Meeting One of 99 County Gatherings; Changes Discussed

Johnson county home economics teachers, demonstration workers, and homemakers attended a luncheon meeting yesterday noon at Iowa Union.

Doris Hittle, home economics teacher at Iowa City high school, was in general charge of the meeting. The meeting was one of 99 county meetings which are being conducted by the Iowa State Home Economics association to discuss the changing needs of the home economist.

The county unit meetings are aimed to give home economists an opportunity to confer on current economic and social problems peculiar to their field.

Prof. Lula Smith presented the county unit plans made by the state association. Helen Waite talked on the plans for the state meeting of the association to be in Des Moines in March. Prof. Mate Giddings discussed, "Problems in the Field of Nutrition," and Prof. Frances Zull, head of the home economics department, spoke on, "Problems Before the Home Economist Today."

Beck to Give Graduate Talks

Physics Lecturer To Discuss Many Modern Problems

Prof. Guido Beck, guest lecturer of physics at the University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kan., will deliver three graduate lectures on various problems of modern physics tomorrow and Tuesday in room 301 physics building.

Professor Beck will speak on "The Structure of the Atom and the Concepts of Quantum Theory" tomorrow at 4:10 p.m. At 7 p.m. tomorrow he will discuss "The Application of Quantum Theory on Nuclear Processes." The last lecture will be given Tuesday at 4:10 p.m. on "The Present State of the Theory of Radioactive Decay."

Many phases of modern physical theory have been studied by Professor Beck during the last few years. He has experimented with atomic disintegration and the expulsion of negative particles in collision and the nature of isotopes.

Professor Beck until recently was a professor in the German university of Prague.

Library Shows Unusual Books From Noted Private Presses

Works of Ireland, England, America Here for 6 Weeks

An exhibit of books by private presses was placed on display yesterday at the foreign language library, to remain for about six weeks, according to Margaret Schindler, foreign language librarian.

The Kelmscott press, one of the oldest run unofficially for private purposes, is perhaps the best known in the display. It was founded by William Morris, English writer, in 1899. Present day knowledge of private presses and typography, and interest in them, date from the construction of Morris' press. Three examples of its work are shown. "The Golden Legend" of Jacobus de Voragine, 1392, is outstanding in this group. It is printed in Golden type, a Roman face designed for this book. The name is derived from this print. It was the first important book printed at the Kelmscott.

The other two books on display are "The Nature of the Gothic," by Ruskin, also printed in Golden, and "Beyond the World," by William Morris. The latter is printed in Chaucer type, the type face designed for the Kelmscott.

Doves Press

The Doves press, another of the earlier private presses, is represented by "Paradise Regained," 1905. This press was operated by T. J. Cobden-Sanderson who is more widely known as a book binder. All of its books were printed in Doves type, a face adapted from Jensen's Roman letter by Emery Walker. Before his death, Cobden-Sanderson

took all his type, punches and matrices, and in many trips in the darkness of the night, threw them into the Thames.

Among the American presses at the beginning of the century were the Elston press of New Rochelle, N. Y., and the Roycroft Shops, East Aurora, N. Y. Both were much influenced by William Morris.

Of the two Elston books on display, one, "The Tale of Gamelyn," is printed in the Chaucer type of William Morris. Elbert Hubbard, owner and printer for the Roycroft Shops, did much to spread Morris' ideals of craftsmanship in America although he did not understand them perfectly himself.

This display includes one of the earlier publications of Irving Browne, "In the Track of the Book-Worm." Later the press became so commercialized as to lose its character as a private press.

Oldest Presses

Two of the oldest presses still in existence are represented in the exhibit. The Village Press in America, 1903, operated by Frederic W. Goudy, who himself designed the type used in his publications, is represented. The Cuola press, 1903, originally called the Dun Emer press, in Ireland, is the other old press.

Frederic W. Goudy began to print in a barn behind his house in Park Ridge, Ill., but soon moved to Hingham, Mass. From there he went to New York. His printing of Brownings' "Rabbi Ben Ezra" is shown.

