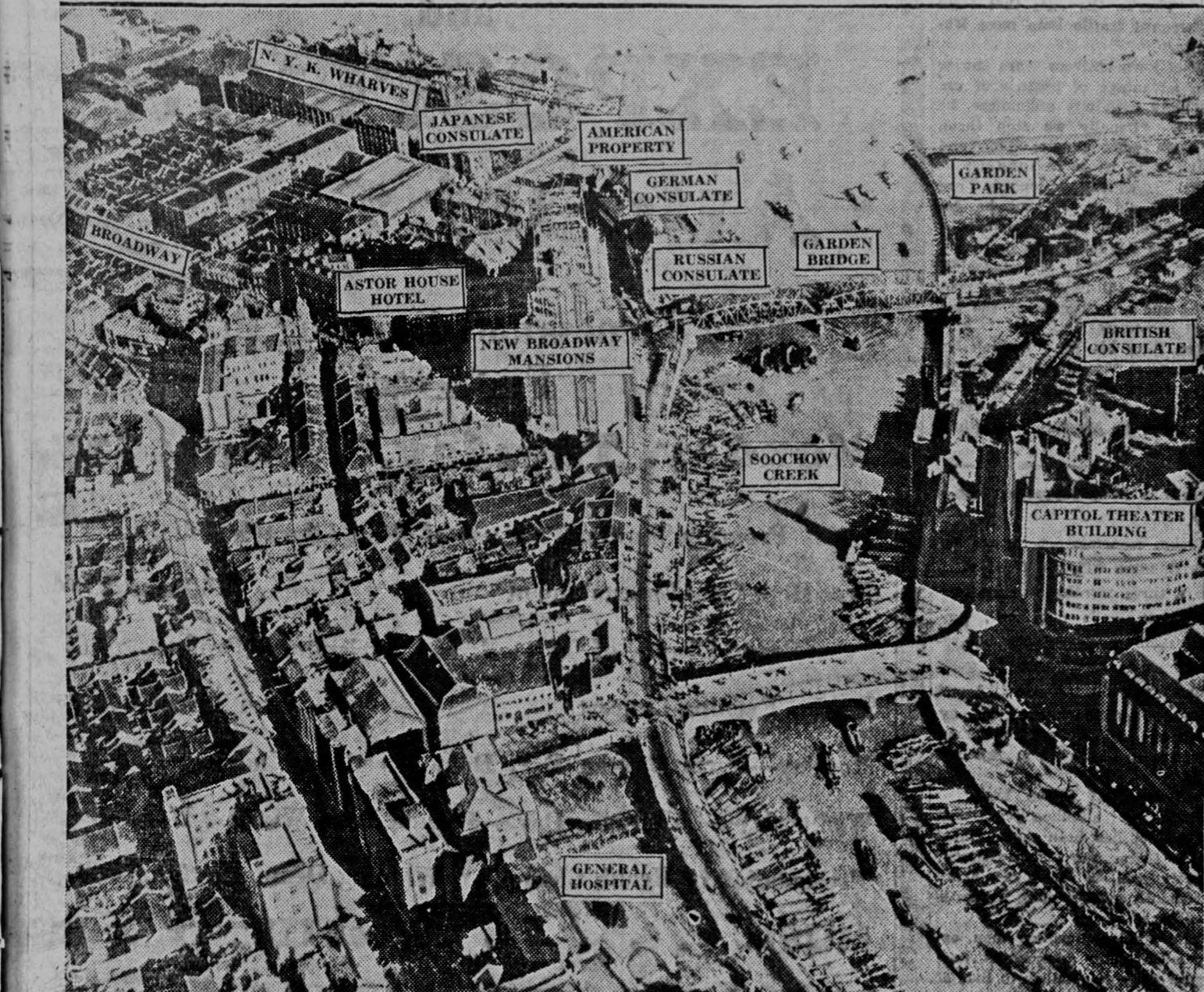

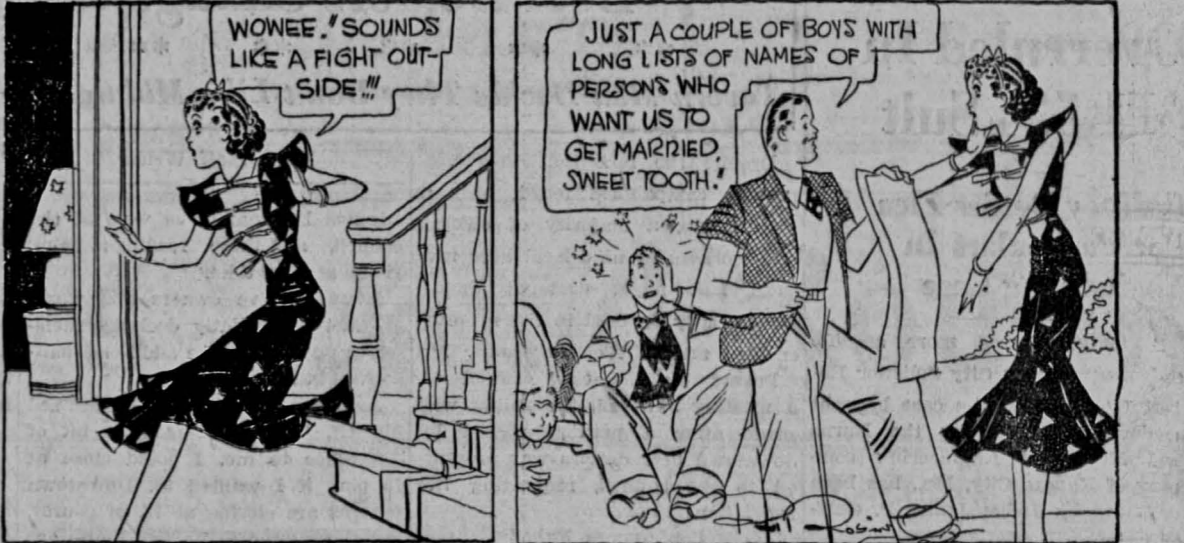

Horse Show Plans Complete

Local Fanciers Enter Contest

Expect Other Entries For Thursday's Event In University Stadium

"It'll be the best show yet," Robert R. Whetstone, manager, prophesied last night for the Iowa City society horse show to be held at the university stadium Thursday.

Ten local horse fanciers have already entered as well as stables in Oskaloosa, Des Moines, Tipton and Ottumwa. Several out-of-state entries are now pending," Whetstone added.

Interest in the pony classes has far exceeded all expectations, and a free pen and pencil set will now be offered for every pony entered, he emphasized.

"Doc" Redmond of Oskaloosa, well-known horse-breeder, will assist Prof. W. F. La Grange of Iowa State college at Ames in judging the show.

Each class is being sponsored by one local business house which posts the purse and trophies. Sponsors include the Iowa City Light and Power company, First Capital National bank, Iowa State Bank and Trust company, Fulk's jewelry store, Hauser's jewelry store, Whetstone's Drug company, Indian Look-out stables, Englert theater, Hand's jewelry store, and the Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions service clubs.

