Gone
"The parent of today can't hide behind other accomplishments," she observed. "Neighbors can't say, 'Yes, she's very cross with her children, but just look at her preserves and quilting.'"

Each city should be considered essentially a community of parents, in the belief of Mrs. Gruenberg. "It should not be possible for a moving picture owner to run pictures on a lower scale than he would for his own children," she insisted adding that "the failure of parents is the failure of us all."

Williams Will Go to Canada to Convention

Prof. Clement C. Williams, dean of the college of engineering, will attend the meeting of the society for the promotion of engineering education at Montreal, Canada, June 26-28. This is the thirty-eighth annual meeting of the society under the auspices of the Ecole Polytechnique and McGill university.

Professor Williams is a member of the committee on the Lamm award. The award is given to the instructor which the committee decides has made the greatest contribution to engineering education during the year.

From this meeting Professor Williams will go to Yale university, where he will lecture at a special school for engineering instructors, July 1-23. His four lectures include purposes, content, and scope of courses in highway and railway engineering; teaching economics of engineering; railway economics, and teaching structural engineering foundations.

Iowan Named to Committee

Prof. S. M. Woodward, head of the department of mechanical and hydraulic, has been appointed to the advisory committee which is to confer with the director of the bureau of standards in regard to the construction and program of a new national hydraulic laboratory in Washington, D. C.

The project was authorized by the present congress, President Hoover signed the bill two weeks ago. A sum of \$350,000 will be spent in construction of the laboratory.

A meeting of the committee, which consists of five civil engineers, Professor Woodward being the only man from the middle west, will be held June 25, according to a wire received by Mr. Woodward late yesterday afternoon.

Irwin was granted the master of arts degree at the university two weeks ago after working on the subject which he will pursue further at Chicago.

any and all assessments. The board should also take an inventory of the taxable property of the state, using the inventory as a basis for a uniform state wide ratio of assessment to valuation.

Central Direction Although it is largely true that intangible property does at present escape assessment it is an exaggeration to say that such property can not be discovered and assessed.

Why Income Tax? The advocates of the income tax are careful to make it clear that this tax is not suggested as a tax in addition to the general property tax, nor as a complete substitute for the latter.

Argued Disadvantages Some of the arguments against the proposed income tax are as follows:

1. It is said the income tax would be of no real benefit to the farm owner, since it would result in a saving of only a few cents per acre, at the most.

2. Many of the farms of Iowa are known to be heavily mortgaged, and if an income tax were levied, one result might be an increased rate of interest on these loans.

3. Persons with unearned incomes will buy tax exempt securities, and thus escape taxation; a tax on unearned incomes only is "brutal and unfair."

The action was taken by the board of trade directors after they had received notice from Cottingham that the Rural Grain company's capital had been exhausted.

Organized Under Farm Board The Farmers' National Grain corporation, which was organized at the request and under the approval of the farm board, purchased the Rural Grain company last year to obtain a membership on the board of trade.

Order Audit of Books The Farmers' National Grain corporation, in a written statement issued soon after the suspension was announced, asserted that it was in no way connected with the Rural Grain company at the present time.

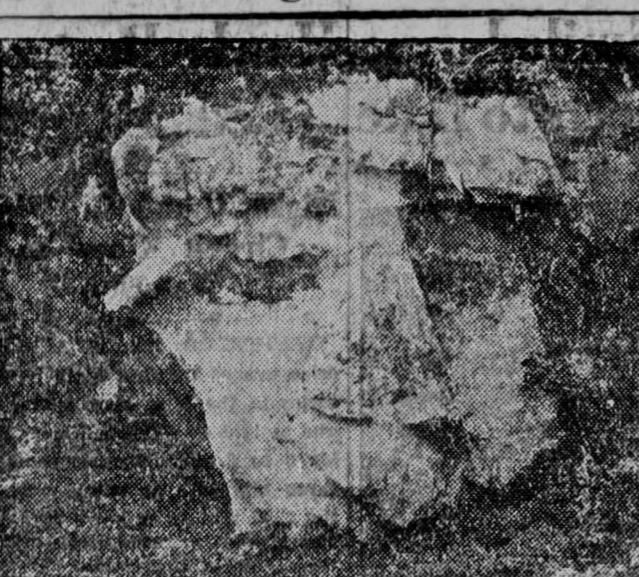

Judge B. F. Carter Advises Against Secret Marriages

Most Couples Dislike Newspaper Stories of Weddings

Missing a father's care himself from the beginning Justice B. F. Carter feels the need to supply that care to other boys and girls when he can.

It often happens that people come to his office to be married. Of course, Judge, knowing them and reading into the future the heartaches that secret weddings often cause, advises against it. Always in such cases the persons involved have come back to thank Judge Carter for saving them from making a sad mistake.

"It is not that secret weddings do not pay highly in fees," explained the judge, "but I always feel that I can much, much easier forfeit the fee than think of the unhappiness I might have caused someone."

If there are a great many mental pangs attached to the business of marrying people, there are also a good many laughs connected with the whole thing, Mr. Carter went on to say. "In my memory there stands out a case that turned out to be really very funny," the judge smiled in reminiscence.

One's As God's Another
One day a young couple came into his office to be married. The next day a minister in the city called and wanted to know if the judge had married "so and so."

"They're here and want to get married on the same license," the minister explained. The judge suggested that if they would feel better if they stood up before the minister and went through the ceremony as if nothing had ever happened, let them. They went through it again and were happy.

Of course, the judge explained, the husband knew that it was all a big joke, but the idea of the second ceremony before a minister was to satisfy the bride or some of her relatives who began having qualms about the validity of the first marriage. "There is nothing to the idea of a marriage before a justice of peace being invalid, naturally," Mr. Carter pointed out.

Don't Tell a Soul
Ninety-nine per cent of the persons that come into his office to get married don't want it to get into the newspapers. The reasons for the secrecy are varied. "Some don't want their friends to know it, and rather

like the idea of "putting something over on someone," as Mr. Carter phrased it. Either one of the other of the parties might have a teaching position and for that reason it

is necessary to keep the marriage a secret for the time being. During the last five years the judge has performed 126 marriages. Of these the majority of participants have been out of town persons. "The out of town marriages," the judge explained, "are a strictly business proposition for me, even though an adventure for the persons concerned that's all there is to that."

Father Killed By Brigands
Judge Carter's parents immigrated from England and settled in Free, Iowa Kan., where the judge was born. At that time Kansas was wild and full of roaming Indians. During the Civil war his parents moved to Illinois. There it was the custom for pioneers to lay in a year's provisions all at once. Judge Carter's father was killed by a band of brigands while he was returning from a distant town with the year's food supply. Judge Carter has lived in Iowa City continuously for 14 years and has acted in his capacity as justice of the peace for six years.