The Cuola press, which is under the direction of Elizabeth Yeats, sister of William Butler Yeats, is national in spirit. It was founded by Miss Yeats to give work to Irish girls. The printing is done entirely by women. This display includes two books by William Butler Yeats and one by Jack B. Yeats, the artist.

One-Man Books

Unique among private presses is that of Dard Hunter, Chillicothe, Ohio. His "Old Paper Making" is shown. Mr. Hunter's publications are truly one-man books. He makes his own paper, prints from type designed and cast himself, does all the work of printing alone and binds his own books. Most of his books are written by himself.

Among the important presses of a more recent date represented in the display are the Nonesuch press in England and the Hogarth press. The former maintains a high standard of literary merit and typography in its publications. The latter in addition to its commercial activities, owns a hand press on which Leonard and Virginia Woolf and their associates print a few private press items.

NEW YORK (Special)—If you walk two blocks east from Times Square on Forty-Third street, you come to Fifth avenue. At 522 you enter a tall, narrow building, so up to the tenth story, and emerge before the offices of the Carnegie Corporation of New York and the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

President Walter Jessup greeted me between appointments. In spite of the fact that it was a busy morning for him, he was cordial, as always. We talked of a number of things—shoes, ships, sealing-wax, the University of Iowa, Paul Green and his theater at the University of North Carolina, the current plays in town. (He had just returned from a visit to the southern institution.

His office is just what one ought to have for the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. It is dignified without being somber. The walls are lined with high shelves of books with a distinctly educational appearance. In the inner sanctum are deep brown leather chairs and sofas.

The talk, naturally, turned to plays. Iowa and North Carolina, President Jessup said, are the only two state universities doing anything of real importance in drama. Then we talked about the plays in New York.

"If you want to see a beautiful bit of acting, go to the Shubert and see Elisabeth Bergner in 'Escape Me Never,'" he advised us.

But we had stolen a march on the former Iowa president. We had already seen it . . .

On the other side of Broadway, if you walk three blocks you come to one of those sewage streams of humanity of which there are many in New York. On Ninth avenue, in the shadow of the elevated, existence is elemental; a pushcart is

a career, and the span of a man's life is bounded on the south by Thirty-Sixth street and on the north by Forty-First.

Everything is on sale on the sidewalks—food, clothing, furniture, kitchen utensils, hardware. The street is littered with sewage, and fragrant with the stench of rotting vegetables. Men and women shout their wares and haggle endlessly over a few pennies or a couple of over-ripe lemons. Merchants tug at one's sleeves, and progress up the street becomes a serious proposition. The elevated train overhead adds to the noise and confusion. This is by no means the worst of such districts, but it offers a greater paradox than any other in New York. For, just three blocks up the street is Times Square, the "brightest spot in the world."

Boys and girls become men and women, live and die, without knowing that there is any other sort of existence. I talked to a boy who was selling fruits from a pushcart. "Oh, sure," he assured me, "I was up on Broadway just last Sunday, seen' a moon pitcher show. And Ge'ge Jessel was singin' on the stage." And Broadway was three blocks away!

"I just been livin' round here couple months," he answered another question. "I was born down on Twenty-Toid street."

This afternoon we went to see the play that has probably caused more discussion than any other in America this year—Sean O'Casey's "Within the Gates." For that privilege we were indebted to the blue nosed upholders of decency in Boston, who banned the play from that pure city and forced it to return to New York (where some folks admit life is not all rosy).

The play is the sort that would make the Boston defenders of purity rate. It dares to question the sanctity of modern religion, it dares

to talk in terms of prostitution, misery, human want and suffering. And it dares to seek a fierce realism in terms of a beautiful symbolism. O'Casey, thank heaven, is little worried about the ticket sale in Boston, and he speaks clearly of the sham and shoddiness of religion, of the human suffering that goes on in modern society while fat sleek business men gloat over their daily murders, suicides, divorces, and sport pages, and well fed orators argue endlessly over modern metaphysics.

