**Believe Defeat May Mean End of War; Report Thousands Left Dead on Field**

**GENEVA, April 4 (AP)—An official report issued by the League of Nations tonight said that Premier Mussolini declines to answer Ethiopian charges that his fascist troops are employing poison gas in the east African conflict.**

**ASMARA, Eritrea, April 4 (AP)—Italy's northern armies smashed the obstinate resistance of Emperor Haile Selassie's imperial bodyguard today.**

**Fascist headquarters said the Ethiopian defeat, in the second engagement which the bodyguard has undertaken in the last week, amounted almost to a decisive turn in the battle tide.**

**The Ethiopian forces were broken up and scattered in the direction of Quoram. Emperor Haile Selassie, himself, was said to be fleeing.**

**Official accounts of the battle indicated that Ethiopia was stripped of its northern defenses.**

**The alleged headlong flight of the imperial guard leaves only the rain and mountains between the fascist forces and the culmination of the conquest they started last October.**

**Intense Excitement**

**Intense excitement prevailed the entire area with the news that the Negus' personal army had finally been routed, as almost all the soldiers believe this defeat may mean the end of the war.**

**Thousands Dead**

**The battle was fought over mountainous terrain with the slopes studded with rock and heavily wooded.**

**Battle Joined at 5:30**

**The battle was joined at 5:30 a.m. yesterday when the First army corps with the Alpine division on the right and the Sabauda on the left moved across the Meana river where it pushed after its victory of March 31.**

**The fighting which ensued was mainly hand to hand, the Italians using bayonets against swords.**

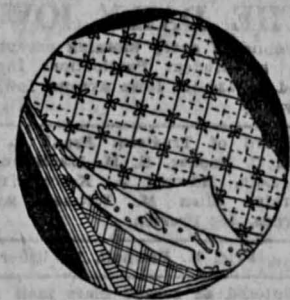
The Easter play represents events in the lives of the disciples of Jesus during the days of His passion from Thursday until Resurrection.

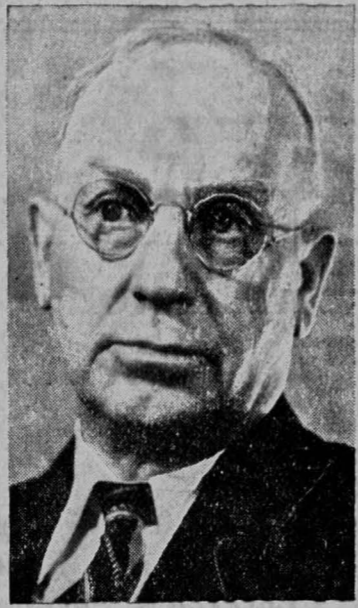

# Iowa Scientists Discuss Many Phases of Psychology, Geology

### Read Numerous Papers On Recent Findings As Session Closes

Everything from the whine of a dog to art appreciation and electric waves in the brain was discussed by more than 20 scientists at the psychology section of the Iowa Academy of Science yesterday morning.

Alan D. Grinstead, G of Iowa City, discloses that the whine of a dog and the cry of a baby reveal a vibrato approximating that of a professional singer, thus proving the vibrato to be natural and essential in vocal music.

Experimenting with grade-school children, Mildred Dow Voss, G of Villisca, found a significant gain in art appreciation through explanation of principles. The development of aesthetic judgment was discussed by Gilbert Brighthouse, G of Iowa City.

Analyses of electrical brain waves and adaptation to various conditions in different individuals were presented by John R. Knott, G of Iowa City, and Basu K. Bagchi, G of Santipur, India.

Studies of various factors in reading language and vocabulary were discussed by six local psychologists. Six others spoke on stuttering and speech habits. Other subjects included studies of the eye, abnormal mental states, aspects of musical performance, word-association tests, delinquents, and tests for handedness in children less than two years old.

During the two-day session important changes in the school system were suggested. Prof. E. G. Lockhart, a psychologist from Drake university, urged that children be taught to control emotions, not only in their outward manifestations, but in attitudes as well.

Emotional Excitement "Strong emotional excitement distorts perception," he asserted, "hinders accuracy of motor control, lowers manipulative skill, disturbs the circulatory system, and causes highly stimulating secretions and glycogen to be poured into the blood stream."

A universal alphabet in which letter represents a sound was proposed by Prof. O. M. Norlie of Luther college to save billions of dollars yearly, reduce time spent in school, and promote better understanding among nations.

Present Papers Nineteen papers were presented in the geology section of the Iowa Academy of Science yesterday and Friday. Discovery of gypsum deposits, and classification of other formations found in deep wells dug recently in Iowa, were described by Prof. Allen C. Tester of the geology department.

