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HITLER PLANS TO TAKE PRESIDENCY

A Dead Time-Yet a Happy One As Doctor, Skeleton Of Patient Breakfast.

CHICAGO, Aug. 1 (AP)—There'll be a reunion at the breakfast table Thursday of the doctor and his late patient.

Even though the patient is but a skeleton of his former self, 'twill be a happy time. For the occasion is the inaugural meeting of the Post Mortem club, folks who have pledged to turn in their skeletons when they are all through with them.

He'll Be There Of course the guest of honor, being on a strict diet now, will not be served with berries and cream along with those who gather to fete him—doctors of naprapathy attending their twenty-fifth annual convention here. But he'll be there, just the same, wired up in the chair of honor so that he won't rattle.

Dr. Oakley Smith, founder and president of the naprapaths, told of the origin of the Post Mortem club today. Seven years ago, he related, he examined a patient and advised him that no cure could be found for the advanced paralysis with which he was afflicted. The patient, saying he appreciated the doctor's ministrations, promised to bequeath his skeleton to him.

Promise Was Kept A few days ago, Dr. Smith said, a big box was delivered to him by express. Opening it, he found his former patient had kept the promise. Here he was, in skeleton form.

Dr. Smith got busy and organized the Post Mortem club. Each member was promised that his skeleton some day will sit at the place of honor at the breakfast table.

The nine charter members and the skeleton of a former patient will sit down tomorrow to celebrate founder's day. As far as the guest of honor is concerned, there'll be no after breakfast speeches.

700 Troops Withdrawn in Minneapolis After Raid

Conclusion Of Militia Rule Is Seen in Order

90 Longshoremen Again Walkout in Protest At Frisco

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 1 (AP)—Withdrawal of most of the national guard troops from Minneapolis, where they climaxed a week of military rule in the truck drivers strike with two raids on strike headquarters and the arrest of picketers, was ordered tonight by Adj. Gen. E. A. Walsh.

The order sending some 700 troops back to the fair grounds and leaving a force of about 300 within the city proper, was interpreted by some guard officers as the forerunner of the lifting of military rule, in effect here one week.

General Walsh's announcement followed a lengthy conference between himself, Gov. Floyd B. Olson, Col. Elmer McDevitt, provost marshal, and Grant Dunne, one of the strike leaders.

General Walsh was represented as being almost ready to recommend lifting of the martial rule. Staff officers of the troops interpreted the governor's statement indicating strike leaders now under arrest would be released soon, as strengthening belief that city soon would be restored completely to control of civil officers.

Chicago Peace Sought CHICAGO, Aug. 1 (AP)—Striking stockyards handlers and officials of the union stockyards and transit company were brought together in a new series of peace councils tonight, with federal conciliators slightly more optimistic than before that the eight-day strike can be terminated.

Accused of Misapplication Twenty-five former officers or directors of the Detroit Bankers company and its units are accused of misapplying \$544,221.35 of bank funds through the purchase of inadequately secured notes from other banks.

Ballyhoo Included Also under indictment are John Ballyhoo, dean of Detroit bankers, former president of the Detroit Bankers company, now president of the Manufacturers National bank, and Wilson W. Mills, former chairman of the First National bank, Detroit, largest unit of the Detroit Bankers company.

Climaxing Senator Huey P. Long's bitter fight against the city government, partial martial law has been declared in New Orleans, La., and national guardsmen have taken charge of the city registration office to protect lists of persons qualified to vote in the pending congressional elections.

Long's Troops Demobilized

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 1 (AP)—As Mayor T. Semmes Walmsley mustered more men and guns than Senator Huey P. Long in their police-militia "war," Adj. Gen. Raymond H. Fleming announced tonight that half of the senator's national guardsmen were being demobilized.

Half Dismissed Adjutant General Fleming, from his headquarters at Jackson barracks where 500 militiamen were under arms, said he had dismissed "half of the 300 men called out" because "they were not needed."

Broadens Orders Gov. O. K. Allen at Baton Rouge broadened his proclamation of partial martial law and ordered the soldiers to scurry throughout the city and uncover, "without the use of any force," asserted evidences of vice, gambling and graft.