It is a remarkable feat of playwriting and of staging. That, added to a cast headed by Lillian Gish and Moffat Johnson, made it something to be long remembered.

And this diary of a day closes.

appropriately enough, with a visit to the Metropolitan Opera House, where tonight we will hear "La Boheme" sung by Lawrence Tibbett, Queena Mario, Nina Morgana, and some names which represent to us merely gurgling sounds. . . .



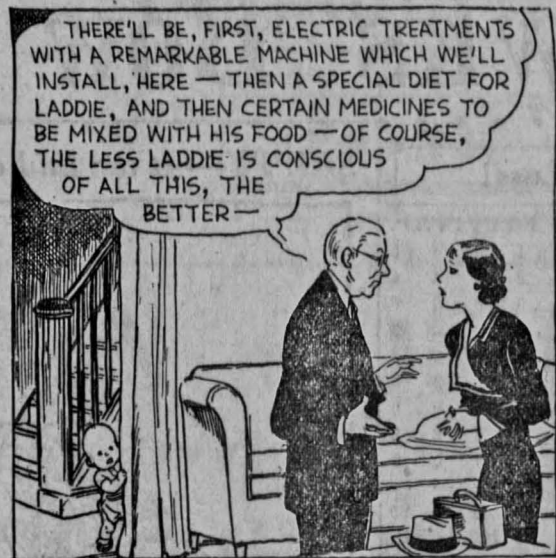

**Expect to Discover
Better Theories of
Human Learning**

Future generations may view our educational system as old-fashioned. This is predicted in a new study, "Studies in the Psychology of Learning," by T. R. McConnell, Lyle K. Henry, and Clellen Morgan and edited by Prof. Frederic B. Knight of the college of education. Grade school students will count openly with their hands above their desks in solving arithmetic problems, geometry will be an elective subject, and psychologists and educators may be able to agree on what constitutes learning and how it can be acquired.

Three Experiments

Three experiments were conducted in an attempt to find a better theory of human learning. The first experiment, "Discovery Versus Authoritative Identification in the Learning of Children," was conducted by Mr. McConnell for a period of seven months in the elementary schools of Toledo, Ohio. It was designed to reveal the relative effectiveness of two procedures of learning 200 basic arithmetic problems.

The first method depended upon repetition of stimulus-response connections, "authoritatively identified," while the second method stressed the discovery of truth and meaning, assuming that learning is

the process of achieving insight rather than mere repetition.

From the experiment, Mr. McConnell concluded that the first method is more effective in rapid speed tests while the second is better in teaching children the transfer of untaught combinations.

Geometry Overrated

The second experiment, "The Role of Insight in the Analytic Thinking of Adolescents," conducted by Mr. Henry, suggests that the thought provoking and mental training qualities of plane geometry have been greatly overrated.

The third study shows that there is a need for a redefinition of principles and concepts in the field of problem solving behavior. Some of the accepted principles have been definitely proven false in the experiment, while others need to be re-adjusted to new conditions.