A search for a now-filled ancient channel of the Des Moines river along the line of former low prairie lakes and the Blue Earth river was explained by Charles Keyes of Des Moines in discussing the Greater Des Moines river during the drainage period of the Kewatin glacier in Minnesota.

Last winter's excessive snow and cold indicate the type of weather that produced terminal moraines during the withdrawal of the last glacier in Iowa, he asserted, describing another study.

Classification of strata, recently adopted by the Iowa geological survey, discovery at Crescent of 54 feet of Pennsylvania strata, recent erosion in Iowa, new stone quarries in Madison county, changes of the course of the upper Mississippi river, remnants of Nebraskan drift recently found at Dubuque, teaching methods in geology, Indian religion, and studies of the Loveland and Peorian loesses made by Dean George F. Kay of the college of liberal arts, were included in the program.

The bureau of air commerce is investigating hazards to aviation caused by carburetor ice, propeller ice, rain and snow static, and fog dissipation on runways.

# Drop Juvenile Home Project

After two weeks of consideration, the Johnson county board of supervisors yesterday definitely shelved the proposed purchase of a new county juvenile home here. The question was brought up before the board in March when the Klingman home at 1822 Friendship street, near the east side of Iowa City, was offered for sale at \$9,000.

Conferences last week with juvenile officials from Des Moines and other Iowa cities were held by the supervisors. At present 33 children are housed in the rented juvenile home at Bowery and Gilbert streets. A \$500 yearly rent is paid on the 14-room property.

Advocated by several leading business men of Iowa City, the proposed new site can be purchased for \$9,000 with a yearly payment of \$1,000 for the next eight years and an original investment of \$1,000.

# Storms, Cold, Floods Push Back Spring

New snow storms in northern states, flood waters and unseasonable cold almost crowded spring out of the April weather picture yesterday.

Additional earth shocks in Montana and severe dust storms in the southwest gave other unwelcome variety.

Deaths from the week's tornadoes in the south mounted to 41 with 19 in south Georgia alone when another victim died at a Cordele hospital.

Elsewhere in the south flood waters and frost ruined crops to the extent of millions of dollars.

Subfreezing temperatures extended from Arkansas to Georgia with readings as low as 19 in Arkansas where the damage was estimated at \$1,000,000 to fruit and berry prospects.

Snow fell in Chicago, over northern Illinois, parts of Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

# PASSING IN REVIEW

A Commentary on the New Books Conducted by American Prefaces

EUROPA, by Robert Briffault, New York, Charles Scribner's Sons, 1935.

THIS IS A new excursion by a sociologist, historian, and philosopher, into the field of the novel. It gives us a sex-saturated panoramic exhibition of the pre-war decay of European aristocracy in a book with only one solid character, no sound plot—perhaps in keeping with his theme that Europa is Hamlet—and not much compelling emotion or description. The world is too much with it.

But a first novel by a man, the son of a French diplomatic official, who was brought up in Italy and Liverpool and is, like his hero, human, sincere, and philosophical, will interest many, even if the source of the interest is the artificially extrinsic fact that Briffault here gives intimate glimpses and narratives of almost every person of any note in pre-war Europe.

The hero of this book was puffed on the head by Nietzsche, who said, to the child, "Thou mightest be He!" After he had become a scientist and philosopher at Cambridge and a cosmopolitan socialist, his dream-days of pleasant ignorance of doom finally end with broken personal situations in his world, in the chaos after Sarajevo. He murmurs with a bitter laugh, "Thou hast conquered, O Gallian!" A philosopher to the end, he blames the grotesque glorification of the Superman, Darwinism gone to seed, for the debacle.

But we know all this, and the sheer number of intellectual conversations, the reek of gossip, or the plethora of females of all spiritual complexions and fleshly configurations is no recompense for the excess of platitude. One unplatitudinous feature of the book is the absence of jeers at American civilization. But his admiration for America, which, he says in a recent article, dominates the doomed and dying Europa, is trite and uncritical admiration for her material strength.

THE WORLD WITH A FENCE, by Marian Sims, Philadelphia, J. B. Lippincott Company, 1936.

SHE KNEW WHEN to kiss. More anomalous in a 1936 girl, she knew when not to kiss, which suggests raison d'etre for the story. She happened to have, as the book would say, guts.

Distinctly this is a 1936 novel. Shirley Temple, Clark Gable, NRA, highballs, and a good many other spinal sensations are all present. But this barking poodle happens to bite, and when it bites it dismembers beautifully. After a few angry snaps at small-town taboos, including particularly vituperously revival-meeting hysteria—"sublimated sex," the book sinks its teeth brightly into the educational system, and most potently sex education. These toothsome mouthfuls alone justify the midnight oil.

