S.U.I. Surgeons Succeed In Intestinal Operation Similar to Tafel Infant's

University hospital surgeons last week successfully performed an operation for malformed intestine, similar to the ailment that caused the death of Baby Julian Tafel in Chicago Wednesday, it was learned last night.

The second operation will make the baby entirely normal. The Doss infant was born at Mercy hospital in Davenport Sept. 8. Physicians, alarmed when the baby refused nourishment, found he suffered from a malformed intestine that had no outlet.

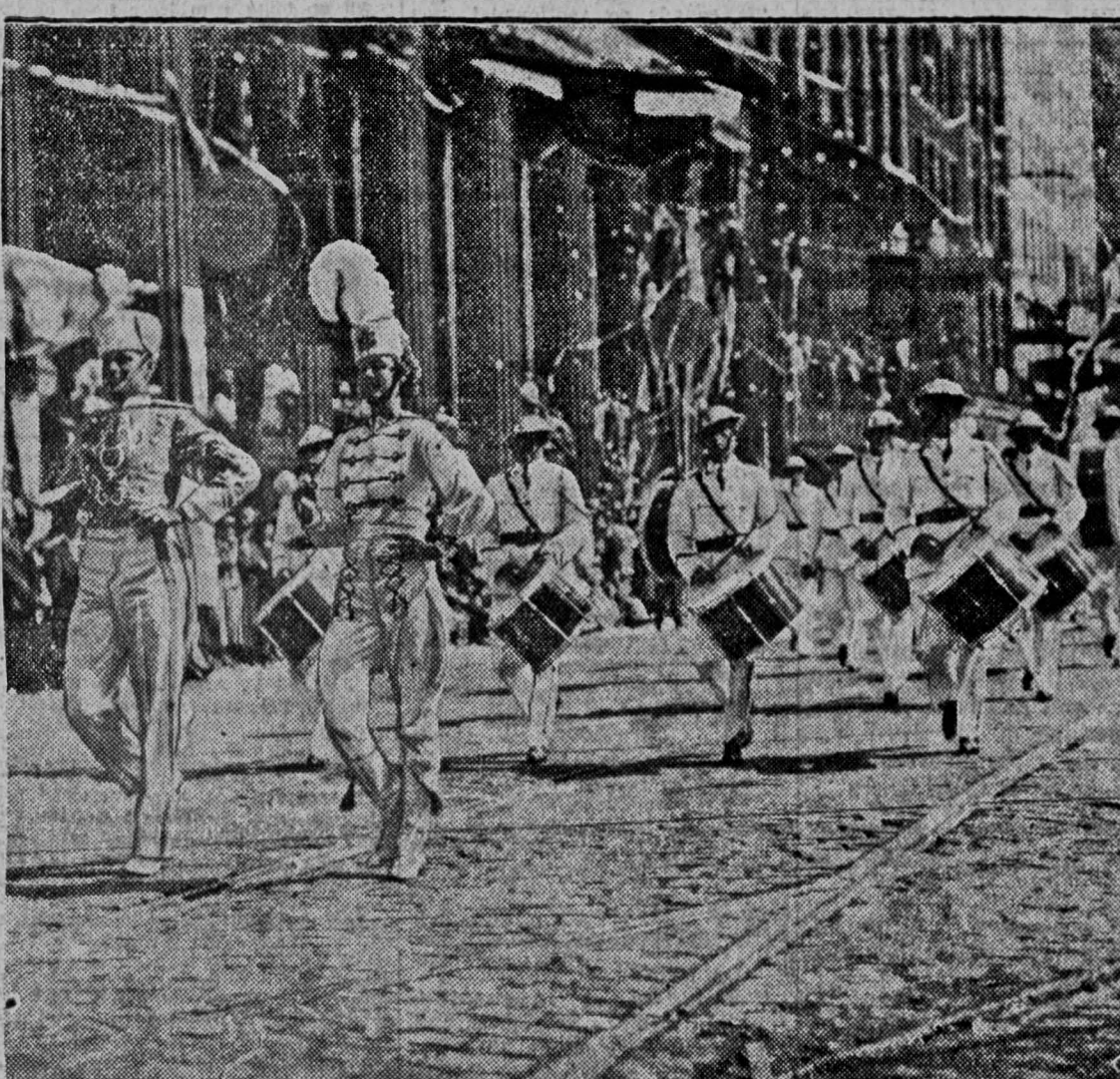

Flood Sweeps Rebels to Death

Loyalists Release 10-Foot Wall of Water On Fascist Column

MADRID, Sept. 24—A 10 foot wall of water, released from Albarche dam by government forces, roared down on a column of fascists advancing on Madrid and swept many of them to their deaths, it was reported late tonight. The flood, sweeping down from the lifted dam gates near San Martin de Valdeiglesias, about 25 miles west of the capital, inundated a fascist camp to a depth of 10 feet.