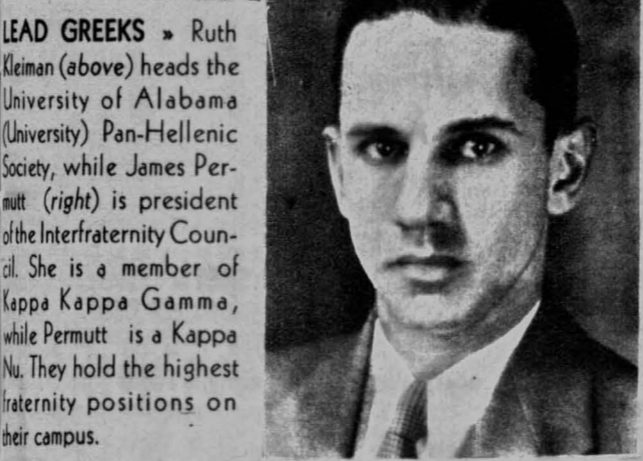

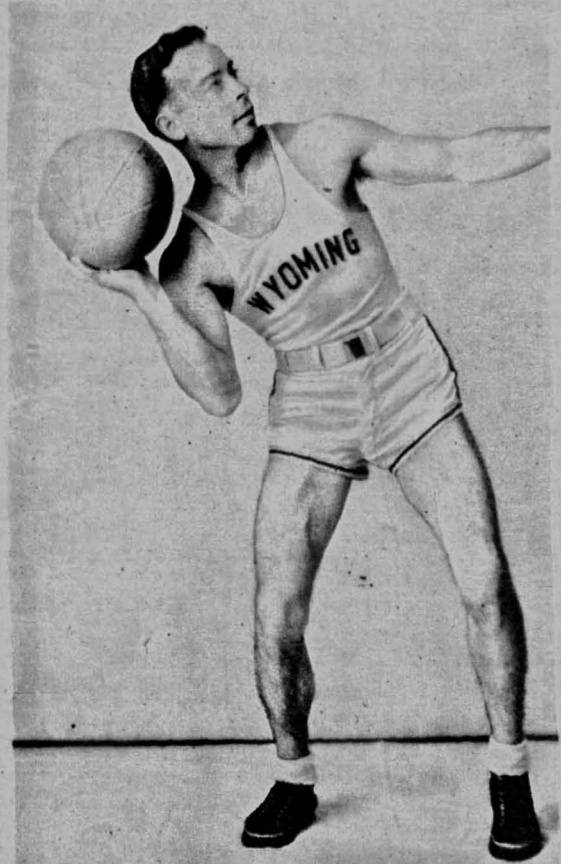

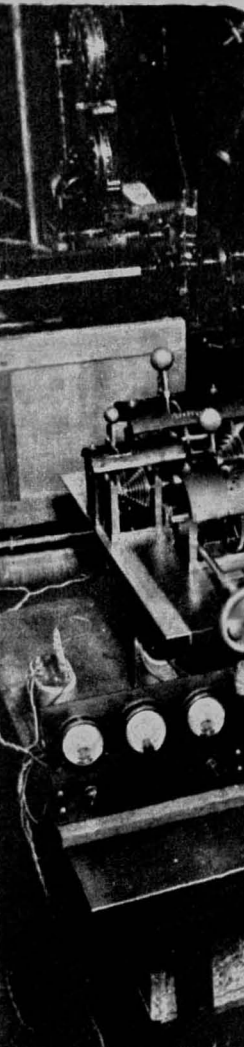