A modern girl who asks questions of life—what does she do? She teaches school, but one year is too much, she finds, under the impossible policy of giving every motion an education. Sympathetic liberality toward her students rings down small town gossip, book and slinker. Escaping to the impersonality of a city she does some mid-depression job hunting, lands one, and her life becomes (in the customary phraseology) "inextricably linked" with two other lives, the man she loves, and his self-centered, neurotic wife. Tragedy inevitably emerges, but the book leaves Carol courageously picking up the pieces.

The story is about a woman as only a woman could write it. It contacts your emotions because it has authentic human nature, and manages to go below the surface without becoming case history. Effervescing in spots to sheer feminine cleverness and whimsicality, transitory in some aspects, the book need not be taken over seriously. It is worth taking, however. Perscription: take in one gulp (and don't let your husband, wife, or roommate beat you to it).

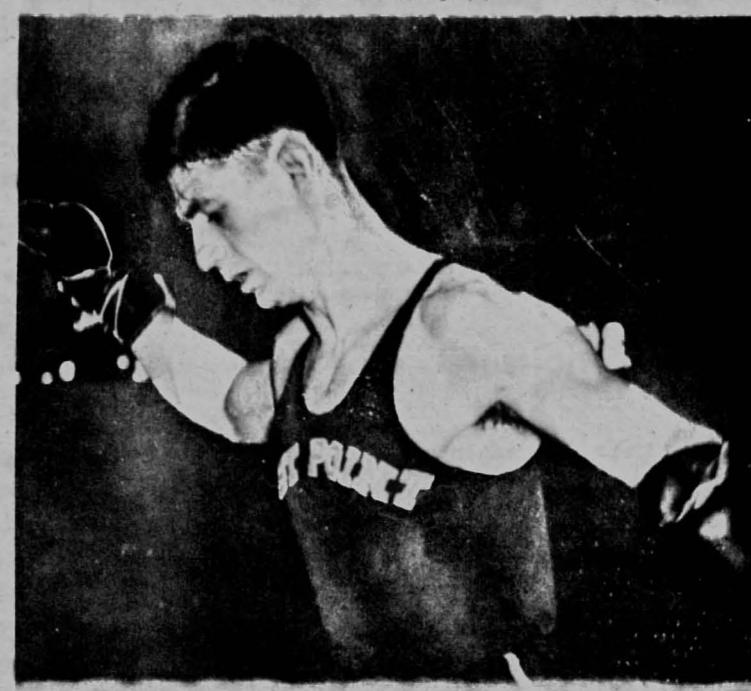

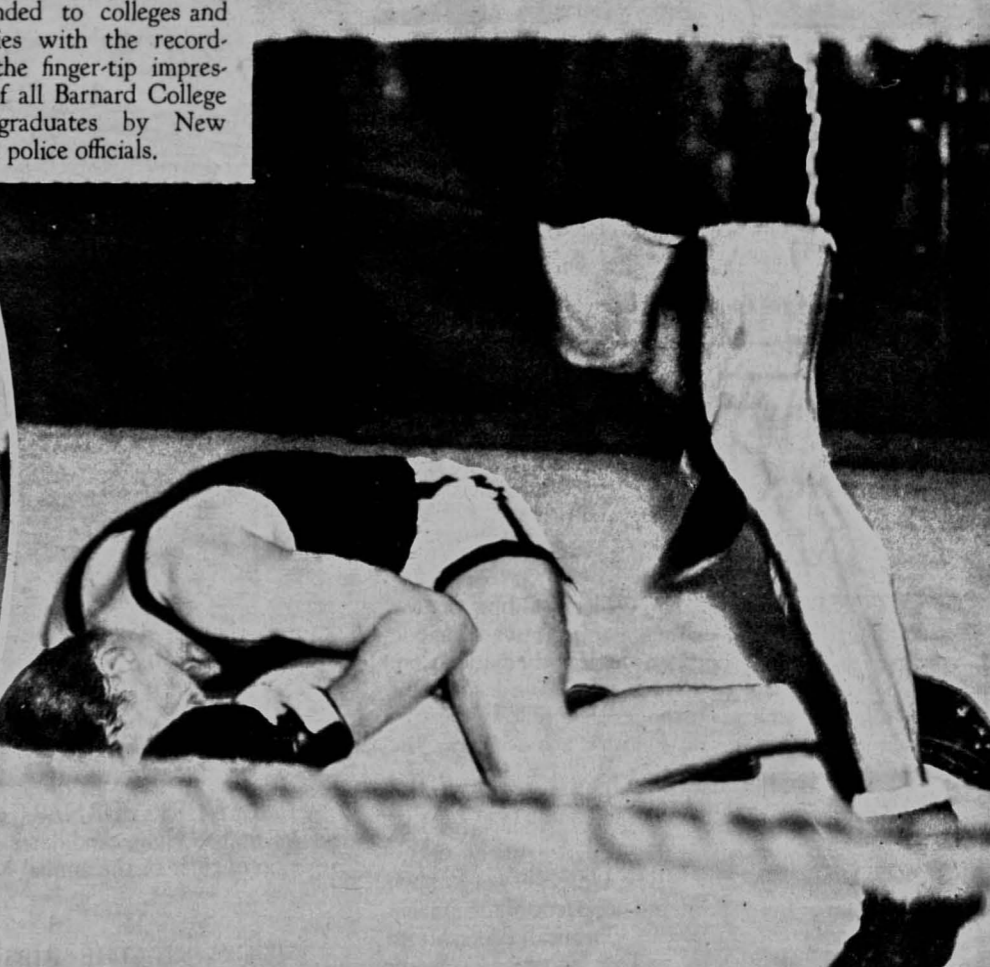

### Two Medals

TO POSSESS either the William Gibbs or the William H. Nichols medal implies reward among chemists, most of whom taste little public adulation, though both medals go to men who have made their fellows' lots easier and postpones their fellows' deaths. A high national mark of scientific achievement, the



1935 William Gibbs medal was last month granted Dr. Roger Adams, head of the department of chemistry, University of Illinois, and president of the American Chemical Association.

The 47-year-old recipient was Boston born, Harvard educated (three degrees). After study in Berlin, he taught at Harvard and Radcliffe. Leprosy, anaesthetics, atoms, all the minutiae of organic composition have been within the province of his frequently published research. The Greeks, ATO, Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Alpha Chi Sigma, and Gamma Alpha, have had words for him; he is one of their members. In 1927 he received the William H. Nichols medal.

### "Of Incalculable Value"

THE William H. Nichols medal winner for 1936 in the New York section of the American Chemical Society was William Mansfield Clark, DeLamar professor of physiological chemistry at Johns Hopkins since 1927. Born in Tivoli, N. Y., Dr. Clark received an undergraduate degree at Williams, a Ph. D. at Johns Hopkins. Seventeen years of his scholarship were spent in the service of the United States government, divisions of agriculture and public health. The Nichols medal cites this Williams Phi Beta Kappa and Alpha Zeta Alpha as one whose researches have been "of incalculable value to human welfare."