A high school or trick horse from Volney Diltz' Raccoon stables at Des Moines has been secured by Grimm's and will give exhibitions at both the afternoon and evening shows. 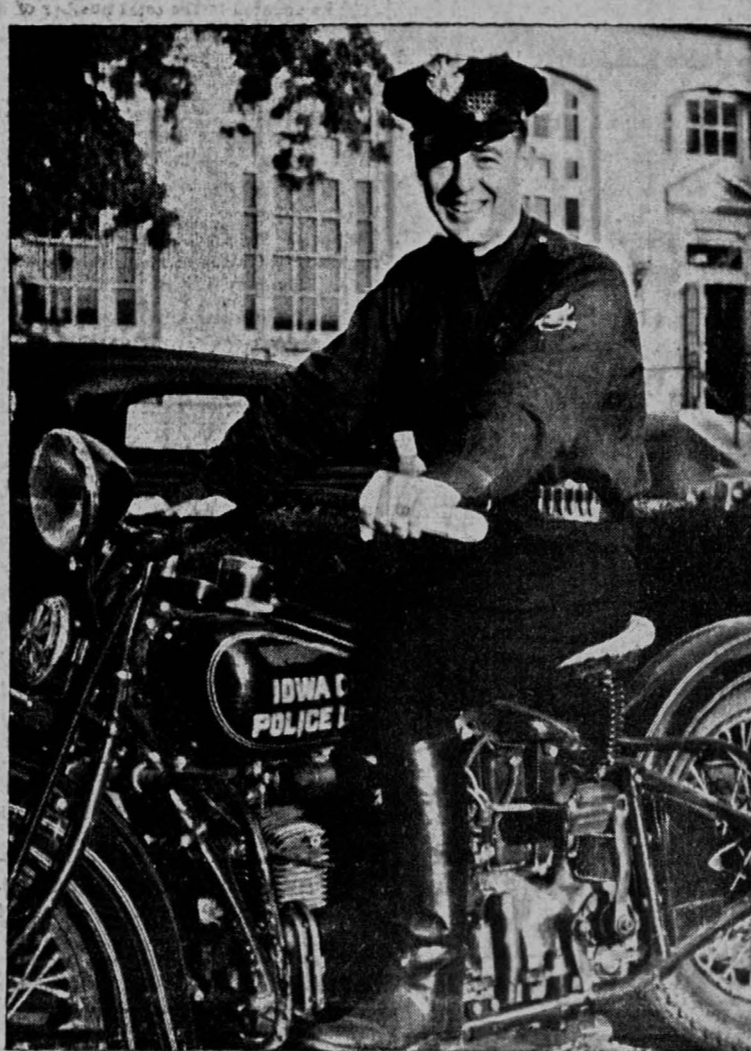

Officer Wants Laws Observed

Idea of Traffic Policeman's Job Not Just Making Lots of Arrests

(Editor's Note: This is the fifth in a series of articles on members of the Iowa City police department.)

"The idea of a traffic policeman's job is not to see how many arrests he can make but to see how many persons he can make observant of the law."

That's Jim Ryan's creed. Ryan, sole motorcycle policeman on the Iowa City police force, has been checking Iowa City traffic for the entire length of his comparatively short experience with the force—exactly three months and 17 days, he said.

The chief traffic offense of motorists, he says, is speeding. But he can go plenty fast on his motorcycle himself. "I've never had any trouble catching speedsters," he declared. "The motorcycle is capable of doing 98 miles an hour although I've never had it up that high."

Second greatest number of offenses comes from the mistaken idea that shifting gears constitutes adequate observance of a stop sign. "The sign says to stop and not to slow down," he tells offenders. "Most violators know what they are doing," he avowed. "They never

JURORS INDICT WOMAN FOR TWO POISON SLAYINGS

CINCINNATI, Aug. 16 (AP)—Her eyes showing red behind her glasses, blonde Mrs. Anna Hahn accepted service in Hamilton county jail today on indictments accusing her of the poison slayings of two elderly Germans.

Gone was the laughing, nonchalant, debonair air she displayed last Friday when her attorneys lost a legal move to obtain her release on a habeas corpus.

The grand jury, acting speedily, returned the indictments within 15 minutes after hearing Acting Detective Chief Patrick Hayes, Detective Lieut. George Schattle, Detective Walter Hart and Assistant Prosecutor Frank M. Gusweller report on evidence gathered in what Prosecutor Dudley Miller Outcalt termed "the biggest mass murder in this country."

The brief indictments charged Mrs. Hahn with the "malicious and premeditated" slayings of George Gsellman, who died suddenly July 6, and Jacob Wagner, 78, who died June 3, leaving an unwitnessed will naming Mrs. Hahn a beneficiary.

Hayes charged the will was forged. Judge Charles S. Bell, upon receiving the grand jury report, ordered Mrs. Hahn arraigned Wednesday at 9 a.m.