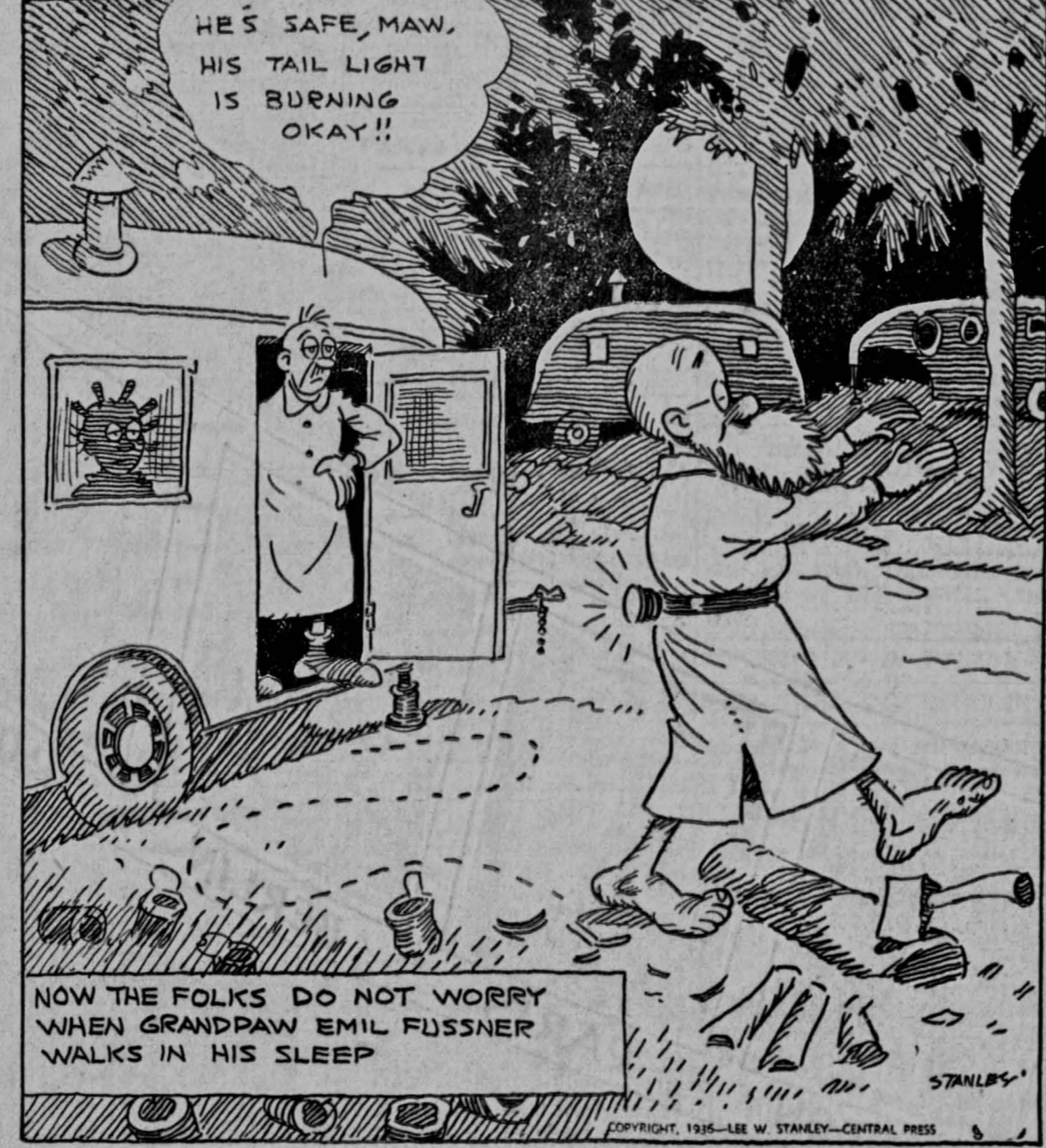

4 Visiting Educators, 14 Faculty Members To Address Sessions

A conference for about 400 administrators and supervisors of public schools, under the auspices of the extension division and the college of education, will take place next Thursday and Friday in Iowa City. Four visiting educators and 14 members of the University of Iowa faculty will appear on the program.

Registration for the conference will open Thursday at 8 a. m. at the office of the college of education, W113, East hall, at the university experimental schools or at Old Capitol.

Social Studies
This year for the first time demonstration classes will be confined to one department, social studies. At 9 a. m. Prof. Howard R. Anderson of the history department will conduct an eighth grade American history demonstration class at university high school. Again at 10 a. m. Professor Anderson will be in charge of a 12th grade American government class.

Two Groups

Conferences at 11 a. m. will be separated into elementary and secondary groups. Maude McEwen, principal of university elementary school, and Mabel Siedaker, supervisor of social sciences at the elementary school, will be in charge of the group on elementary education. Prof. Harry K. Newburn, principal of University high school, will pre-

sides at the secondary education conference.