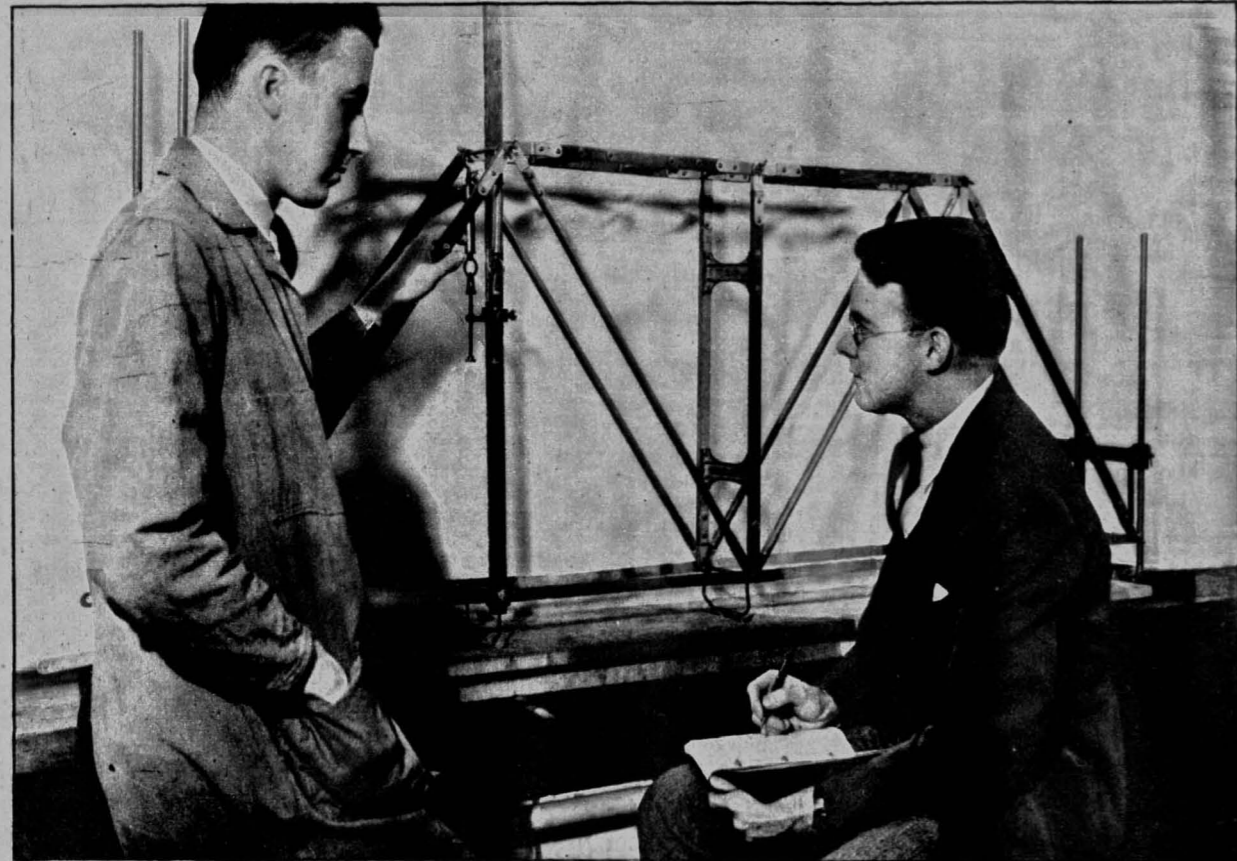

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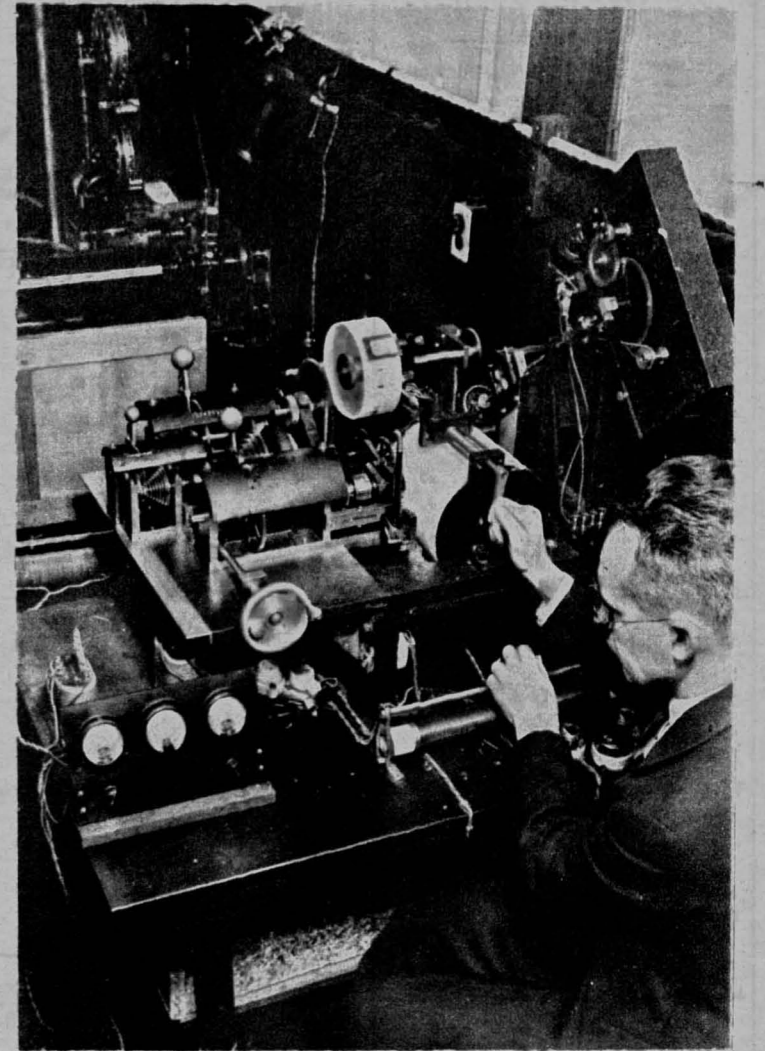