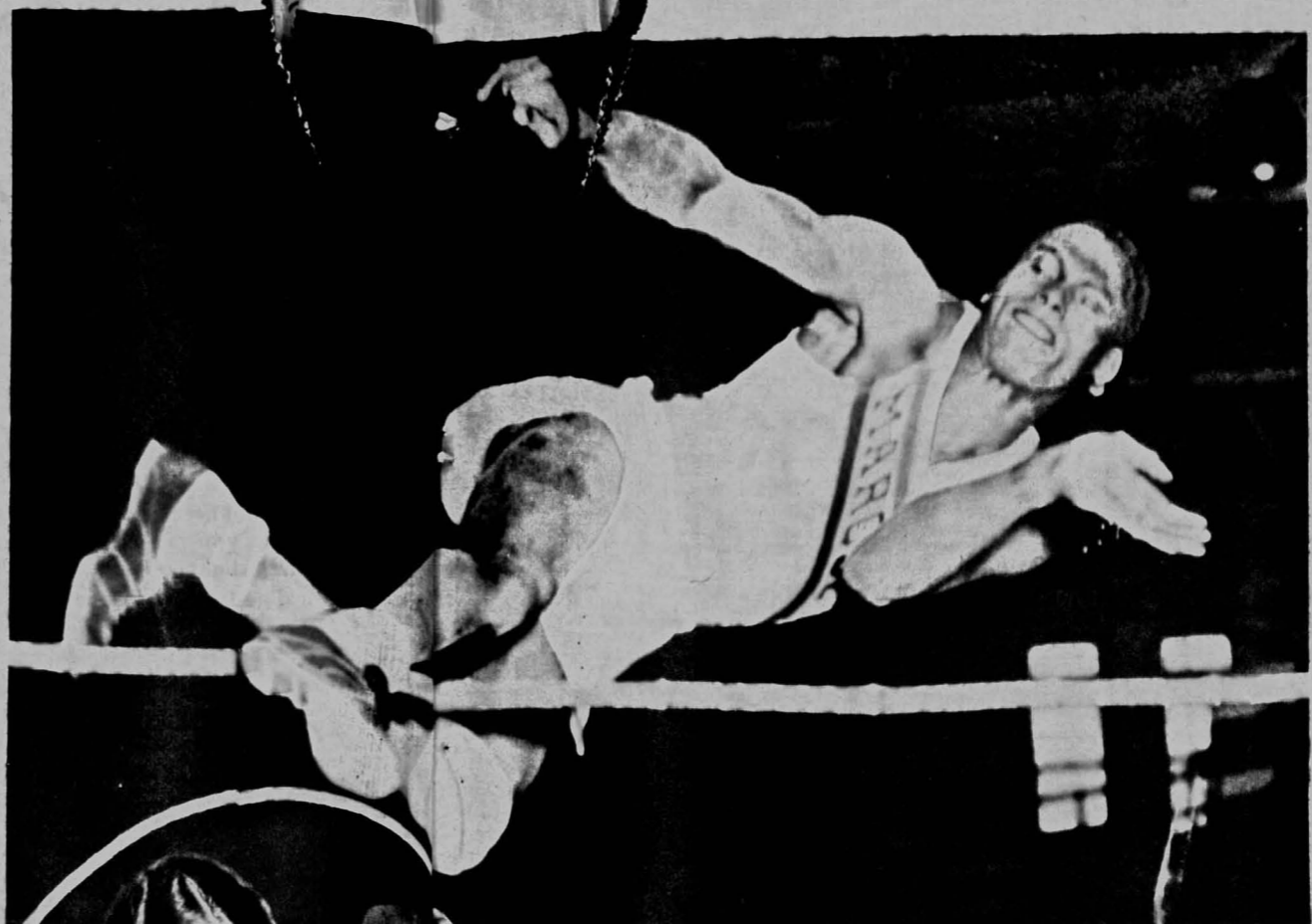

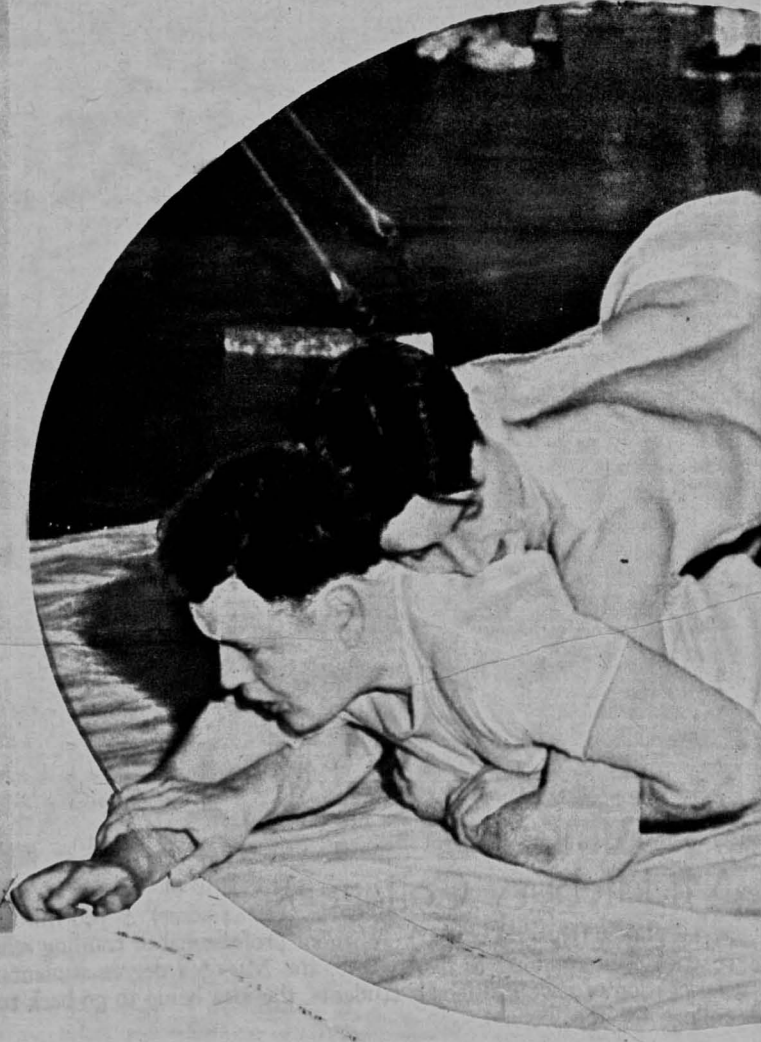

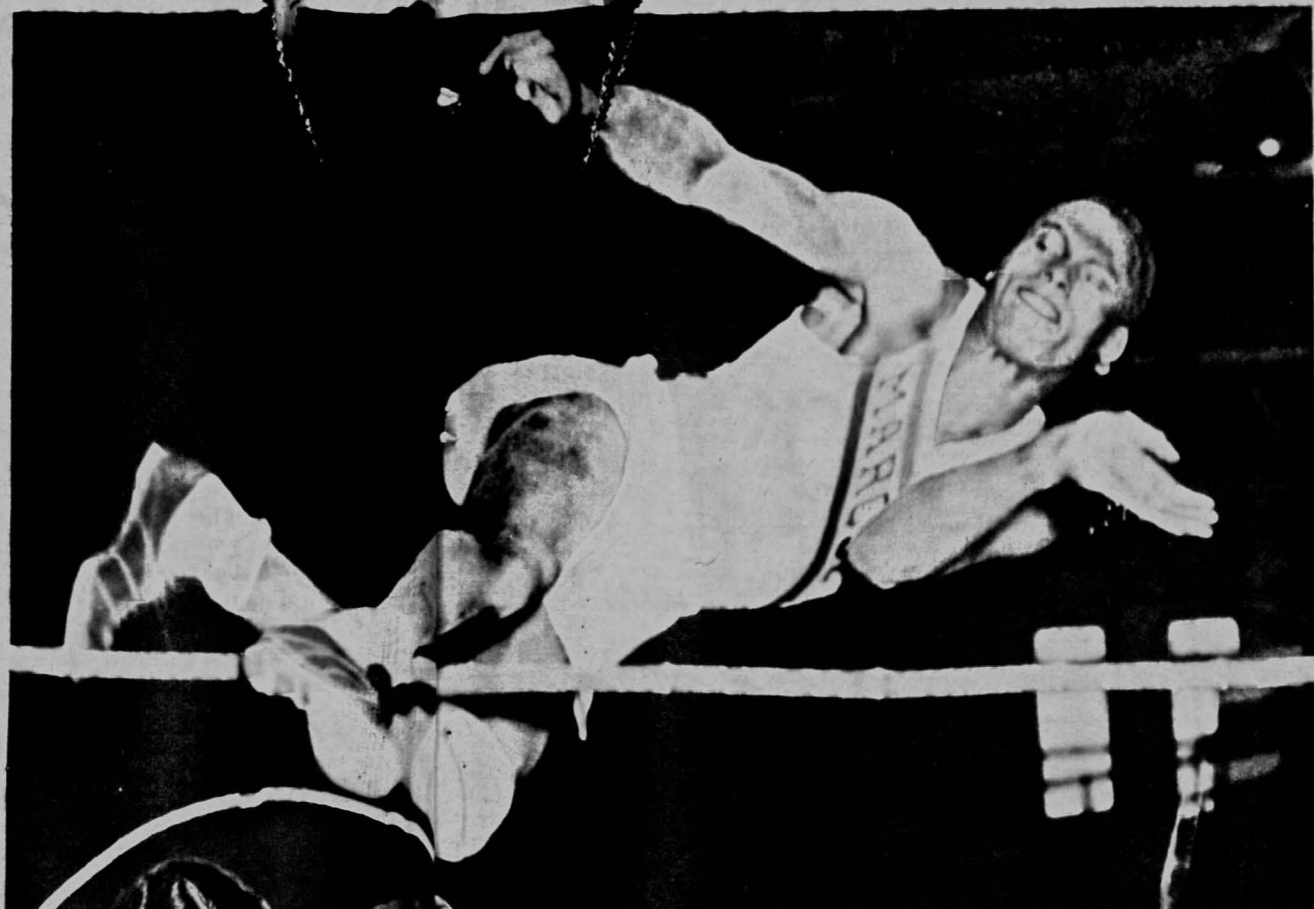

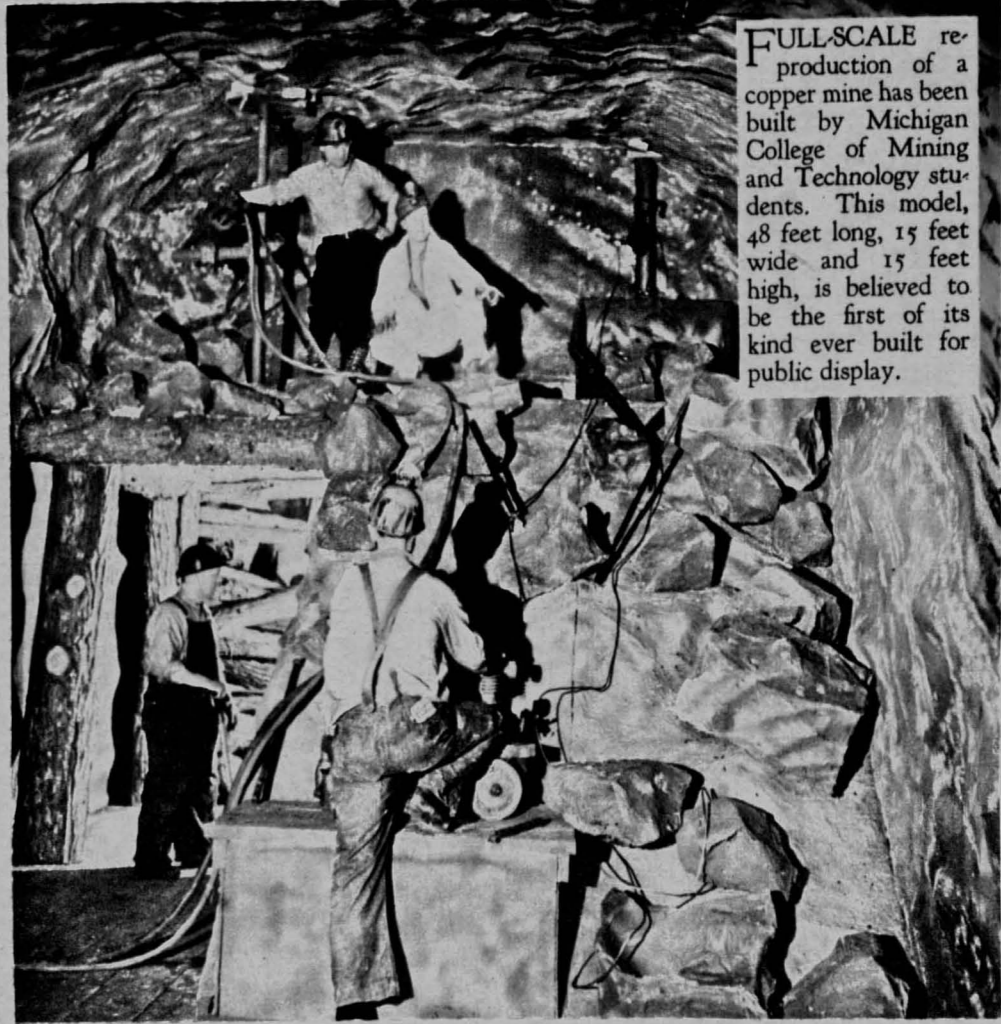

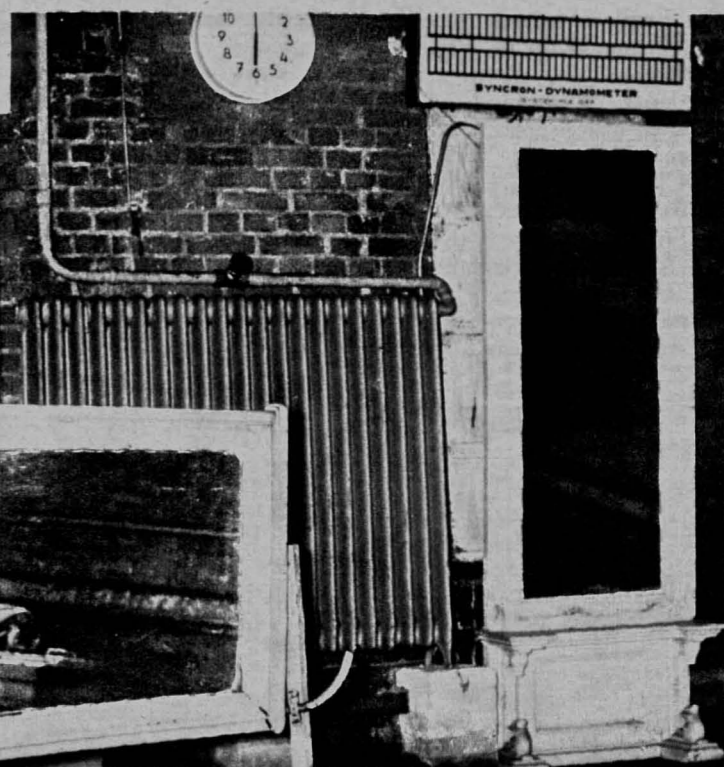

## Flashes

### Entente Protests

VIENNA, April 6 (AP)—The three nations of the Little Entente, acting together, protested today against the new Austrian conscription law for military and public works service. The protest — from Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, and Rumania — was presented to Ego Berger-Waldenegg, Austrian foreign minister.

### Court Hits New Deal

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Government agencies were warned against "unlawful inquisitorial investigations" by the supreme court today in administering another defeat to the new deal.

In a 6-to-3 opinion, delivered by Justice Sutherland, the tribunal ruled that the securities commission could not compel J. Edward Jones, New York dealer in oil securities, to testify concerning a proposed \$100,000 stock issue after he had withdrawn his registration statement.

In bristling language, the court majority asserted the commission's action was "wholly unreasonable and arbitrary," and further pursuit of the inquiry would constitute "fishing expeditions."