A general assembly will take place at 1:30 p. m. with Prof. Forest C. Ensign of the college of education as presiding officer. The first speaker of the afternoon will be Prof. Charles L. Robbins of the college of education, who will talk on "Leadership in the Small Town." At 2 p. m. Prof. E. F. Lindquist of the college of education will discuss "The Iowa Every-Pupil Tests of Basic Skills," and at 2:30 p. m. Prof. H. A. Greene of the college of education will speak on "The Need for Ability - Norms for Interpreting Achievement Test Results."

At 3 p. m. Prof. Frederic B. Knight of the college of education will talk on "Measurement and Supervision in Arithmetic," and at 3:30 p. m. there will be a discussion of the supervisory use of the basic skills program.

At 8 p. m., with Professor Lindquist presiding, Prof. Ben D. Wood of Columbia university will describe "The Significance of Individual Differences" to an assembly at the chemistry auditorium.

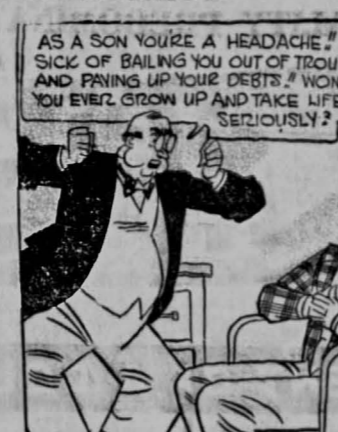

Seeding Wheat Planned To Offset Lower Feeds

URBANA, Ill. (AP)—Many Illinois farmers with feed supplies cut short by the drought are planning to seed wheat this season because it is one of the first crops that can be harvested next year.

Prof. George H. Dungan of the University of Illinois college of agriculture says that other reasons for increased interest in seeding wheat are the favorable wheat prices of the past few years and the good yield and excellent quality of the crop harvested this year.