Following the governor's proclamation, which declared partial martial law here, the new order directs Adjutant General Fleming and militiamen under his command to "make a survey and investigation to determine when and where red light districts are operating within the city of New Orleans under the sanction of city authorities."

Austria Sends Third Nazi To Death in Noose

VIENNA, Aug. 1 (AP)—With the hangman's rope, a sentence of imprisonment and empty pay envelopes, the government of Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg today pressed its fight against the defeated Nazi rebels of Austria.

Third to Die Wurnig, the third Nazi to die on the gallows in two days, collapsed when he was told that clemency was refused and had to be carried to the gallows.

Another Trial Today Trial of another Nazi is scheduled to begin here tomorrow.

"Hell Hitler" The order recalled that 20 federal employes were reported to have cried "Hell Hitler" when the Nazi putschists elzied the chancellor's last Wednesday.

Majority Peasants The semi-official newspaper "Weltblatt" summing up today the Nazi rebellion in the provinces which followed the seizure of the chancellor and the killing of Dollfus reported that the majority of the rebels were peasants.

Dillinger May Disinter Body

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 1 (AP)—John Dillinger, Sr., today sought and obtained permission to disinter the body of his son, "Wooden Gun John."

Accompanied by his attorney, Samuel J. Mantel, the 70 year old father of the slain desperado went to the state board of health and filled out forms necessary for exhumation of the body which was buried last week in Crown Hill cemetery here.

He gave no reason for wanting to disinter the body and later between his stage appearances at a local theater he declined to discuss the matter. He would only say the action was taken following communication with some persons in Chicago. He refused to name these persons.

Nazi Leader May Use Army to Seize Position

BERLIN, Aug. 2 (Thursday) (AP)—President Paul von Hindenburg, after increasing general weakness, early today lapsed into a deep coma, according to a physicians' communique at 5:45 a.m.

BEIRLIN, Aug. 2 (Thursday)—The dying Reichspresident, Paul von Hindenburg, still was showing a powerful will to live early today as Chancellor Hitler, his probable successor, deliberated over Germany's future with members of his cabinet.

Amazed At Resistance About an hour and a half after the startling report that the Reichspresident was in the death throes, at 9:50 p.m., his physician, Dr. Ferdinand Sauerbruch, telephoned from Neudeck that he was amazed at the president's powers of resistance and said he might linger for some time.

Had Shown Improvement This step, say political observers, would give Hitler a dictatorship as absolute as any in the world.

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Seeded Teams Win Twice In Doubles in Meadowbrook

SOUTHAMPTON, N. Y., Aug. 1 (AP)—Eight seeded teams came through two rounds of match play without an upset today as the doubles field of 32 pairs in the Meadow Brook club's forty-fourth annual invitation tennis tournament was reduced to eight quarter finalists. Singles play was suspended.

The top seeded pair, Berkeley Bell of New York and Gregory Mangin of Newark, who are out to retire the doubles trophy this year after victories in 1929 and 1930, got off to a good start by winning a pair of straight-set matches. They first eliminated Elmer Griffin, New York, and George Burghard, Westhampton, 6-1, 6-1, then defeated E. Ramon Dopovnan and Albert Law, New York, 6-4, 7-5.

Frankie Parker of Spring Lake, N. J., and his partner, Bryan (Blitz) Grant of Atlanta, also won in straight sets. They defeated I. A. Powell, Southampton, and Ezekiel Stoddard, Westbury, N. Y., 6-0, 6-2, and Gordon Campbell, Westhampton, and Yelverton Garnett, Easthampton, 6-3, 7-5. Parker and Grant are seeded second.

The fastest machine in the world is a tiny device called the centrifuge, designed by Dr. J. W. Beams, of New York. The rotor of the centrifuge reaches the amazing speed of 1,200,000 revolutions per minute—it turns 20,000 times every second. When it is spinning at this great speed the rotor rests on a cushion of gas, for strange as it seems, no metal or fibre would permit such great speed.

The centrifuge is powered by compressed hydrogen fed into it under pressure of 140 pounds per square inch against grooves on the under side of the conical rotor. This causes it to spin, and it also raises it free from the rest of the machine so that there is no friction of metal on metal.