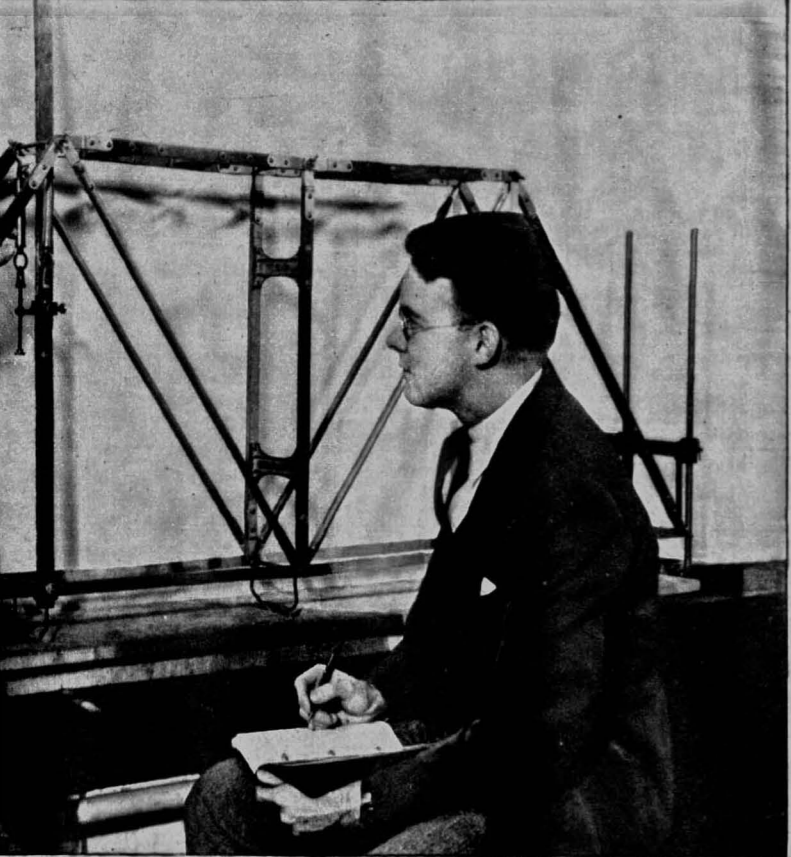

"The approach of the conductor interrupted further conversation, 'Lansfield, all off for Lansfield.'"