### Packers Guilty

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Secretary Wallace, in a formal order, today held 11 packing companies guilty of price fixing and directed them to "cease and desist" effective May 10.

The agriculture secretary ruled that the companies had violated the packers and stockyards act in territory around Memphis, Tenn., and Birmingham, Ala., from 1927 to 1933, by joining to fix prices and to apportion sales territory.

### Vote of Confidence

LONDON, April 6 (AP)—The British government emerged successfully tonight from a storm of criticism on its policies toward Italy and Germany, by winning a vote of confidence in the house of commons by 361 to 14.

Clement Richard Atlee, leader of the laborite opposition, accused the cabinet of "pursuing a wobbly course." There were charges of "senile decay" against Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin's government.

### "Not Suing for Peace"

ADDIS ABABA, April 6 (AP)—Emperor Haile Selassie, in a statement issued here today, said he would accept peace only in accordance with the framework of the covenant of the League of Nations and in the "spirit" of the league. "Ethiopia is not defeated," the emperor said. "My armies are prepared to fight until not a single Italian aggressor is left on our territory."

"We certainly are not suing for peace."

### Bruno Cremated

NEW YORK, April 6 (AP)—Bruno Richard Hauptmann's body was given to a crematory's flames today, but events stemming from efforts to disprove his guilt in the Lindbergh baby's murder continued their course.

The widow, Mrs. Anna Hauptmann, stood before his opened casket and vowed to make someone "pay" for his death.

### Corporation Tax

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Climaxing a day of sharp attack and defense of the administration's \$789,000,000 tax program, treasury spokesmen revealed late today that under the nation's corporations actually would pay less money into the treasury than at present.

Testimony that the proposed high taxes on undistributed corporate income would place the entire added tax burden on individual stockholders was given just before the house ways and means committee suddenly decided not to press its open hearings to a conclusion tonight.

## New, Furious Windstorm Destroys Business Section

## Tornado Turns City to Flames In 3 Minutes

### Relief Workers Brave Fires in Search of Bodies; 139 Found

GAINESVILLE, Ga., April 6 (AP)—A furious three-minute windstorm killed nearly 150 persons here today, turned the business section into blazing wreckage and increased to more than 300 the dead in tornadoes lashing the south.

The death toll mounted into the night as rescue workers braved fires to search the wreckage.

At 9 p.m., central standard time, 139 bodies had been removed from the debris and relief authorities said there were many others in the wreckage of the flattened buildings.

**Dead List Mounts in Tupelo**  
In another storm stricken community, Tupelo, Miss., like Gainesville a town of approximately 8,000, the list of dead also mounted as workers pushed their grim hunt of the litter.

Late tonight, 134 bodies had been removed from the wreckage at Tupelo where the blast struck Sunday night.

Both here and in Tupelo, authorities expressed the fear that the lists would continue to grow as the wreckage was cleared away. Fires that followed the tornado likewise hampered the rescue work in Tupelo.

**Burned Beyond Recognition**  
Gainesville's dead included the bodies of many burned beyond recognition in the outbreak of flames which followed the abrupt windstorm.

Five of the bodies were removed from the Palmour Hardware store. Five others were taken from another hardware store earlier today. Stone J. Crance, head of the Red Cross relief work here, said 630 buildings were demolished and 33 others practically blown away. The check was still incomplete.

The heaviest loss of life apparently occurred at the Cooper Plants Manufacturing company, two story brick structure, where 125 were employed. The twister blew up the building like an explosion and fire swept the wreckage.

**Many Reported Trapped**  
Some of the workers escaped, but Bob Baldwin Sr., vice-president of an Atlanta American Legion post, said he had himself helped remove 45 bodies from the plant. Many others were reported trapped in the structure.

## Assembly Halts 2 Queries In Bruno's Case

TRENTON, N. J., April 6 (AP)—Two resolutions providing for investigation of the Bruno Richard Hauptmann case—one by a citizens committee and the other by a legislative committee—were defeated by the New Jersey assembly tonight.

The citizens' committee investigation, proposed by an anti-administration republican, was directed at Gov. Harold G. Hoffman's activities during his reopened investigation. The proposal was defeated 23 to 31, eight votes short.

Immediately after its defeat, a Hoffman supporter presented another resolution for an investigation of the Lindbergh kidnap case from its inception, including the activities of the governor, the state police, prosecution officials and the cost of the Hauptmann trial, which approximated \$125,000. It was defeated by a vote of 10 to 45 against.

### Outlaw Captured

BENTON, Ark. (AP)—Asa "Ace" Pendleton, notorious southwest outlaw, was captured with an armed female companion here today by Sheriff Virgil Rucker. They will be returned to Ardmore, Okla., where he broke jail March 19. The pair was surprised by the officer who found them sitting in a railroad station.