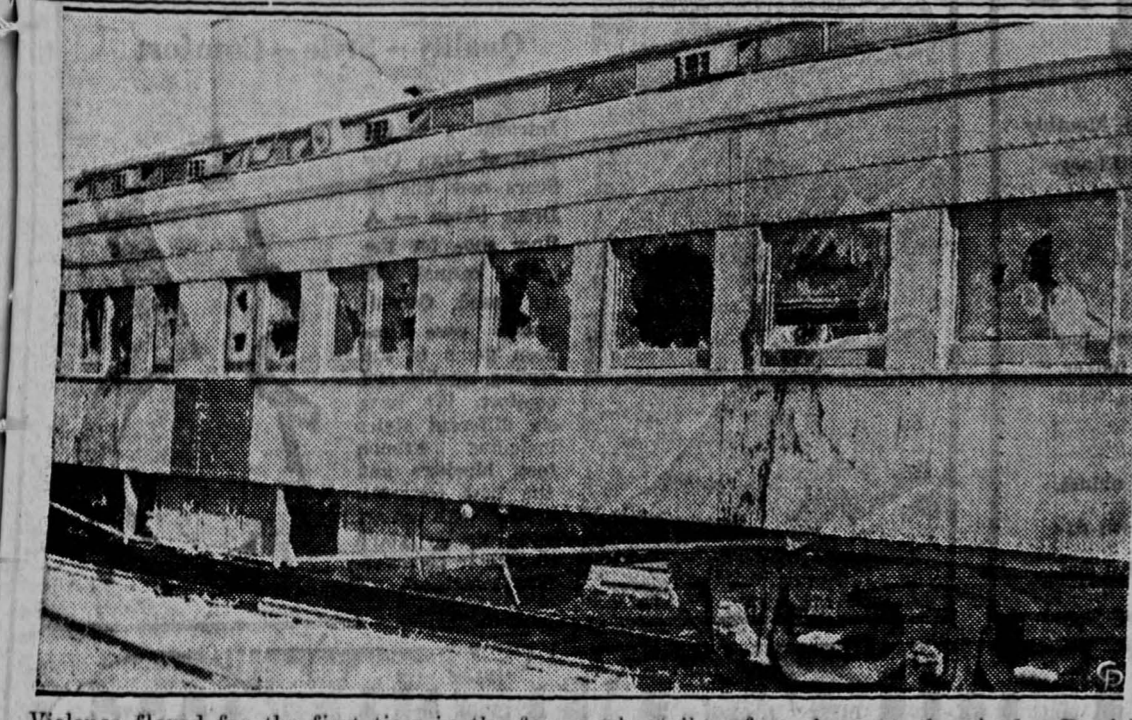

All others not chosen for the privileged "Hitler Youth" are to go to the yet to be organized "State Youth" where, until the age of 18, when they will be subject to the Labor Service, they will be under the supervision of their more fortunate brothers who were taken into the "Hitler Youth."

Only those who have gone through the "Hitler Youth" will be admitted to membership in the Nazi party and be allowed to hold public office later in life in any way.

Plans Not Complete A similar but less rigid arrangement is planned for girls. The motto is: "Make the German girl a better mother."

Astronomers Cut Estimate Of Size of Star's System

PASADENA, Cal. — Astronomers have whittled down their estimate of the size of our galaxy, or star system, until now two of them declare light could travel across it in about 100,000 years.

This still gives it a diameter of some 600,000,000,000,000 miles. But as late as five years ago the galaxy was estimated to be five times the size of the largest spiral nebulae.

Scientists Investigate Since then several astronomers have been investigating the operations of these "interstellar bandits," as one terms the light stealing objects.

Dr. Stebbins and Mr. Whitford, working here this summer with a photo-electric cell attached to the 100 inch telescope, now report: "The overall diameter of the galaxy is not much greater than 30,000 parsecs (97,800 light years), which is of the same order as that of the Andromeda nebula."