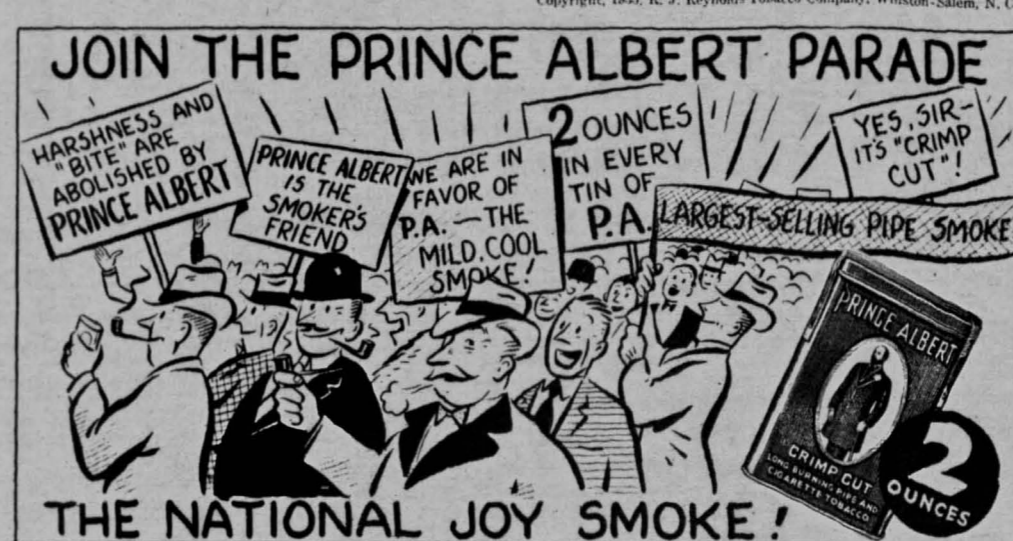
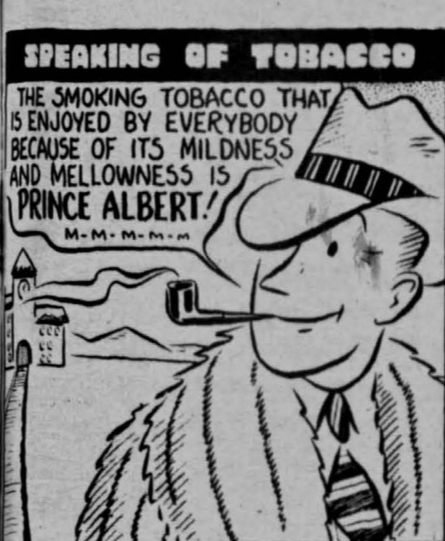

