Brotherhood Day Speakers In Appeals for Religious Unity

"Make America safe for differences" was the theme of the student program on the Brotherhood day service of the First Congregational church Sunday morning. Edwin C. Greer, '41 of Iowa City, representing the Catholics; William Cammack, '33 of Mattland, Fla., Protestant; and Perry J. Osnowitz, '42 of Sioux City, Jew, spoke on "Religion in a World of Conflict."

In the opening address of the morning, Mr. Greer emphasized the need of religion to combat the materialistic paganism which is attacking worship and belief in modern times. The two principal enemies of American democracy, fascism and communism, must be opposed by a union of the three great branches of organized religion, he asserted.

"That the Catholic church is the greatest world-wide enemy of communism" is well known, Mr. Greer said, emphasizing that it opposes all forms of totalitarianism because they force religion to submit to a nation or state. He asked that other religions join in such endeavors, and pointed out that "this is a situation for which we must say, I am my brother's keeper."

The belief in a common God should enable men to "agree to disagree about some irrelevant details to eliminate glaring inharmonies,"

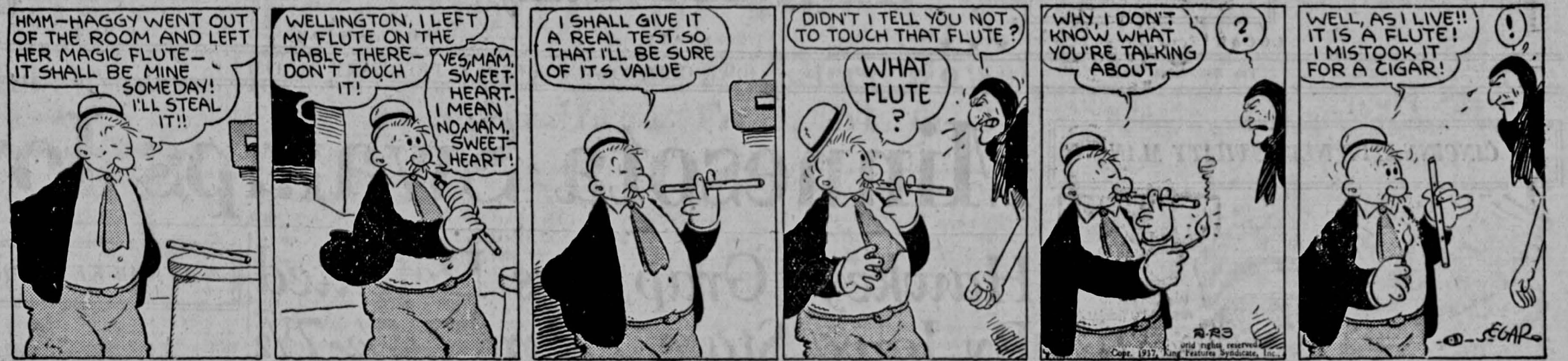

You Have to Eat

So Junior High Department Devises New Menus for the Hungry

We at Iowa City junior high have begun a new department. Most of you have been left home alone and become hungry or have been on hikes when you had to eat. That is the purpose of this department, to give you suggestions. There won't be any complicated recipes where you take two teaspoons of soda, one teaspoon of flour, one cake of butter, 10 eggs, six quarts of milk, some cinnamon, nutmeg, allspice, ginger, cloves, turmeric, celery seed, pickly spice, salt peter, mustard, black pepper, red pepper and a few assorted extracts and what do you have?

Mix Them

First, put the pork and beans into a skillet (be sure to grease your skillet). Add a little catsup. Stir the weiners almost all the way through till the halves are held together only by the skin on one side. Fill the space between with mustard and hot dog sauce. Now bury the weiners in the pork and beans.

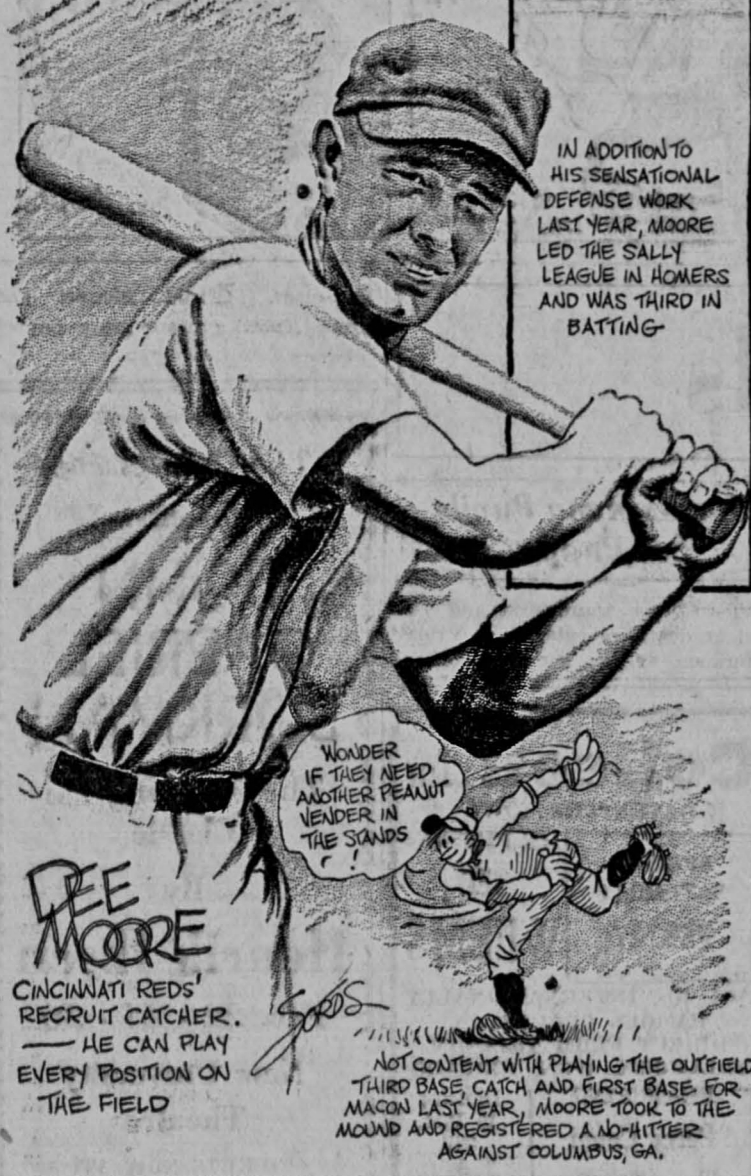
