

Samuel Hibben Will Present Lighting Show

Leading Engineer Will Demonstrate New Light Effects

Considered one of the world's leading lighting engineers, Samuel G. Hibben, director of lighting for the Westinghouse Lamp company of New York city, will present "Painting With Light" Friday at 7:30 p.m. at Iowa Union. There will be no charge for the exhibition, which is being sponsored locally by the Iowa City Radio and Refrigeration League.

Last summer Mr. Hibben visited Europe where he made a study of vapor lighting. Among the outstanding lighting installations in which he has figured prominently are those in the Holland vehicular tunnel in New York city, the Carlisle caverns in New Mexico, the statue of Liberty, and the Virginia Natural bridge.

"Painting With Light" presents some of the unusual and beautiful effects which may be obtained through the use of modern lighting apparatus. Naik Talks On Education In Russia Today

"Education in Russia is directed from one point of view—the building of a sociality," asserted K. G. Naik of Bombay, India, addressing approximately 40 members of the International Students association and their guests Sunday afternoon in the women's lounge at Iowa Union.

Discussing the stress that is placed on free and intensive education in Russia, Mr. Naik stated that Russia is interested in attaining culture socially and politically.

"The school curriculum is interwoven with the scientific principle, as scientific work itself is interwoven with industries," continued Mr. Naik. Scientific research carried on in the universities is applied practically, being transmitted for the benefit of the Soviet union.

"The whole life and organization of the Soviet union is revealed in the factories," he concluded, explaining that the competent organization of factories is an embodiment of the organization that characterizes the entire industrial and educational system of the Soviet union.

Meteor Burns Across Sky After Eclipse

Acoustics Expert In Talk Here Tells Of Sound Before 300

Noise, which is ever present but not entirely eradicable in every-day living, has a three-fold effect on human beings — impairment of health, efficiency and hearing, Harold R. Berlin, head of Johns-Manville acoustical department and President of the Acoustical Materials association told an audience of nearly 300 in chemistry auditorium yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Berlin, a 1915 graduate of the University of Iowa, spoke under the auspices of the college of engineering and chemistry and physics departments. He traced the origin of sound, how noise emanates as an undesirable by-product, and what can be done about getting rid of it.

One experiment was performed with an acoustimeter, which measures noise volume in decibels, one decibel being the smallest degree of variation in the amount of noise that can be detected by the human ear. According to Mr. Berlin, the human ear can stand noise up to 110 decibels, a hard goal to attain, as was demonstrated when the combined shouting and clapping of all the listeners failed to attain it. This acoustimeter is also used as an applause machine, Mr. Berlin said.

"The human ear," he declared, "is without equal as a judge of the quality of sound. Two people may call to you with the same loudness or intensity, but your ear never fails to distinguish between them. It sometimes happens that you may

not have heard a voice for years, and in that interval you may have heard thousands of others, but your ear will always pick out the slight difference in quality which distinguishes that particular voice."

"Quite Possible" For this reason, Mr. Berlin believes it "quite possible for Colonel Lindbergh to be correct in his identification of Bruno Richard Hauptmann."

A sound movie was shown by Mr. Berlin which demonstrated the origin of sound in a vibrating body, how the human body transforms those sounds into what we know as the human voice, and how the human ear transmits the sound to the brain for interpretation.
