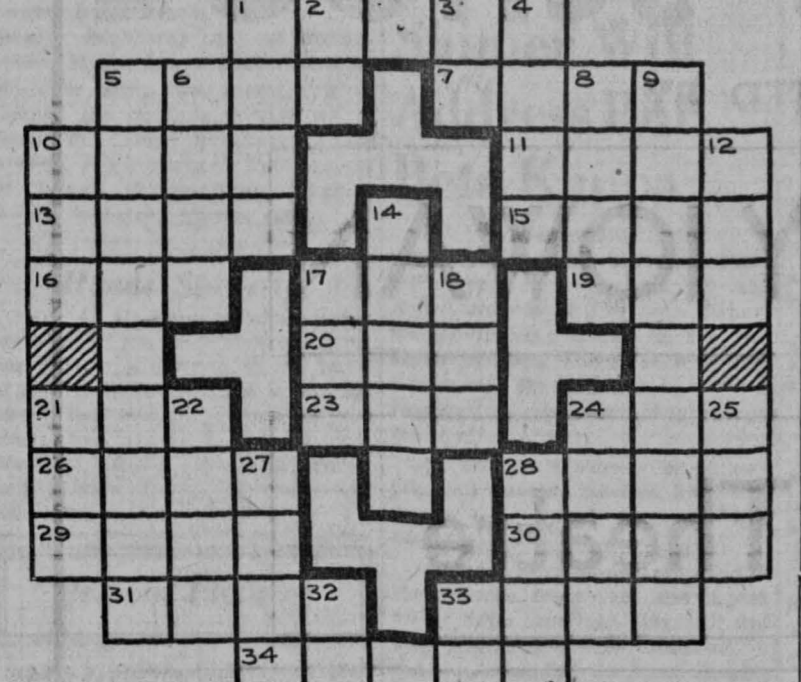

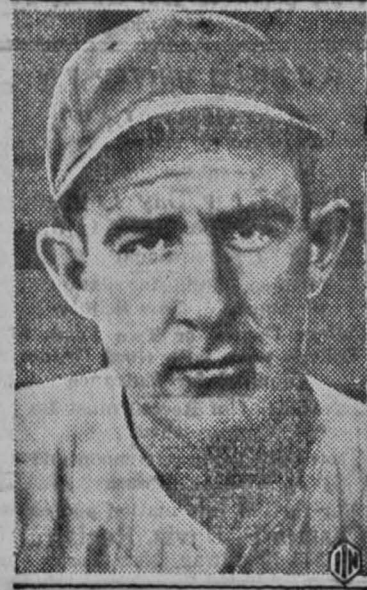

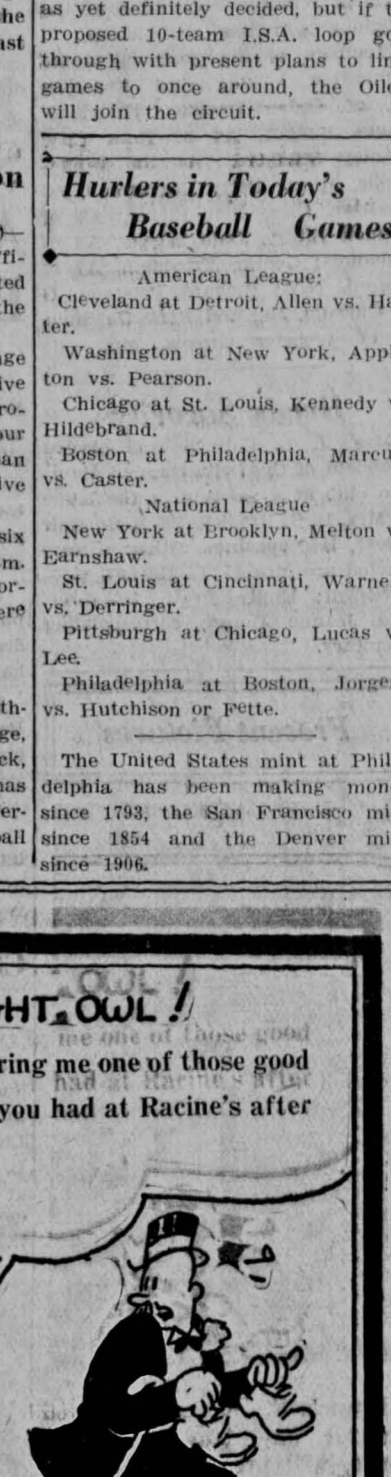

### Records Label Safe or Hazardous Streets

For Safety's Sake Steer Clear of Most Dangerous Intersection In Iowa City at Gilbert, Washington Streets

What chance do you have of driving an automobile across Iowa City without having an accident?

It depends on the street you select, according to O. H. Houston, director of the Iowa State Planning board's traffic survey here.

Suppose you start at Muscatine avenue and drive west across the city to Front street by either Burlington or College streets. Iowa City Police records show 36 accidents on Burlington street the chance is only points in the three-year period from 1934 to 1936 inclusive.

The corresponding stretch of College street had only 19. But wait. You are really doubling your safety by using Burlington street. Chance of an accident on a one-way trip via College street is in 60,340. On Burlington street the chance is only one in 117,226.

Only Those Reported Accident figures used by the planning board include only those reported to the Iowa City police department during 1934, 1935 and 1936. Unreported accidents have not been taken into consideration.

The computation is based on the ratio between number of accidents and traffic volume. The planning board's survey shows that, on an average, almost four times as many vehicles use Burlington as use College street.

Twelve-hour traffic counts taken on the two streets between Johnson and Dodge show 1,047 vehicles for College as compared with 3,854 for Burlington.

Real trouble If you're really looking for trouble, however, drive down Gilbert street, described by Houston as "probably the most dangerous street in the city."

With a smaller traffic volume its accident total for the three-year period is 24, according to police records. Most of the mishaps occurred

within a limited section of the street only a few blocks long.

In this section is the most hazardous street intersection in the city, that of Gilbert and Washington streets. Police records show eight accidents have occurred at that point during the three-year period. Second most dangerous intersection is that of Burlington and Capitol streets with seven accidents.