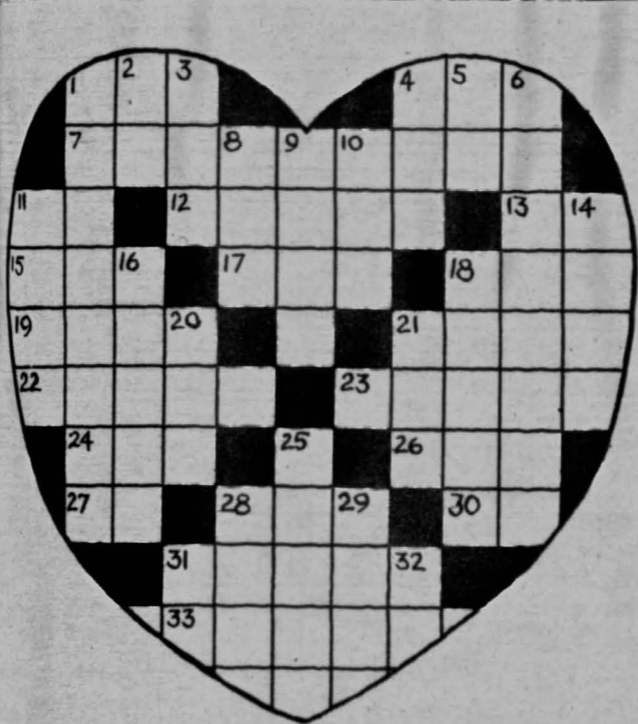

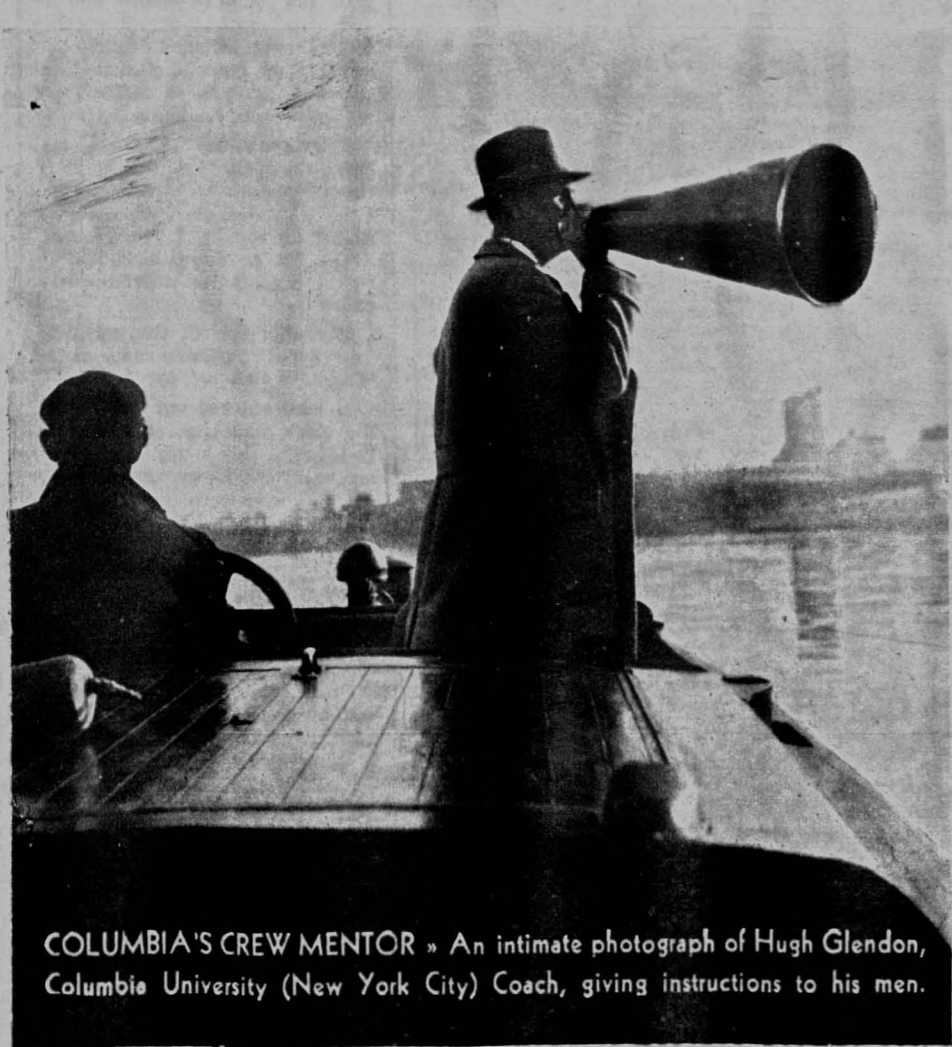

HAUPTMANN TRIUMPH

Hawkeye Basketeers Lose to Indiana

Hoosiers Break Through Iowa Defense to Win in Final Minutes

Defeat Means No Conference Hopes Left to Hawkeyes

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Feb. 11—Indiana's basketeers, stalling off a desperate Hawkeye quintet that threatened their drive for a loop tie with Purdue, staved off defeat in the second half of a ding-dong battle here tonight to nip the Old Gold invaders in the final minutes of play, 34 to 30.

If the Hoosiers expected a setup in Iowa, they were sadly mistaken, for the invaders matched the home lads basket for basket the first half to make the score even—Stephen at the intermission, 14 to 14. Indiana's sharp shooters, Kehrt, Walker and Gunning, then came to the rescue to push the Crimson ahead as the second half opened, and although they tried with all their might to even the score, Iowa was never ahead.

Iowans Brilliant
Coach Rollie Williams used his original starting five all through the contest, as he did at Ohio State, and they presented an alert, fast breaking band. Their defensive work was superb in the closing minutes of the game, and only a lag in the defense in the closing minutes allowed Etnire to score an easy setup from under the basket, put the contest entirely out of Iowa's reach just before the gun went off.

Jahny Barko found his eye for three baskets in the first half and one in the second, and two free throws, to garner 10 points and high point honors, but for Indiana Co-Capt. Kehrt and Walker scored nine points and Gunning eight for second honors.

Iowa Takes Lead
