# Men's Grades Rise, Women's Decline During 1936-37 Iowa Secretary Of State Asked

### Phi Kappa Psi Sets Pace For Frats at 2.480

#### All-University Average Shows Increase Of .016 for Year

Men's grades, as indicated by all university men's fraternity, men's dormitory and non-affiliated men's averages, were on the upgrade during 1936-37, while women's grades in general declined, according to figures released last night by Robert E. Rienow, dean of men.

The all-university average for last year — 2.351 — shows an increase of .016 over the mark of 2.335 for 1935-36. The all university men's average jumped from 2.289 to 2.320, while the women's mark tumbled from 2.454 to 2.427.

#### Fraternity Mark Up

The all fraternity average of 2.234 was .009 higher than the 2.225 set the previous year, continuing the comeback from the decline begun in 1933-34. The al sorority average remained exactly the same, 2.380.

The non-affiliated men's average rose from 2.315 to 2.334 in contrast to the non-affiliated women's average which decreased from 2.494 to 2.449.

In dormitory averages cooperative dormitories led the way. Jefferson house with a grade point of 2.488, topped the Quadrangle with a 2.402 average. The women's co-op, Russell house, likewise topped Currier hall, with an average of 2.680 compared with 2.417.

Phi Kappa Psi Leads Phi Kappa Psi led social fraternities with an average of 2.480. Last year's leader, Kappa Alpha, slumped into 18th place. Theta Xi, 11th in last year's record, jumped to second place
